The Kaleido-IP can monitor and display HD and SD television programs distributed over IP, across two HDTV displays. It supports numerous compressed and uncompressed video and audio formats. See Specifications, on page 101 for more information about the supported number of video programs.

A Kaleido-IP multiviewer system in its default configuration includes a predefined room and some layouts. Once you have connected your Kaleido-IP to your local *Management* and *Media Networks*, hooked up one or two $1920 \times 1080 @ 60 \, \text{Hz}$ (HDTV) displays, and specified source information, you can start using these layouts to monitor video signals distributed over IP. Consult the *Kaleido Software User's Manual* (see Related Documentation, on page 15) for instructions on how to define more rooms and layouts to suit your specific requirements.

Limitations

The Kaleido-IP multiviewer supports a subset of the features offered by other Kaleido Multiviewer series models as shown in the *Kaleido Multiviewer Product Comparison Guide* (see Related Documentation, on page 15). The Kaleido-IP currently also does not support the following Kaleido Software V9.XX features:

- Spanned monitors



- Installation hardware and rails, including manufacturer's documentation for the rails
- Two 25.4cm (10 in.) DisplayPort-to-HDMI adapter cables
- Two power cords
- The Kaleido Multiviewers Documentation Resource Guide, which provides instructions on how to access the documentation you need to install and use your new multiviewer.

Note: In line with our commitment to environmental preservation, only the *Kaleido Multiviewers Documentation Resource Guide*, and some related documents (e.g., welcome letters, warranty cards) are distributed in printed form. You can obtain the latest version of the Kaleido Software User's Manual and Installation & Service Manual for this multiviewer model, as well as the Release Notes, from the *Documentation Library* section of the Grass Valley website. Software, drivers, and sample databases are available from the *Downloads* section of the website.





The location of the optional Media Ports (LAN5 & LAN6) depends on the network interface option card that has been ordered / installed. See Network Interface Card Installation Location in the Server, on page 71.

Kaleido-IP Multiviewer Ethernet Port Usage

On the rear panel of non-virtual machine (VM) Kaleido-IP multiviewers are Ethernet connections that should be used as follows:

The management port LAN1 is used for multiviewer management: that is, any PC that
uses XEdit or XAdmin to configure this multiviewer and any Kaleido-RCP2 / RCP-200
must have IP connectivity to the LAN1 port. The management port LAN1 port can be
used for media streams also.

- The media ports LAN2 and higher are to be used for media streams only.
- 2022-6 encoded streams can only be used with media ports **LAN5** and **LAN6**. This is a licensed option. See Available Hardware and Software Options, on page 69.

Commissioning the Multiviewer

Connect the multiviewer as follows.

- 1 With the Kaleido-IP frame installed in its designated rack position, power up the frame. The multiviewer starts up. The startup sequence takes approximately four minutes.
- 2 Connect your Kaleido-IP multiviewer's Ethernet ports to two or more Ethernet switches (one *Management Network* and one or more *Media Networks*) according to Kaleido-IP Multiviewer Ethernet Port Usage, on page 21 and Cabling Diagram, on page 21).

Note: To disconnect an RJ-45 network cable connected to the optional LAN5 or LAN6 media ports, you may need to use the blade of a flat screwdriver to reach the cable's locking mechanism.

3 Connect a client PC, and the Kaleido-RCP2 (if available) to the switch on **LAN1**. You can also connect a mouse and a keyboard to your Kaleido-RCP2.

Notes

- The Kaleido-RCP2 is an optional device, and may not have been shipped with your Kaleido-IP system. For information on this and other options for your multiviewer system, contact your Grass Valley sales representative.
- You may need to upgrade your Kaleido-RCP2 devices (if available) to the latest firmware. See Software and Firmware Updates, on page 15. Refer to the *Kaleido-RCP2 Guide to Installation and Operation* for instructions on how to determine the firmware level, and how to perform the upgrade. See Related Documentation, on page 15.
- 4 Connect one of the DisplayPort outputs of the multiviewer to a display that supports a resolution of $1920 \times 1080 @ 60 \text{ Hz}$ (HDTV) (see Cabling Diagram, on page 21).

