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## Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) Protection



Electrostatic discharge occurs when electronic components are improperly handled and can result in intermittent failure or complete damage adversely affecting an electrical circuit. When you remove and replace any card from a frame always follow ESD-prevention procedures:

- Ensure that the frame is electrically connected to earth ground through the power cord or any other means if available.
- Wear an ESD wrist strap ensuring that it makes good skin contact. Connect the grounding clip to an *unpainted surface* of the chassis frame to safely ground unwanted ESD voltages. If no wrist strap is available, ground yourself by touching the *unpainted* metal part of the chassis.
- For safety, periodically check the resistance value of the antistatic strap, which should be between 1 and 10 megohms.
- When temporarily storing a card make sure it is placed in an ESD bag.
- Cards in an earth grounded metal frame or casing do not require any special ESD protection.

Une décharge électrostatique peut se produire lorsque des composants électroniques ne sont pas manipulés de manière adéquate, ce qui peut entraîner des défaillances intermittentes ou endommager irrémédiablement un circuit électrique. Au moment de remplacer une carte dans un châssis, prenez toujours les mesures de protection antistatique appropriées :

- Assurez-vous que le châssis est relié électriquement à la terre par le cordon d'alimentation ou tout autre moyen disponible.
- Portez un bracelet antistatique et assurez-vous qu'il est bien en contact avec la peau. Connectez la pince de masse à une *surface non peinte* du châssis pour détourner à la terre toute tension électrostatique indésirable. En l'absence de bracelet antistatique, déchargez l'électricité statique de votre corps en touchant une surface métallique *non peinte* du châssis.
- Pour plus de sécurité, vérifiez périodiquement la valeur de résistance du bracelet antistatique. Elle doit se situer entre 1 et 10 mégohms.
- Si vous devez mettre une carte de côté, assurez-vous de la ranger dans un sac protecteur antistatique.
- Les cartes qui sont reliées à un châssis ou boîtier métallique mis à la terre ne nécessitent pas de protection antistatique spéciale.

## Introduction

The KMX-3921 multiviewer can be installed in either a Densité 3+ FR1 frame or a Densité 3+ FR4 frame. The KMX-3921 cards are installed in the frame with a corresponding back panel that is installed at the rear of the frame. Each KMX-3921 card can display up to nine SD, HD, or 3G-SDI video sources in up to nine video windows across one or two high-resolution mosaic outputs. Combine up to six KMX-3921 cards, to configure a single-, dual- or quad-mosaic output system in a range of sizes (see [Supported Frames and Multiviewer Scaling](#), on page 13). According to the number of KMX-3921 cards chosen for an installation, a correspondingly sized rear panel is used to interconnect the cards.

The connectors for KMX-3921 multiviewer's SDI inputs and mosaic SFP outputs are located on the multiviewer's rear panel. The mosaic outputs require one or two SFP output modules for connection to a display.

The multiviewer can be genlocked to the frame's reference. For the Densité 3+ FR1 frame, the optional REF-1801-FR1 card must previously have been installed in the frame.

The KMX-3921 is ideal for production monitoring in trucks. It integrates tightly with other Densité signal processing cards, routers and production switchers.

## Supported Frames and Multiviewer Scaling

The frame the KMX-3921 multiviewer is installed in and the frame's controller model has a direct effect on the multiviewer's implementation:

- A KMX-3921 9 × 1 or 9 × 2 multiviewer can fit in either a Densité 3+ FR1 or Densité 3+ FR4 frame (with any frame controller model type).
- All other larger multiviewer models are only compatible with a Densité 3+ FR4 frame that is equipped with either the CPU-ETH3-STD standard or CPU-ETH3-ADV advanced frame controller.

If the frame has available slots, multiple individual multiviewers can coexist in the same frame. This is summarized in the table below.

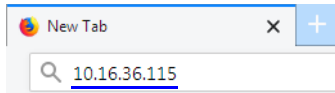
## How to Identify a Densité 3+ FR4 Frame's Controller Model

All Densité 3+ FR4 frames are equipped with a CPU-ETH3 frame controller. However, there are a number of different available CPU-ETH3 frame controller models that may limit the multiviewer capacity supported by the frame. To know what multiviewer capacity a Densité 3+ FR4 frame can support, you must first identify the CPU-ETH3 frame controller model currently installed in the frame by proceeding as follows.

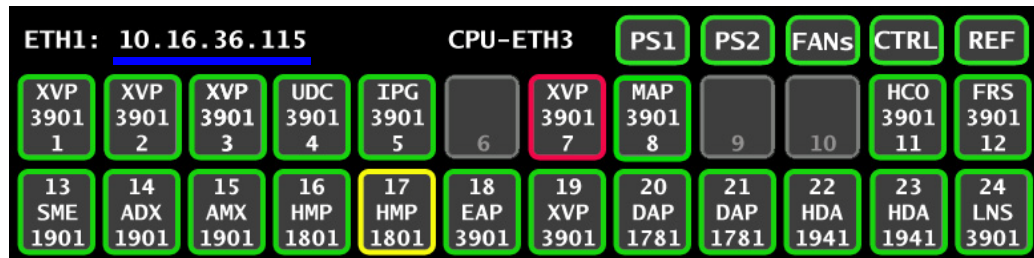
**Prerequisites:** For this procedure, the frame must be powered up, you must have a PC with network connectivity to the frame's controller, and you must know the frame controller's IP address or have access to the frame controller's display.

### To find the frame's controller model in a powered frame

- 1 On your PC, connect to the frame controller's web page with a Web browser using the frame controller's IP address.



For example, the frame controller's IP address is shown after **ETH1** on the home screen of frame's local control panel.