Notes

- Depending on your display type, you may use the DisplayPort-to-HDMI that shipped with your system, or DisplayPort-to-DVI adapters (not included).
- Although the Kaleido-IP unit has four DisplayPort outputs, only the first two DisplayPort outputs are used.
- To disconnect a display cable at the DisplayPort outputs, you may need to use an object (e.g., the blade of a flat screwdriver) to reach the cable's locking mechanism.
- Disconnecting and reconnecting any Kaleido-IP DisplayPort-to-HDMI adapter may require a restart. The adapter cables must be properly connected when the multiviewer restarts. If you connect such an adapter after the multiviewer has restarted, the display will remain blank.

Notes (continued)

If your displays are not collocated with your Kaleido-IP unit, you may
choose to employ DXF-200 transmitter/receiver devices that allow you to
install a display up to 1,000 meters (3,300 feet) from the signal source. In
this case, use the provided DisplayPort-to-HDMI cable between the
Kaleido-IP and the DXF-200 transmitter module.

5 Connect the power cords, and then turn the power on. The power switch is located on the front panel.¹

IMPORTANT

Should you want to add or replace a display or AV receiver at a later time, make sure the multiviewer is powered off, before making these changes. In the event that you have connected such a device while the multiviewer was running, you must restart the multiviewer for audio monitoring to be restored. Refer to *Restarting and Shutting Down a Kaleido-IP Multiviewer*, in the Kaleido Software User's Manual. See Related Documentation, on page 15.

6 If you want to use a different display resolution, see Changing the Output Resolution, on page 24, for detailed instructions.

Changing the Output Resolution

To change a display's resolution from the monitor wall

- 1 Connect a mouse to one of the Kaleido-IP frame's USB ports. See Troubleshooting with the Kaleido-IP frame's USB ports, on page 96 for more information about this.
- 2 Right-click anywhere on the monitor wall, point to **Monitor Wall** (if you clicked a monitor), and then click **Display resolution**.



IP Network Setup

Introduction

This chapter shows how to implement IP network connectivity with the multiviewer.

Networking Essentials

The following network prerequisites must be met:

- The type of network traffic to be found on the Kaleido-IP multiviewer's Ethernet ports must be segregated according to Kaleido-IP Multiviewer Ethernet Port Usage, on page 21
- The Ethernet switch for the *Management Network* must support 1000 Mbps full-duplex connections. The Ethernet switch associated with the *Media Network* should support 1000 Mbps full-duplex.
- The port on the Ethernet switch to which the multiviewer is connected should be configured to auto-negotiate. By default, multiviewers have their Ethernet ports set to auto-negotiate. If a switch does not support auto-negotiation, the recommended settings are 1000 Mbps, full-duplex for a switch associated with a Kaleido-IP *Media Network*. As required by the IEEE-802.3 standard, section 28D.5, 1000 Mbps full-duplex communication is only supported via auto-negotiation.
- Kaleido-IP support for multicast join and leave: it is possible to add and configure up
 to 6000 logical sources in a Kaleido-IP system without exceeding the network's
 bandwidth or the unit's decoding resources. See Decoding Capacity, on page 102 for
 details on the number of programs and total streaming bandwidth supported.

The Kaleido-IP multiviewer joins a multicast group only when decoding is required, that is when a source is being monitored on the wall. In addition, streams that are not decoded are joined momentarily in a polling manner, one stream at a time, to update the PMT and PAT information. The Kaleido-IP leaves the multicast group as soon as a change of layout implies that a different set of streams must be decoded.

However, if your situation involves frequent changes of layout (e.g., loading a new layout to the monitor wall every minute) then, when you are creating or editing a layout, make sure to terminate XEdit's connection to the Kaleido-IP once configuration tasks are completed.

The Kaleido-IP multiviewer must be configured with at least two IP addresses; one for the *Management Network*, and one for a *Media Network*, with the corresponding network mask and gateway settings, and a system name. The Kaleido-IP X320 model may require up to six IP addresses. In XAdmin and XEdit, a Kaleido-IP X120 or Kaleido-IP X320 with *four* network adapters is identified as **Kaleido-IP-4**, and a Kaleido-IP X120 or Kaleido-IP X320 with *six* network adapters is identified as **Kaleido-IP-6**.

A client PC must have IP connectivity with the *Management Network*, to communicate with the multiviewer (see System Requirements for a Client PC, on page 39). You must also configure any Kaleido-RCP2 units you may have ordered (see Using a Kaleido-RCP2 with Default Settings, on page 67).

Note: If the *Management Port* IP address of your Kaleido-IP has been changed (i.e. it no longer corresponds to the as-shipped configuration), it is still possible to determine the current *Management Port* IP address setting. Changing the Management Network IP Address from the Monitor Wall

The *Management Network* IP address, system name, and other parameters can be set via a control panel on the monitor wall, however this will also change the current IP address of the *Media Network* interfaces.

To change the Management Network IP address of the Kaleido-IP from the monitor wall

- 1 Connect a mouse to one of the USB connectors of the Kaleido-IP. See Troubleshooting with the Kaleido-IP frame's USB ports, on page 96 for more information about this.
- 2 Connect a keyboard to one of the USB connectors of the Kaleido-IP.
- 3 Right-click anywhere on the monitor wall, point to **Monitor Wall** (if you clicked a monitor), and then click **System configuration**.
 - The **System Configuration** window appears.
- 4 Click the **Ethernet** tab.
- 5 Type the required *Management Network's* IP address, network mask, and gateway address in the appropriate boxes.
- 6 Click OK.
- 7 When prompted to restart the system to apply your changes, click Yes.
- 8 Continue with the next procedure to set the IP addresses for the Media Networks.


Once you have configured the *Management Network* IP address from the monitor wall, use XAdmin to configure an IP address for the network adapter that is connected to the *Media Network*.

Configuring a Multiviewer's IP, Date, and Time Settings with XAdmin

To change the Kaleido-IP's management and Media IP addresses

- 1 Open a Web browser window and type your multiviewer's *Management* IP address in the address bar. See Opening XAdmin, on page 49.
 - The XAdmin Status and Options page appears.
- 2 Click System configuration, in the navigation area on the left of the page.

The *System Configuration* page appears, showing the current system name, management and Media IP addresses, network masks, default gateway, connection-speed and duplex-mode settings, as well as the date and time settings.



3 Under General, type a descriptive name for your system to make it readily identifiable.

If there are more than one multiviewer in the same network environment, it is important to assign each a unique system name, so that you can tell them apart (for example, when using a remote control panel such as the Kaleido-RCP2 or RCP-200).

Note: The system name must comply with RFC 1123, because it is also used as the device's host name. Up to 8 characters are allowed, limited to A-Z, a-z, 0-9, and the hyphen character. The system name cannot start or end with a hyphen character.

4 Under **Ethernet**, type the appropriate IP addresses, network masks, and gateway settings, and review the detected connection speeds and duplex modes for your Kaleido-IP's network adapters.



- 6 If this Kaleido-IP is meant to monitor HLS sources, enable NTP synchronization: next to NTP synchronization, click Enabled, and then type the NTP server's IP address.



7 Click Save.

The new settings are saved locally.



- 8 Click OK.
- 9 The **Apply settings** button becomes available.



10 Click Apply settings.

The multiviewer must be restarted for changes to the network configuration to take effect. A message appears prompting you to reboot the system immediately.

11 Click OK.

Your Kaleido-IP restarts.

Note: Settings cannot be applied to a multiviewer system while an upgrade is in progress. If the multiviewer does not reboot after 10 seconds or so, try clicking **Apply settings** again after a minute or two, until the multiviewer reboots.

12 In XEdit, a URL path can be used to identify a source located on a remoter server to access HTTP, RTSP, or RTMP streams. When using a URL, the multiviewer's DNS server configuration must be configured to allow the multiviewer to be able to resolve the URL to the stream server's current network IP address.

If your network uses a proxy server, then you must configure the proxy server's URL.

a Click **Configure**, under **DNS** and proxy configuration. The DNS and Proxy Configuration page appears.



- b Type the appropriate suffixes for your primary domain, and search domain, and the IP addresses for the primary, and secondary DNS server.
- c Select **Enable proxy**, and then type the URL of the appropriate proxy auto-config (PAC) file, if required.
- d Click **Apply configuration**.

A message appears confirming that the changes have been applied.



- e Click **OK** to dismiss the message.
- 13 If this system must monitor sources from a VLAN environment, then see Configuring Virtual LAN Adapters on a Kaleido-IP, on page 79 to add the required Virtual LAN Adapters.
- 14 If you need to change the head streaming settings, see Configuring Head Streaming on a Kaleido-IP, on page 76.
- 15 If this system requires new fonts, then see Adding Fonts to a Kaleido-IP, on page 81 to add the required Virtual LAN Adapters.

Network Considerations

It is possible to add and configure up to 6000 logical sources without exceeding the network's bandwidth or the unit's decoding resources.