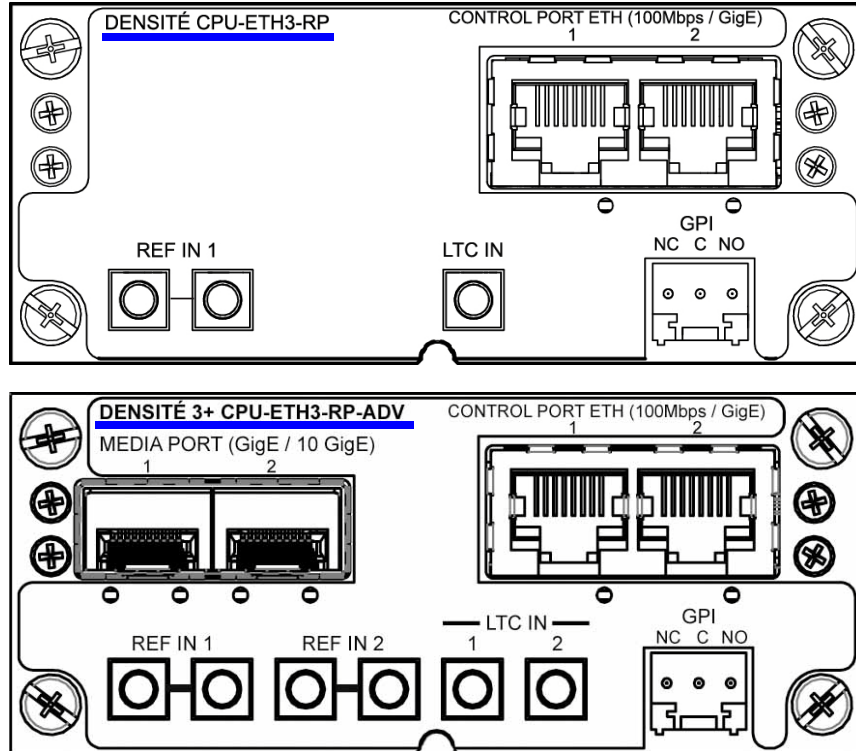

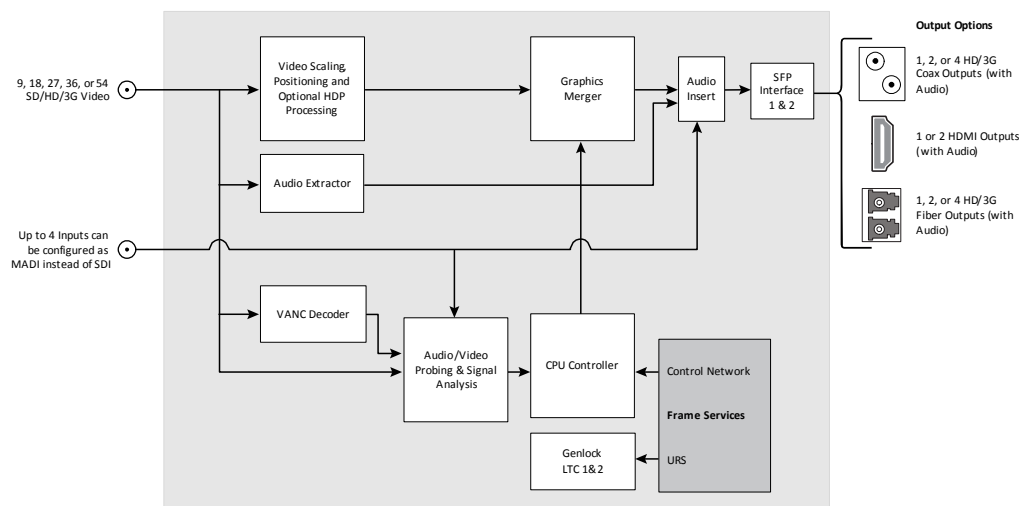

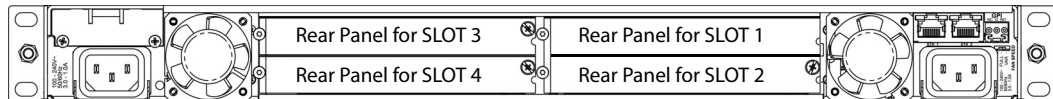

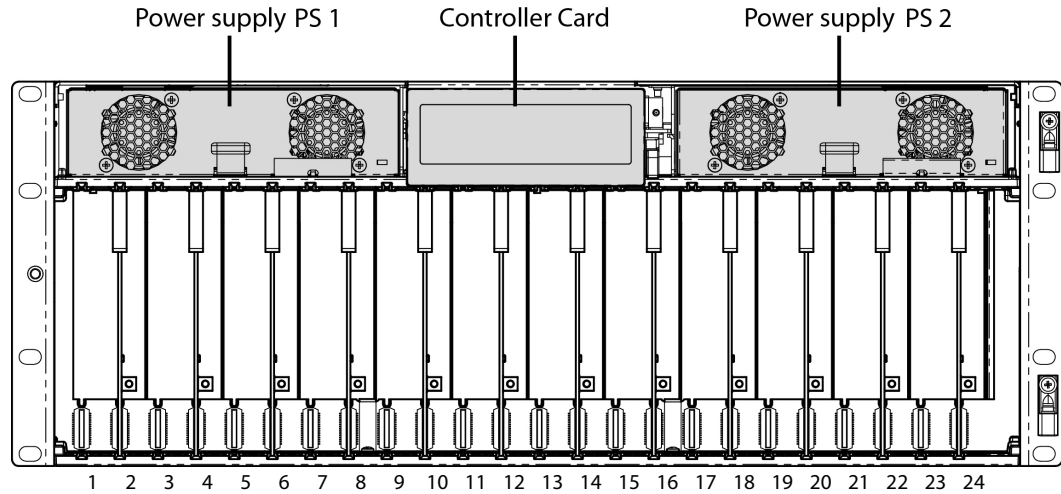

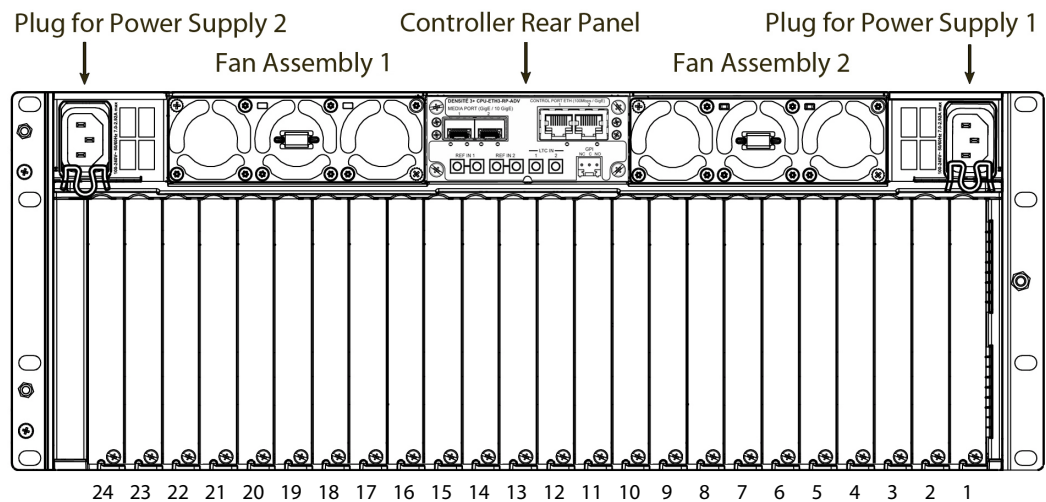

## Installation of the KMX-3921 in a Densité 3+ Frame

The KMX-3921 multiviewer can be installed in either a Densité 3+ FR1 frame or a Densité 3+ FR4 frame. The frame must be networked and powered, and configured for use. To avoid any network IP address conflict, see [Avoiding Networked Equipment IP Address Conflicts](#), on page 47.

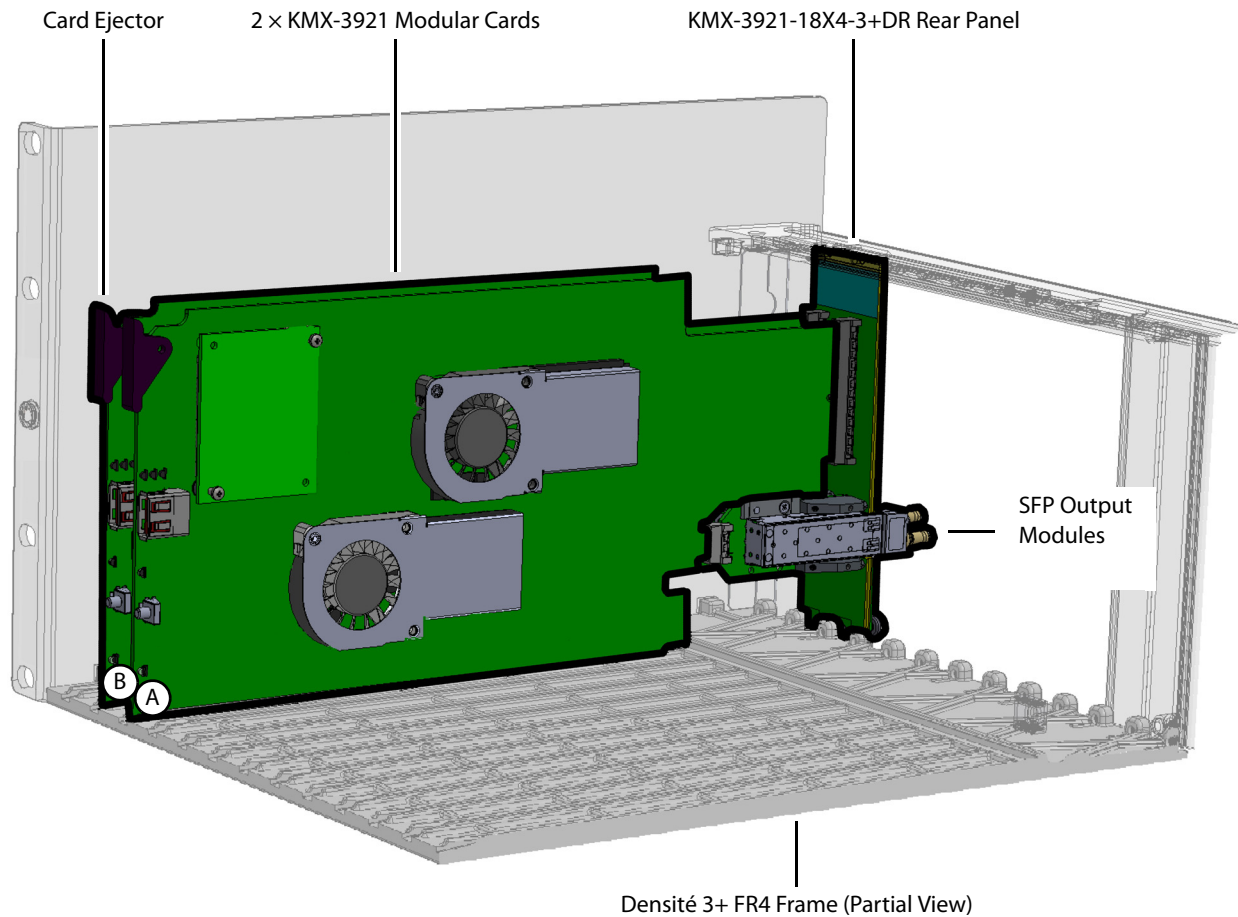

### Multiviewer Installation in a Densité 3+ FR4 Frame

The Densité 3+ FR4 frame has space for 24 modular card slots. Identify the space in the Densité 3+ FR4 frame the multiviewer is to be located. A single KMX-3921 card can be installed in any one of the 24 modular card slots with its corresponding rear panel. When there are between two and six KMX-3921 cards to be installed<sup>5</sup>, they must be installed together side-by-side in a series and use the same common rear panel to form a multiviewer system. More than one multiviewer system can be installed in one Densité 3+ FR4 frame, however, each multiviewer system will be functionally independent of each other.

Each card has connectors which plug into a mid-frame mother board for distribution of power and for connection to the controller card, and a second connector which for certain cards plug directly into the rear panel for mosaic SFP output connections to the display(s).