The Kaleido-IP supports concurrent decoding of up to 512 elementary streams within a program.

The Kaleido-IP supports layouts using up to 600 Mbps of streaming bandwidth. However, when using a layout touring application, the total bandwidth usage per layout should be limited to 400 Mbps across all network interfaces, and the touring period should be at least 30 seconds. In the case of the Kaleido-IP-6, layout touring should be avoided (a source cycling application should be preferred when required). Implementing a source cycling or layout touring configuration requires iControl.

The Kaleido-IP supports streaming over wide area networks (WAN), which are subject to packet delay variation (jitter), latency, packet reordering, and packet loss. It also supports encoders that transmit in bursts or with long delays between packets. The Kaleido-IP can handle transmission delays matching the encoder's video buffer delay, and, in the case of RTP streams, up to ± 120 ms of packet delay variation.

The Kaleido-IP multiviewer joins a multicast group only when decoding is required, that is when a source is being monitored on the wall. In addition, streams that are not decoded are joined momentarily in a polling manner—one stream at a time—to update the PMT and PAT information. The Kaleido-IP leaves the multicast group as soon as a change of layout implies that a different set of streams must be decoded.

However, if your situation involves frequent changes of layout (e.g., loading a new layout to the monitor wall every minute), then, when you are creating or editing a layout, make sure to terminate XEdit's connection to the Kaleido-IP once configuration tasks are completed.

TCP/UDP Port Usage

The various Kaleido-IP communication protocols require access to specific ports. In networks where a firewall is present between device A and device B, the ports used to communicate **from** device A **to** device B must be open on the incoming (external) side of the firewall.

Note: All necessary ports are open by default on the multiviewer. There is no mechanism provided for changing the default settings.

Note: This is configurable in XEdit—you can choose any UDP or TCP/IP port to use for communications between the multiviewer and an external router.

Network Considerations for a Multiviewer Cluster

IMPORTANT

Before changing the system name or IP address of a multiviewer associated with a cluster, review the following.

- If you change the system name or IP address of a cluster member while another cluster member is offline or otherwise unavailable, the cluster's integrity will be broken. If you attempt to make such a change, XEdit will alert you of the situation, prompting you to cancel the operation and try again later, when all cluster members are available. However, in the advent that such a change was made by mistake, or that it as been forced for some reason, you will have to repair the broken cluster (see "Repairing a Cluster System" in the Kaleido Software User's Manual).
- To maintain the integrity of a cluster configuration, such changes must be made by using the system configuration features available in XAdmin.



Introduction

This chapter shows how to configure the multiviewer.

System Requirements for a Client PC

A client PC or laptop meeting the following requirements is required to access the XAdmin Web client, and the other Kaleido Software client applications.

Operating system	Microsoft Windows 10, Windows 8.1, Windows 8, or Windows 7.
Processor	The minimum required by the operating system or better.
Memory	The minimum required by the operating system plus 2 GB or more.
Disk space	The minimum required by the operating system plus 2 GB or more.

Multiviewer Model Representation in XEdit and XAdmin

The name used to represent a multiviewer model is shown in the table below.

Multiviewer model	Represents
Kaleido-IP-4	A Kaleido-IP X120 or X320, frame with four network adapters
Kaleido-IP-6	A Kaleido-IP X320 frame with six network adapters

Installing Kaleido Software Client Applications

In addition to the XAdmin Web client, which does not require installation, the Kaleido Software includes the following client applications:

- XEdit is a client application used to create layouts for the monitor wall, and to configure
 your multiviewer system, from your PC. When this PC has network connectivity to the
 multiviewer, you can use XEdit to modify layouts and settings directly on the
 multiviewer, or you can work locally on the computer and then export your changes to
 the multiviewer.
- If you have only one multiviewer (or if you have more than one but you intend to always have the same version of the Kaleido Software on all of them), download the XEdit installer file from the multiviewer's home page. Whenever you install a new version of the Kaleido Software on the multiviewer, the next time you open XEdit, your copy of the application will be automatically updated from the multiviewer. See Installing XEdit from your Multiviewer's Home Page on page 40.

• The Router Control Software Single Bus and Matrix View applications (also part of the iRouter Router Control Software packaged with iControl Application Servers) can be used to control your multiviewer's logical sources and monitor wall destinations, via the KX Router logical router, or to control other logical routers configured within your multiviewer system. See Installing Router Control on page 45.