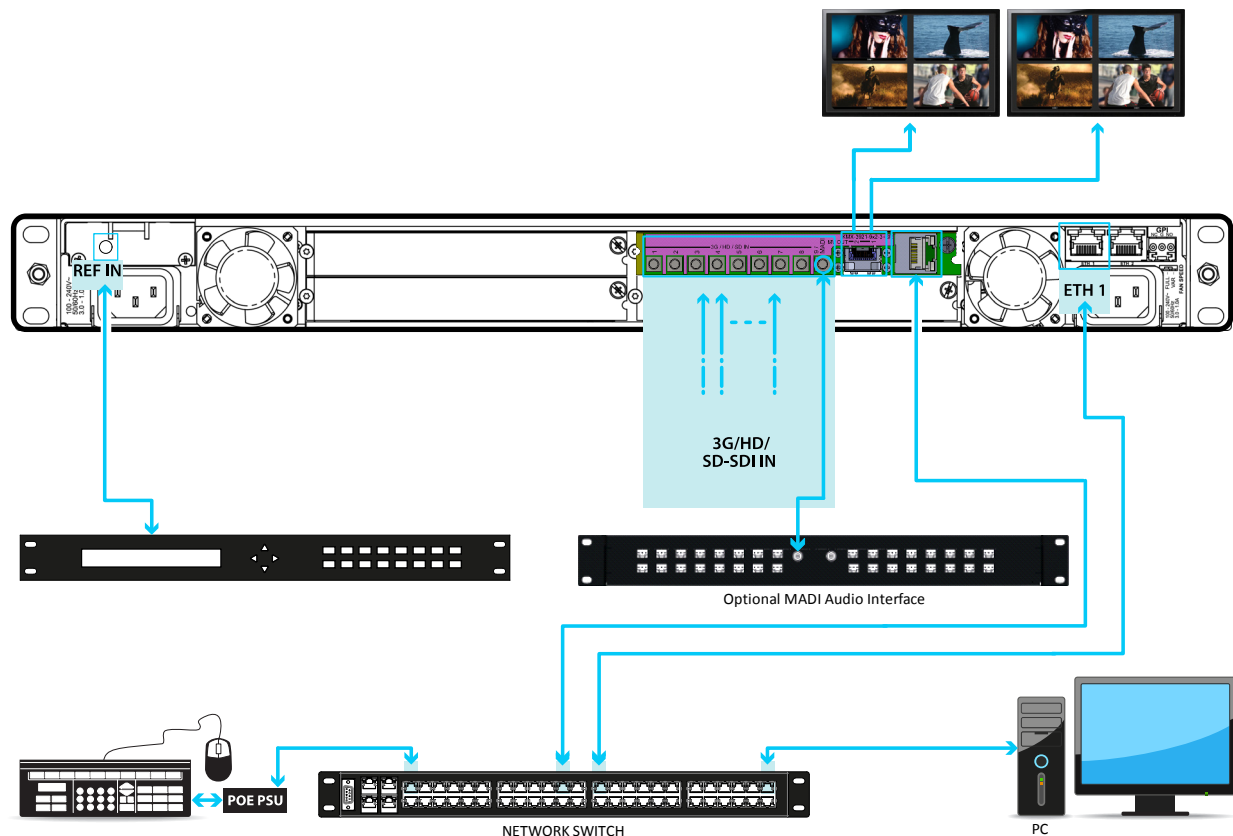

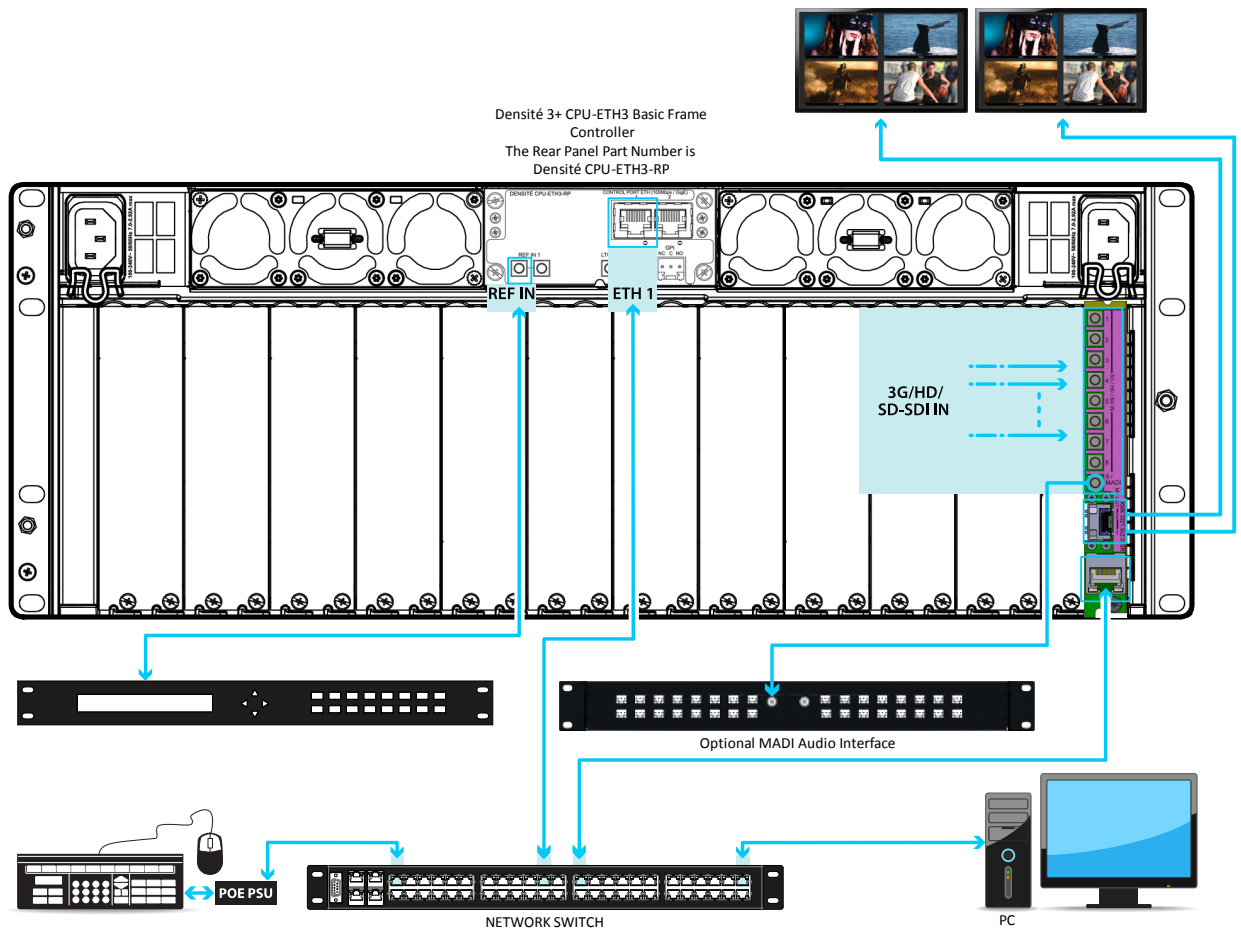

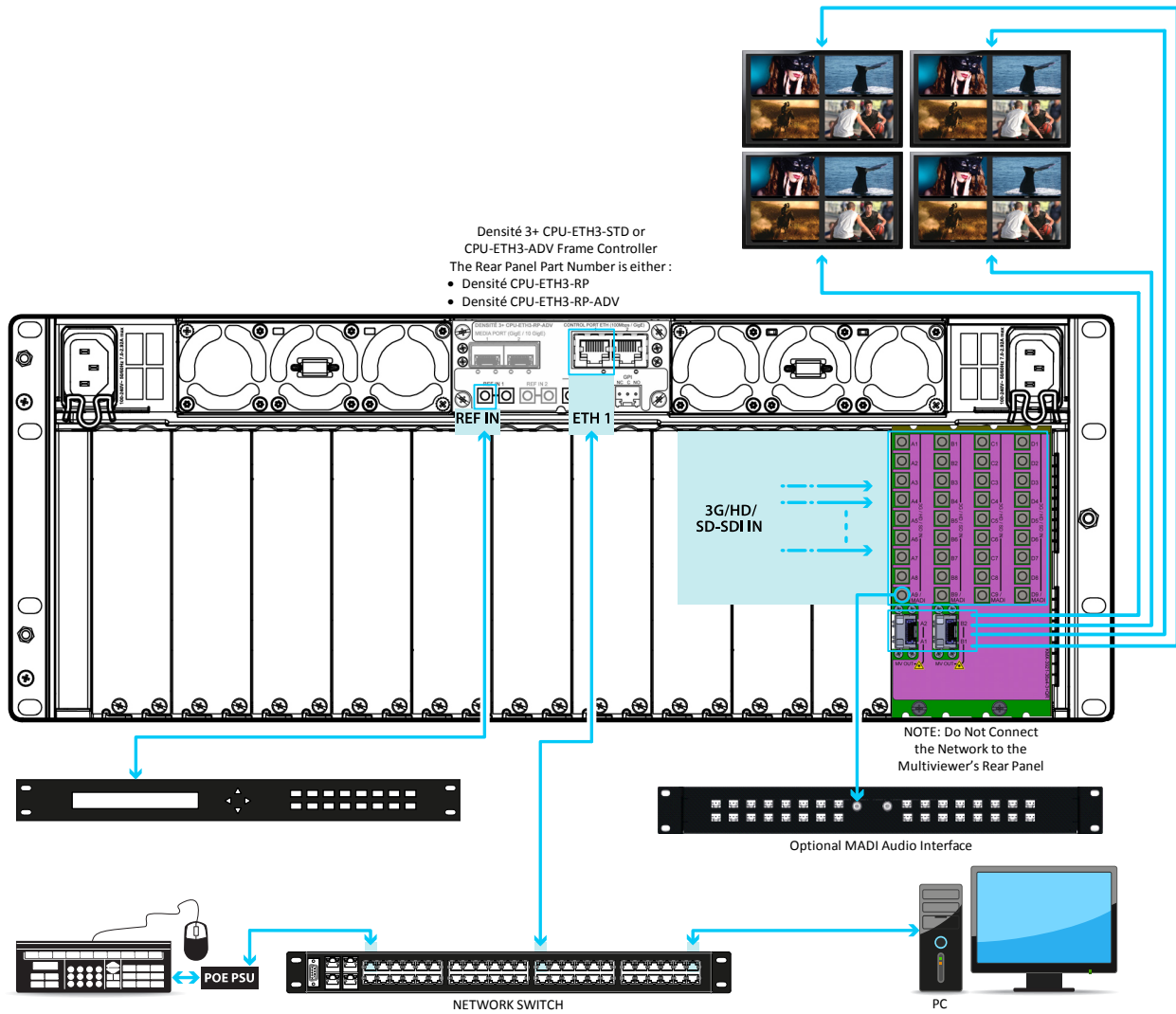


Cabling diagram for a KMX-3921 9 X 2 multiviewer installed in a Densité 3+ FR1 frame