Installing XEdit from your Multiviewer's Home Page

To install XEdit from your multiviewer's home page

1 With your PC, open a Web browser window and type the multiviewer's IP address in the address bar.

The multiviewer's home page appears.



2 Click the XEdit button.

The browser prompts you to save an executable file to your hard drive (Kaleido-windows32-online.exe¹). This file is an online installer, which will download XEdit and other companion elements from your multiviewer, and install them. Some browsers may allow you to run the file directly. Depending on your browser's security features, warnings may appear, which you may safely dismiss.

3 Unless your browser let you run the file (and you chose to do so), navigate to the location were you saved the installer file and open it.
More security warnings or prompts may appear, which you may safely dismiss or accept.

If XEdit cannot find all of the fonts it needs already on your PC, it downloads them from the multiviewer automatically, in which case a message will appear to confirm the font update, and instruct you to restart the application.



- Click **OK** to continue, and then open XEdit again, by using the shortcut on your desktop, in your Apps view (Windows 8.1) or Start screen (Windows 8), or from the Start menu (Windows 7, Windows 10).
- 4 When prompted to specify a database, choose one from the **Path** list, or click **Browse** to navigate to the database you wish to use as your local workspace, and then click **OK**.





Once the database has completed loading, XEdit's main application window appears.

Note: Once it has been installed from the multiviewer, XEdit remains on your PC, and can be launched from the shortcut that was added to your desktop, Apps view, or Start screen (see page 41), or from the Start menu. Whenever you install a new version of the Kaleido Software on the multiviewer, the next time you open XEdit, your installed copy of the application will be automatically updated from the multiviewer.

- Once it has been installed from the multiviewer, Router Control remains on your PC, and can be launched from the shortcut that was added to your desktop, Apps view, Start screen (step on page 45), or from the Start menu. Whenever you install a new version of the Kaleido Software on the multiviewer, the next time you open Router Control, your installed copy of the application will be automatically updated from the multiviewer.
- Router Control can also connect to other Kaleido multiviewers or iControl Application Servers, and control their routers.
- Routers configured within a Kaleido multiviewer system are compatible with the Router Control modules packaged with iControl Application Servers version 6.10 and later.
- When Router Control is connected to an Application Server, a router manager configuration application is available from the main application window. When Router Control is connected to a Kaleido multiviewer, this router manager configuration application is not available (router configuration is performed with XEdit, in this case).


Connecting to a Multiviewer with a Different XEdit Version from your PC's Version

When connecting to a multiviewer with your PC and your PC already has XEdit installed, the XEdit version installed on your PC and the Kaleido Software version on the multiviewer must be same as explained below.

The composition of a Kaleido Software / XEdit version numbering is explained in the following table.

Kaleido Software / XEdit Version Reference	Description
Version M.mp	M is the major revision number m is the minor revision number p is the patch revision number

When you connect to a multiviewer, the multiviewer's Kaleido Software major and minor version must match the XEdit major and minor version installed on your PC. When there is a version number mismatch between the multiviewer's Kaleido Software version and your PC's XEdit version, you will receive the following error when you try to connect to the multiviewer with your PC.



Under this circumstance, proceed as follows.

- There is no compatibility problem if only the patch revision number is different between the Kaleido Software version on the multiviewer and the XEdit version on your PC. Click **Yes** to the Software Version Check screen.
- There is a compatibility problem if the major version, minor version, or both are
 different between the Kaleido Software version on the multiviewer and the XEdit
 version on your PC. The solution is to downgrade / upgrade the XEdit version used on
 your PC to the Kaleido Software version used by the multiviewer. Proceed as follows:
 - Click **No** to the Software Version Check screen.
 - Unistall XEdit from your PC (see Uninstalling XEdit, on page 44).
 - Install XEdit from the multiviewer (see Installing XEdit from your Multiviewer's Home Page, on page 40).

If you regularly connect to different multiviewer systems that use different Kaleido Software versions, and as a result you receive the Software Version Check error message, the best solution to avoid this is to upgrade all of your multiviewer systems to the same Kaleido Software version.