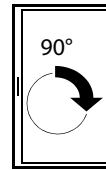

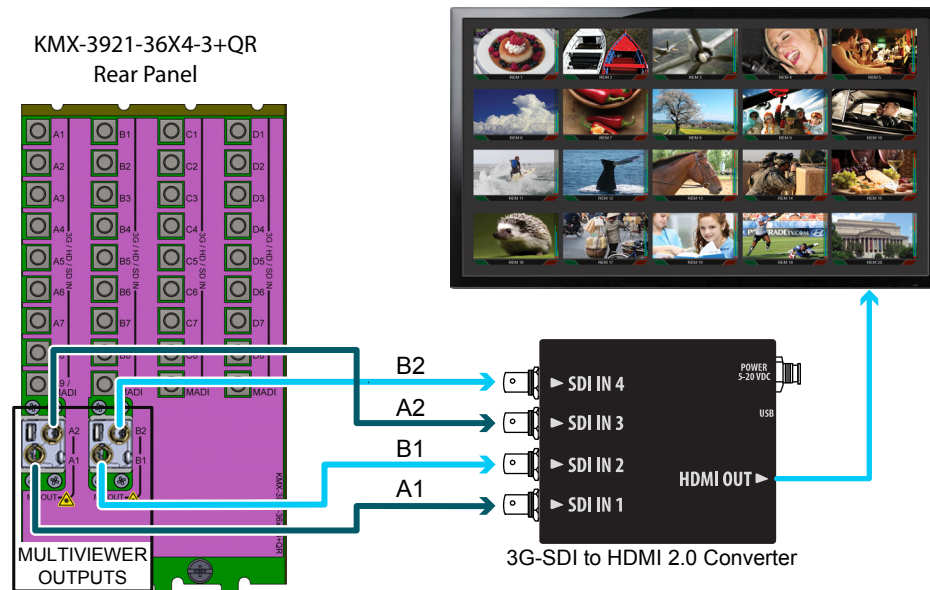

## About HDMI-Type Signal Connections

HDMI-type multiviewer outputs are compatible with HDMI cables and display devices with HDMI-compliant inputs. The performance of HDMI cables has been standardized for each generation of supported technology by using a version number. The multiviewer requires the minimum cable version as shown below.

## Avoiding Networked Equipment IP Address Conflicts

Networked equipment that use the same IP address (have a network IP address conflict) will not be able to communicate on the network. When the multiviewer and its networked ancillary equipment (for example, a RCP-200) are powered up for the first time, the equipment uses factory default IP addresses to communicate on the network (see [Factory-Default IP Addresses](#), on page 49). This could knock-out other equipment on the network should that equipment currently use the same IP address.

To avoid this situation, proceed as follows.

- 1 Before installing any KMX-3921 cards into the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame, or power up any ancillary equipment, you will need to first temporarily disconnect this equipment from the network switch:
  - disconnect the *Control Port ETH 1/2* Ethernet cables from the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame.
  - disconnect the Ethernet cable from the multiviewer's rear panel.
  - disconnect the Ethernet cables from the Kaleido-RCP2 PoE adapter or RCP-200, when equipped.

- 2 Insert the KMX-3921 card(s) into the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame (see [Installation of the KMX-3921 in a Densité 3+ Frame](#), on page 30) and verify that each card is securely seated in its slot.

The multiviewer starts up. The startup sequence takes approximately four minutes, during which time every card's status LED is blinking orange.

Once the startup has completed, the status LEDs on the *output cards* should be green (steady).

---

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# 4 Frame Operation and IP Network Setup

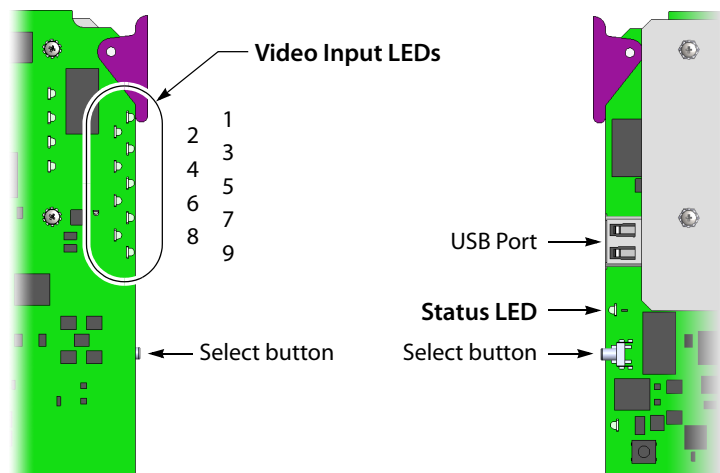
This chapter shows the multiviewer interfaces, explains the local operations that can be performed, and it explains how to implement IP network connectivity with the multiviewer.

A KMX-3921 multiviewer system can be controlled in the following ways:

- In the housing frame, the card-edge LEDs can be enabled to allow you to monitor the KMX-3921 card input's operating status (see [Card Interface and Troubleshooting](#), on page 52), or use the CPU-ETH3 local control panel and its buttons to navigate menus and adjust parameter values (see [Using the Frame Control Panel](#), on page 53).
- The loading and management of layouts is handled through XEdit, accessed through an Ethernet connection.
- Grass Valley's iControl system can be used to access the card's operating parameters from a remote computer, using a convenient graphical user interface (see [Remote Control Using iControl](#), on page 98).
- A GPI interface can be used to remotely control layout selection. See *GPI-1501 General Purpose Interface I/O Module* in the Kaleido Software User's Guide. See [Related Documentation](#), on page 11.
- The mosaic output resolution of the card can be controlled automatically through the EDID interface with the display.
- The RCP-200 advanced remote control panel, and the Kaleido-RCP2 control panel allow you to perform operations on the monitor wall, either by themselves or in association with an external keyboard and a mouse. Refer to the RCP-200, Kaleido-RCP2, and Kaleido Software documentation. See [Related Documentation](#), on page 11.
- The KMX-3921 multiviewer can be controlled as a router by router control systems which can trigger actions on this multiviewer. See the *Routers & Kaleido Multiviewer* chapter in the Kaleido Software User's Guide. See [Related Documentation](#), on page 11.

## Card Interface and Troubleshooting

The front card edges of the KMX-3921 incorporate several operational elements shown below.

The status LED shows the card's current operating status. During operation, the cards' Status LED should be green.

Under normal operation, the Video Input LEDs are silenced. To make the Video Input LEDs operational, press the Select button on the front edge of a KMX-3921 card. Video Input LEDs for the corresponding video inputs that have been assigned a valid video signal should be green.

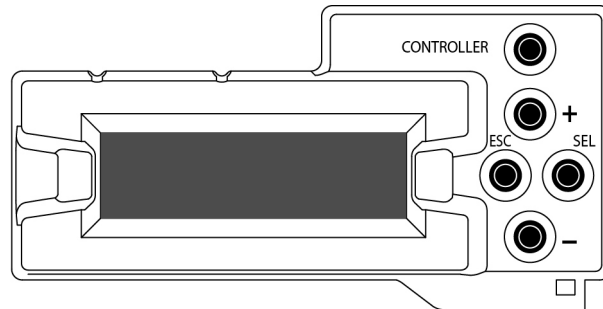

## Using the Frame Control Panel

All of the cards installed in a Densité 3+ FR1 or Densité 3+ FR4 frame are connected to the frame's controller card, which handles all interaction between the cards and the outside world. There are no operating controls located on the cards themselves. The controller supports remote operation via its Ethernet ports, and local operation using its integrated control panel.

### CPU-ETH2 Local Control Panel

In the case of a Densité 3+ FR1 frame, the local control panel is fastened to the CPU-ETH2 controller card, and consists of a display unit capable of displaying two lines of text, each 16 characters in length, and five buttons.



*CPU-ETH2 local control panel*

The panel is assigned to operate any card in the frame by pressing the Select button *on the front edge of that card*. The Status LED on the selected card will then be flashing orange.

Press the CONTROLLER button on the control panel to select the controller card itself.

### CPU-ETH3 Local Control Panel

The CPU-ETH3 local control panel is located in the top right side of the Densité 3+ FR4 frame. The control interface is a touch screen that allows you to view the status of Densité 3+ FR4 frame components including that of each card currently installed in the 24 slots. A number of buttons (PS1, PS2, FANs, CTRL, and REF) allow you to access the menus for the Densité 3+ FR4 frame components including its reference module. The outline color of the buttons behave like status indicators. For example, in the image below, the card in slot 13 is in alarm.



CPU-ETH3 local control panel - Top Menu

Once a card has been selected, four virtual navigation buttons (SEL, ESC, [+], and [-]) allow you to navigate through menus to view and configure the card's parameters.



CPU-ETH3 local control panel

The panel is assigned to operate any card in the frame by pressing the icon representing the appropriate card on the Densité 3+ FR4 frame's local control panel touch display. Alternatively, pressing the status button on the front edge of a card will also bring up the menu. The Status LED on the selected card becomes flashing orange.

Touch the CTRL button on the control panel to select the Densité 3+ FR4 frame's controller card itself.

## Navigating the Local Control Panel Menu

The KMX-3921 has operating parameters which may be adjusted locally at the controller card interface. Press the Select button on the front edge of a KMX-3921 card to assign the local control panel to operate the card.

The local control panel displays a menu that can be navigated using the four buttons located next to the display. The functionality of the buttons is as follows:

[+] and [-] Used for menu navigation and value modification.

**SEL** Gives access to the next menu level. When a parameter value is shown, touching this button once enables modification of the value using the [+] and [-] buttons; pressing a second time confirms the new value.

**ESC** Cancels the effect of parameter value changes that have not been confirmed; touching ESC causes the parameter to revert to its former value.  
Touching ESC moves the user back up to the previous menu level. At the main menu, ESC does not exit the menu system. To exit, press the Select button on the front edge of the card being controlled.

If no controls are operated for 30 seconds, the controller reverts to its normal standby status, and the selected card's Status LED reverts to its normal operating mode. If a



The Status LED on the selected card flashes orange, and the associated local menu and navigation controls appear on the frame's control panel touch display.

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**Note:** You can navigate the menu by using the four virtual buttons on the touch display:

- Touch the [+] and [-] buttons, to navigate between menu options or between parameter values.
  - Touch SEL to access the next menu level. When a parameter value is shown on the display, modify the value by using the [+] and [-] buttons, and then touch SEL to apply the new value.
  - Touch ESC to go back to the previous menu level.
  - Once you have completed your changes, press the Select button *on the front edge of the KMX-3921 card* to exit the control menu.
- 

- 2 On the local control panel, touch the [-] button, until RESOLUTION appears on the display.
- 3 Touch the SEL button.  
HEAD 1 appears on the control panel's touch display.
- 4 Touch the SEL button again.
- 5 The current resolution for the display that is connected to the to the card's output head 1 (for example, through the SFP1 or SFP A1 connector) appears on the display.
- 6 Touch the [+] and [-] buttons, to navigate to a suitable output resolution for your display.
- 7 Touch SEL to apply the value shown on the display.  
The selected resolution is applied to the display.
- 8 Touch ESC to return to the previous level in the local control menu.  
HEAD 1 appears again on the display.
- 9 If you want to change the resolution on the second display (if available), then touch the [-] button.  
HEAD 2 appears on the display and you can repeat [step 4](#) to [step 8](#) above to verify or configure the resolution of the display that is connected to the card's output head 2 (for example, through the SFP2 or SFP A2 connector).
- 10 When you are satisfied with the selected output resolution settings, press the Select button *on the front edge of the KMX-3921 card* to exit the control menu.

---

#### Notes

- If you do not touch any button on the frame local control panel, the CPU-ETH2 / CPU-ETH3 controller will revert to its normal standby mode, and the selected card's Status LED will revert to its normal operating mode, after 30 seconds.
  - If you changed a parameter from the card's control menu, but have not applied your change (you did not touch the SEL button on the local control panel), once the 30-second timeout has occurred, the parameters will be confirmed as if you had touched the SEL button.
-

## Enabling the Frame Controller's Automatic Restore Feature

The frame's ETH2 or ETH3 controller can backup a card's configuration parameters and the card's data base. When this feature is enabled, the card's configuration will be preserved when the card is swapped-out with a new card of the same type.

To activate this feature, refer to the frame's documentation. See *Data Restoration* in the *Densité 3+ FR1 1RU Housing Frame for Densité Modular Products User Manual* or in the *Densité 3+ FR4 Housing Frame User Manual*. See [Related Documentation](#), on page 11.

## Networking Essentials

The following network prerequisites must be met:

- Any multiviewer you wish to configure or access by using XEdit or XAdmin must be connected to an Ethernet switch. See [Cabling Diagrams](#), on page 39 and [Multiviewer Network Connections](#), on page 42.
- A client workstation must be connected to the LAN or Ethernet switch to access the multiviewer by using XAdmin or XEdit.
- The Ethernet switch must support 100 Mbps full-duplex connections.
- The port on the Ethernet switch to which the multiviewer is connected should be configured to auto-negotiate. By default, multiviewers have their Ethernet ports set to auto-negotiate.

If a switch does not support auto-negotiation, the recommended settings to be made on both the multiviewer and the Ethernet switch are 100 Mbps, full-duplex.

---

### IMPORTANT

There is a risk that the Ethernet connection to the multiviewer will fail if the multiviewer's Ethernet port's configuration is not the same as the Ethernet switch's configuration to which the multiviewer is connected, and the switch or multiviewer reboots.

---

## Setting the Multiviewer's IP addresses

For the KMX-3921 multiviewer to join a TCP/IP network, it must be configured with a system IP address, a network mask, a gateway, and a system name. You may also need to configure networking parameters for the CPU-ETH3 frame controllers (if your housing frames were not already in operation), any new Kaleido-RCP2 unit you ordered, and a client PC to communicate with the multiviewer and its peripheral devices (see [XEdit Installation](#), on page 67).

---

**Note:** If the system IP address of the multiviewer has been changed (that is, it no longer corresponds to the as-shipped configuration), it is still possible to determine the current setting; see [Finding the Multiviewer's IP Address and Application Version](#), on page 128.

---

## Network Switch Considerations

The Densité 3+ FR4 frame's **ETH** Ethernet connection can present to the connected network switch more than one MAC address as Densité 3+ FR4 has an internal switch that aggregates multiple network interfaces for the frame itself and that of certain cards or systems installed in the frame such as any KMX-3921 cards in a multiviewer system. Each KMX-3921 multiviewer system (as defined by each installed KMX-3921 rear panel) has its own MAC address.

By default, many network switches support only one MAC address to be connected to an individual switch's network port. This is done for security reasons to prevent people from extending the reach of the network by connecting unauthorized equipment to the network.

In cases where a Densité 3+ FR4 frame is connected to a network switch with such security enabled, network connectivity to all Densité 3+ FR4 frame components will be impossible. With administrative access to the switch, the solution is to increase the switch's setting for the number of MAC addresses it will support on the port used for the Densité 3+ FR4 frame to a number that reflects the current number of network interfaces used within Densité 3+ FR4. If the required number of network interfaces is undetermined, set the switch to allow 21 network interfaces for the Densité 3+ FR4 as this is the maximum number of network interfaces a Densité 3+ FR4 frame can support. Refer to the switch's administrator's guide for the appropriate configuration instructions.