Ways to Access XAdmin

Access the XAdmin Web client as follows:

- from a Web browser (see Opening XAdmin from a Browser on page 50),
- from XEdit (see Opening XAdmin from XEdit on page 51),



Using a Kaleido-RCP2 with Default Settings

By default, the Kaleido-RCP2 is configured with DHCP enabled, so it will automatically be assigned an IP address by a DHCP server. If no DHCP server can be found, the Kaleido-RCP2 will fall back to its default static IP address, subnet mask, and gateway settings:

Default IP address	10.0.3.191
Default subnet mask	255.255.0.0
Default gateway	0.0.0.0

If you need to operate with a fixed IP address, you must use the Kaleido-RCP2's configuration menu to disable DHCP and set up the correct IP address, Network Mask, and Gateway (see the "Enabling or Disabling DHCP" and "Setting an IP Address, Subnet Mask and Gateway" sections in the *Kaleido-RCP2 Guide to Installation and Operation*, available from the Documentation Library section of Grass Valley's website).

To access Kaleido-X rooms located in other subnets, the Kaleido-RCP2 must be configured with the appropriate unicast IP addresses (see the "Configuring Unicast IP Addresses" section in the *Kaleido-RCP2 Guide to Installation and Operation*, available from the Documentation Library section of Grass Valley's website).

To start using the Kaleido-RCP2 with its default settings

1 On the Kaleido-RCP2 unit, press the ENTER button and hold it until the ESC button lights up.

The following message appears on the LCD display:

ROOM SELECTION

2 Press ENTER again to obtain the room list from the multiviewers that are currently available on the network.

The message **ROOM Select** followed by the name of the first room available appears on the LCD display.

- 3 Press the 2 key (to move up in the list) or the 8 key (to move down the list) until the name of the room you wish to access is displayed.
- 4 Press ENTER, and then press ESC to exit the configuration menu.
- 5 Press the LOGIN button.

6 Press ENTER to log on to your system as Admin.

A message prompting you for a password appears on the LCD display.

7 Press ENTER again (by default, there is no password).

The message **Access granted** will appear on the LCD display if the login is successful. If a mouse is connected to the Kaleido-RCP2, then you should be able to see and move the mouse pointer on the monitor wall.

8 Press any of the LAYOUT PRESETS buttons to load a predefined layout on the monitor wall.

If your system was configured prior to shipment, then a layout will appear on all displays. Otherwise, a gray screen will appear with the following message in the middle:

"No layout has been assigned to this room. Please load a layout."

Note: To access other layouts, press the LOAD button. To assign a layout to a preset button, press and hold the button for more than six seconds while the desired layout is showing on the monitor wall.

Testing the Monitor Wall Operation

To load a layout on the monitor wall

 If you have configured a Kaleido-RCP2 (see Using a Kaleido-RCP2 with Default Settings, on page 67), press any of the LAYOUT PRESETS buttons to load a predefined layout on the monitor wall.







Introduction

This chapter shows you the various maintenance operations and corrective actions that maybe required to be performed during system commissioning and over the multiviewer's lifetime.

System Verification

Verifying the Management Port IP Address and Application Version

To find the Management Port IP address and application version

- 1 Connect a mouse to one of the Kaleido-IP frame's USB ports. See Troubleshooting with the Kaleido-IP frame's USB ports, on page 96 for more information about this.
- 2 Right-click anywhere on the monitor wall. On the shortcut menu, point to **Monitor Wall** (if you clicked a monitor), and then click **Show dashboard** to display the dashboard associated with the current head. A small window appears in the bottom-right area, revealing the *Management Port* IP address and the system version.

Adding SNMP Support to Manage the Kaleido-IP Frame's Hardware

Adding SNMP support to a Kaleido-IP frame allows you to monitor the frame's health parameters such as:

- Hardware Monitoring: fan speed, temperature, voltage, chassis intrusion, redundant power failure, power consumption, disk health, and memory health.
- System Information: BIOS, baseboard, chassis, computer system, disk drives, memory, network, printer, processor, system slot, IPMI, power supply, account, operating system, process, service, share, time zone, OEM strings, and system configuration options.

SNMP Service Installation

The following procedure requires that you have WinSCP and PuTTY installed on your PC to install the SNMP service. These freeware applications allows you to transfer files to the Kaleido-IP and to make a remote terminal connection to the Kaleido-IP to carry out file system actions on the Kaleido-IP.

The following procedure installs the Super Doctor service on the Kaleido-IP frame that once installed, provides the SNMP service on the Kaleido-IP frame. Proceed as follows.

- 1 Register and download *Super Doctor 5* version 5.4.0 (linux version) from the following URL: https://www.supermicro.com/SwDownload/UserInfo.aspx?sw=0&cat=SD5
- 2 Extract the downloaded zip file.

- 3 Documentation is available for this service by opening SuperDoctor5_UserGuide.pdf
- 4 Copy the installer file for Super Doctor onto your Kaleido-IP:
 - a Run WinSCP.
 - b Connect to the Kaleido-IP's *Management Network* IP address. See Verifying the Management Port IP Address and Application Version, on page 85. Use the following credentials to connect to the Kaleido-IP frame.

Username: **root**Password: **pw1234**

- c Copy SuperDoctor5Installer_5.4.0_build.703_linux_x64_20160629131648.bin into any directory on the Kaleido-IP's hard disk. For example, /data.
- 5 Make the installer file executable.
 - a From WinSCP, launch PuTTY.
 - b Make a remote terminal connection to the Kaleido-IP's console.

Username: **root**Password: **pw1234**

c In the console, execute the following command:

chmod +x SuperDoctor5Installer_5.4.0_build.703_linux_x64_20160629131648.bin

6 In the console, run the installer with the following command:

./SuperDoctor5Installer_5.4.0_build.703_linux_x64_20160629131648.bin -i silent

Note: Running the installer without the silent mode may not always result in the installation successfully completing.

Now Super Doctor is installed in /opt/Supermicro/SuperDoctor5.

7 Delete the installer file from the Kaleido-IP:

rm SuperDoctor5Installer_5.4.0_build.703_linux_x64_20160629131648.bin

8 You can now point your browser to http://<KIP IP address>:8181/SuperDoctor5/login and login with username ADMIN and password ADMIN to view the SNMP web application.

Configuration

Configure the SNMP Service as follows.

- 1 Using WinSCP's editor, open the file /etc/snmp/snmp.conf in an editor. Replace the line "pass .1.3.6.1.4.1.10876 /usr/sbin/sd_extension" with "pass .1.3.6.1.4.1.10876 /opt/Supermicro/SuperDoctor5/libs/native/snmpagent".
- 2 Reboot the Kaleido-IP. See Restarting or Shutting Down the Multiviewer, on page 74.

Maintenance

Field-Replaceable Units

The following components are field replaceable units (FRUs). The repair procedure is to swap in a new (known good) component to restore system operation.

- Power supply (#1 or #2)
- Other FRUs may be available: contact Customer Support.

There are no user-serviceable parts within FRU components. For the procedure to replace a FRU, see *Supermicro SuperServer 1028U Series User's Manual for model 1028U-TR4+*. See Related Documentation, on page 15.

Generating a System Snapshot

A system snapshot creates a compressed file that contains information that can be used by Technical Support for troubleshooting purposes.

To generate a system snapshot

1 Open XAdmin. See Opening XAdmin, on page 49. The XAdmin *Status and Options* page appears.



2 Click the **Help & support** link in the navigation pane.

The Technical Support page appears.



3 Click system snapshot.

The system snapshot generation may take a few moments, after which your browser prompts you to save the resulting compressed folder to your hard drive.

4 Browse to the location where you want to save the ZIP file, and then click **Save**.

Upgrading the Multiviewer

Whenever possible, upgrade the multiviewer to use the latest Kaleido Software version number to take advantage of the latest bug fixes and stability enhancements. See the Kaleido Software Release Notes for more information about a Kaleido Software release.

Pre-upgrade Checklist

IMPORTANT

Back up your system database

Before upgrading the multiviewer system, make sure you have a backup of the current system database so that you can return to the previous Kaleido Software version if necessary. Refer to *Creating a Backup* in the Kaleido Software User's Manual, for details. See Related Documentation, on page 15.

Cluster and cascade systems

All multiviewers that are part of a cluster or cascade system must have the same Kaleido Software version.

For cluster systems, Kaleido Software version 8.70 introduce a hard compatibility break with previous Kaleido Software versions.

Cluster backups you create with version 8.70 (or higher), cannot be restored by using an earlier version of XEdit. Grass Valley recommends you make a backup of the individual databases for every cluster member, *before upgrading* from a pre-8.70 version, to version 8.70 (or higher).

Upgrade Oveview

Upgrade packages are made available by contacting technical support (see Grass Valley Technical Support, on page 110). Download the update files onto your PC's hard drive. The format of the file should be $926 - XXG01 - xxx \cdot zip$.