For example, for a Cisco brand switch, use the following administrative command to increase the number of supported IP interfaces on a port to 21.

```
Switch(config-if)# switchport port-security maximum 21
```

- 1 Press the icon representing the appropriate card on the Densité 3+ FR4 frame's local control panel touch display or press the Select button on the front edge of the card you want to configure on the Densité 3+ FR1 frame's local control panel

**Note:** You can configure a KMX-3921 system's network settings from any multiviewer card in a multi-card system (for example, cards A, B, C, and so on). These settings are automatically replicated to all other multiviewer cards. For more information about the location of multiviewer cards in the frame (cards A, B, C, and so on), see [Installation of the KMX-3921 in a Densité 3+ Frame](#), on page 30.

---

The Status LED on the selected card flashes orange, and the associated control menu appears on the display of the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame's local control panel.

---

**Note:** You can navigate the menu by using the four buttons on the display:

- Touch the [+] and [-] buttons, to navigate between menu options or between parameter values.
  - Touch SEL to access the next menu level. When a parameter value is shown on the display, modify the value by using the [+] and [-] buttons, and then touch SEL to apply the new value.
  - Touch ESC to go back to the previous menu level.
  - Once you have completed your changes, press the Select button *on the front edge of the KMX-3921 card* to exit the control menu.
- 

- 2 On the local control panel, touch the [-] button repeatedly until NETWORK SETTINGS appears on the display, and then touch the SEL button.  
SYSTEM IP EDIT appears on the control panel's display.

- 3 Touch the SEL button again.

The current IP address appears on the display.

- Touch the [+] and [-] buttons, to change the current value at the current input position.
- Touch SEL to move one position to the right.
- Touch ESC to move one position to the left.

---

**Note:** Touching ESC when the input focus is in the first position returns to the previous menu level.

---

- 4 When the display shows the correct IP address, touch SEL to apply your change.

- 5 Touch ESC to return to the previous menu level.

SYSTEM IP EDIT appears on the control panel's display.

- 6 Touch the [-] button.

NETMASK EDIT appears on the control panel's display.

- 7 Repeat [step 3](#) to [step 5](#) to configure the netmask.

- 8 Once you have set the network mask and navigated back to the previous menu level, touch the [-] button again.

DEFAULT GW EDIT appears on the control panel's display.

- 9 Repeat [step 3](#) to [step 5](#) to configure the gateway.
- 10 Once you have set the gateway, press the Select button on the front edge of the KMX-3921 card to exit the control menu.

---

#### Notes

- If you do not touch any button on the Densité 3+ FR4 frame local control panel, the CPU-ETH2 / CPU-ETH3 controller will revert to its normal standby mode, and the selected card's Status LED will revert to its normal operating mode, after 30 seconds.
  - If you changed a parameter from the card's control menu, but have not applied your change (you did not touch the SEL button on the local control panel), once the 30-second timeout has occurred, the parameters will be confirmed as if you had touched the SEL button.
- 

The card restarts. The startup sequence takes approximately two minutes, during which time the Status LED is flashing orange. Once the startup has completed, the Status LED should be green.

- 11 Check the card's Status LED, and make sure that it does not indicate an error condition. See [Card Interface and Troubleshooting](#), on page 52.
- 12 Verify that the new IP address is effective, by referring to [Finding the Multiviewer's IP Address and Application Version](#), on page 128. Perform this verification for all the cards that are connected to your system's rear module.

## Network Considerations

### TCP/UDP Port Usage

The various KMX-3921 communication protocols require access to specific ports. In networks where a firewall is present between device A and device B, the ports used to communicate **from** device A **to** device B must be open on the incoming (external) side of the firewall.

**Note:** All necessary ports are open by default on the multiviewer. There is no mechanism provided for changing the default settings.

## Network Considerations for a Multiviewer Cluster

---

### IMPORTANT

**Before changing the system name or IP address of a multiviewer associated with a cluster, review the following.**

---

- If you change the system name or IP address of a cluster member while another cluster member is offline or otherwise unavailable, the cluster's integrity will be broken. If you attempt to make such a change, XEdit will alert you of the situation, prompting you to cancel the operation and try again later, when all cluster members are available. However, in the advent that such a change was made by mistake, or that it as been forced for some reason, you will have to repair the broken cluster (see "Repairing a Cluster System" in the Kaleido Software User's Manual).
- To maintain the integrity of a cluster configuration, such changes must be made by using the system configuration features available in XAdmin.

# 5 System Configuration

This chapter shows how to configure the multiviewer.

## System Requirements for a Client PC

A client PC or laptop meeting the following requirements is required to access the XAdmin Web client, and the other Kaleido Software client applications.

Operating system	Microsoft Windows 10, Windows 8.1, Windows 8, or Windows 7.
Processor	The minimum required by the operating system or better.
Memory	The minimum required by the operating system plus 2 GB or more.
Disk space	The minimum required by the operating system plus 2 GB or more.

## Frame Configuration Prerequisites

The multiviewer communicates with the frame, and it relies on certain information from the frame in order to correctly function. Before configuring the multiviewer, the following frame configuration parameters must be set.

- The Densité 3+ frame's network configuration.
- The Densité 3+ frame's date and time settings or the Network Time Protocol (NTP) settings.
- Frame reference configuration if the multiviewer's output is to be referenced.

## XEdit Installation

### Installing the Kaleido Software Client Applications

In addition to the XAdmin Web client, which does not require installation, the Kaleido Software includes the following client applications:

- XEdit is a client application used to create layouts for the monitor wall, and to configure your multiviewer system, from your PC. When this PC has network connectivity to the multiviewer, you can use XEdit to modify layouts and settings directly on the multiviewer, or you can work locally on the computer and then export your changes to the multiviewer.
- If you have only one multiviewer (or if you have more than one but you intend to always have the same Kaleido Software version on all of them), download the XEdit installer file from the multiviewer's home page. Whenever you install a new version of the Kaleido Software on the multiviewer, the next time you open XEdit, your copy of the application will be automatically updated from the multiviewer. See [Installing XEdit from your Multiviewer's Home Page](#) on page 67.
- The Router Control Software Single Bus and Matrix View applications (also part of the iRouter Router Control Software packaged with iControl Application Servers) can be used to control your multiviewer's logical sources and monitor wall destinations, via the *KX Router* logical router, or to control other logical routers configured within your multiviewer system. 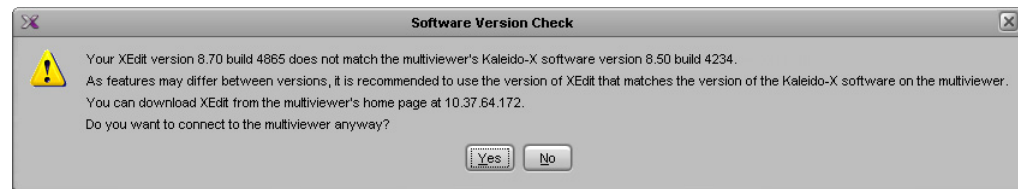
### Connecting to a Multiviewer with a Different XEdit Version from your PC's Version

When connecting to a multiviewer with your PC and your PC already has XEdit installed, the XEdit version installed on your PC and the Kaleido Software version on the multiviewer must be same as explained below.

The composition of a Kaleido Software / XEdit version numbering is explained in the following table.

Kaleido Software / XEdit Version Reference	Description
Version <i>M.m.p</i>	<b>M</b> is the major revision number <b>m</b> is the minor revision number <b>p</b> is the patch revision number

When you connect to a multiviewer, the multiviewer's Kaleido Software major and minor version must match the XEdit major and minor version installed on your PC. When there is a version number mismatch between the multiviewer's Kaleido Software version and your PC's XEdit version, you will receive the following error when you try to connect to the multiviewer with your PC.