The upgrade is performed from your PC, by using XAdmin. See Upgrading the Kaleido-IP Multiviewer on page 90.







Your multiviewer will shut down, and then start again, during which time you can observe messages associated with the operating system shutdown and boot sequences on the monitor wall display connected to Head 2. This may take a while.



Once the multiviewer has restarted, the system notifies you.



10 Click OK.

The XAdmin Status and Options page appears.

11 Verify that the expected version number appears in the page title (check the tab label, or the browser's title bar).



At this point, the upgrade is complete.

Downgrading the Multiviewer System


Displaying the Dashboard

The multiviewer supports the following types of dashboards:

- Status dashboard displays IP address, Kaleido Software version, currently loaded layout, Frame name/Room, associated Output head
- Update dashboard displays status of System upgrade.

To display the dashboard

1 Right-click anywhere on the monitor wall. On the menu, point to **Monitor wall**, and then click **Show dashboard** to display the dashboard associated with the current head.

Note: If you right-click the monitor wall background directly, then the monitor wall menu appears immediately. Click **Show dashboard**.



After a brief delay, the dashboard appears at the bottom-right corner of the monitor, and the command **Hide dashboard** replaces **Show dashboard** on the menu.

Troubleshooting

Troubleshooting with the Kaleido-IP frame's USB ports

A USB mouse can be directly connected to the multiviewer for troubleshooting purposes (as opposed to connecting the mouse to a Kaleido-RCP2, for instance) with the following conditions.

- The pointer can only travel between the displays connected to the Kaleido-IP frame.
- When more than one display is connected to the card, the required mouse movement
 to go between displays does not always follow the wall layout set in XEdit. For example,
 you will have to move the mouse pointer horizontally or vertically in order to go from
 one display to the next.

Troubleshooting Common Issues

Troubleshooting consists of using fault-isolation techniques to narrow down the probable cause to a specific multiviewer component. Schedule these maintenance operations during off hours when the system is not in use if possible as troubleshooting can cause outage. Use the following troubleshooting table to diagnose common issues and take corrective actions to restore operation.

Swapping around a Power Supply in a Multiviewer

Schedule this maintenance operation during off hours when the system is not in use if possible as this procedure can cause multiviewer outage.

In an attempt to restore multiviewer operation and to perform fault isolation procedures, you can swap the position of a power supply around in the multiviewer frame to see if normal multiviewer operation can be restored.

If the frame has an empty power supply slot (for example, for a redundant power supply unit (PSU)), you can remove the PSU from the frame and insert it into the other power supply slot. Refer to the *Supermicro SuperServer 1028U Series User's Manual*; see Related Documentation, on page 15. Ensure to connect a power cable at the rear of the frame's chassis for the PSU's new position in the frame. To RMA a defective PSU, see Grass Valley Technical Support, on page 110.

Disposal and Recycling Information

Your Grass Valley equipment comes with at least one lithium button battery (Li-MnO₂) located on the main printed circuit board.



Before disposing of your Grass Valley equipment, remove the battery as follows:

- 1 Make sure the equipment's AC adapters are unplugged from the power outlet.
- 2 Remove the protective cover from your equipment.
- 3 Gently remove the battery from its casing using a blunt instrument for leverage such as a screwdriver if necessary.
- 4 Dispose of the battery and equipment according to your local environmental laws and guidelines.

IMPORTANT

Be careful not to short-circuit the batteries by adhering to the appropriate safe handling practices. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire as they may explode. Batteries may explode if damaged or overheated. Do not dispose of batteries as household waste. Do not dismantle, open or shred batteries. Keep batteries out of the reach of children.

The electrolyte of the batteries contains 1,2-dimethoxyethane (DME) (CAS 110-71-4, EINECS 203-794-9) above 0.1% by weight. DME is listed as a Substance of Very High Concern (SVHC) by the regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 of the European Parliament and of the Council. It is classified as a reprotoxic of category 2 in the European Union. Accordingly, exposure to DME may impair fertility and may cause harm to the unborn child. DME is also classified as harmful by inhalation.

Risk of exposure occurs only if the battery is mechanically or electrically abused. The most likely risk is acute exposure when a cell vents. In the event of a battery leak, do not allow battery liquid to come in contact with skin or eyes. Seek medical help immediately in case of ingestion, inhalation, skin or eye contact, or suspected exposure to the contents of an opened battery.