Under this circumstance, proceed as follows.

- There is no compatibility problem if only the patch revision number is different between the Kaleido Software version on the multiviewer and the XEdit version on your PC. Click **Yes** to the Software Version Check screen.
- There is a compatibility problem if the major version, minor version, or both are different between the Kaleido Software version on the multiviewer and the XEdit version on your PC. The solution is to downgrade / upgrade the XEdit version used on your PC to the Kaleido Software version used by the multiviewer. Proceed as follows:
  - Click **No** to the Software Version Check screen.
  - Uninstall XEdit from your PC (see [Uninstalling XEdit](#), on page 71).
  - Install XEdit from the multiviewer (see [Installing XEdit from your Multiviewer's Home Page](#), on page 67).

If you regularly connect to different multiviewer systems that use different Kaleido Software versions, and as a result you receive the Software Version Check error message, the best solution to avoid this is to upgrade all of your multiviewer systems to the same Kaleido Software version.

The first time you try to access XAdmin in Internet Explorer or Chrome, the browser may prompt you to confirm the multiviewer's security credentials.

#### To register your multiviewer's security credentials with Internet Explorer

- 1 Click **Continue to this website (not recommended)**.

The address bar now indicates the certificate error.

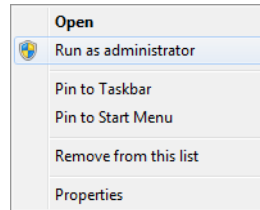

## Enabling the Compatibility View in Internet Explorer

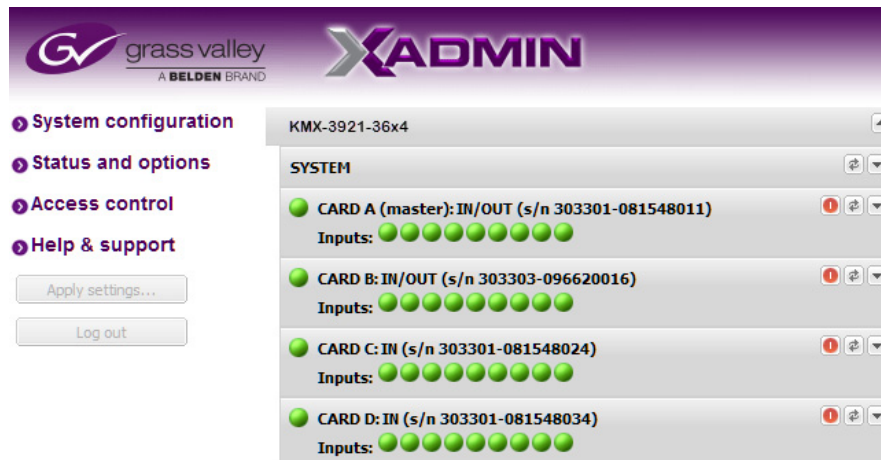
When you try to access XAdmin, from your multiviewer's home page, in *Internet Explorer 8, 9, or 10*, you may see a blank page instead of XAdmin's Status and Options page.<sup>5</sup>

To enable the compatibility view for your multiviewer's XAdmin Web client

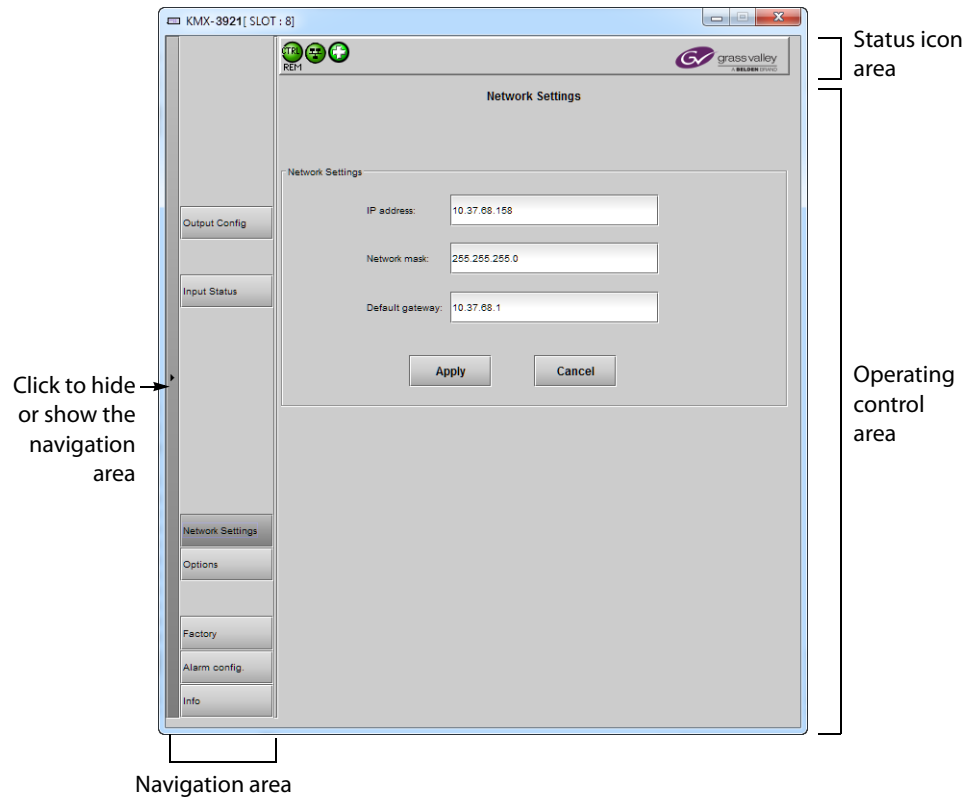

The possible values for this contribution are related to the Overall alarm contribution:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If the Overall alarm contribution is selected as Disabled, the GSM alarm contribution can be set to any available value</li> <li>• If the Overall alarm contribution is selected as any level other than disabled, the GSM contribution is forced to follow the Overall Alarm.</li> </ul>
Log Events	iControl maintains a log of alarm events associated with the card. The log is useful for troubleshooting and identifying event sequences. Click in the checkbox to enable logging of alarm events for each individual alarm.

## Genlocking the Multiviewer

A multiviewer must be referenced for any of the following reasons:

- the multiviewer must be genlocked with other plant equipment
- if minimal processing delay is required for your monitoring purposes

Otherwise, referencing the multiviewer is optional.

### Genlocking a Densité 3+ FR1 Frame

To genlock the multiviewer with other plant equipment, a reference signal is required. For this, certain requirements must be met.

- The Densité CPU-ETH2 Enhanced Ethernet Controller Card used in the Densité 3+ FR1 frame housing the multiviewer must use firmware version 2.0.4 or higher. A controller with an earlier version of the firmware cannot provide a time reference to a multiviewer card.
- If the time reference signal is provided by a Densité REF-1801 HD/SD Frame Reference Module, this module must be configured as follows:
  - An input reference signal must be connected to the BNC marked REF on the REF-1801's rear panel.
  - The LTC source must be locked to the same reference signal.
  - The *reference source* must be set to **External** (either from the card's REFERENCE menu or, in iControl, from the **Input** tab on the control panel for this card).
  - In the case of a non-standard time code (for example, a count down time code, or a time code that includes user bits with date information), the *time code processing* mode must be set to **Pass through** (either from the card's REFERENCE menu or, in iControl, from the **Input** tab on the control panel for this card). The pass through mode is available as of version 1.10 of the REF-1801 firmware.
  - The *URS generation mode* must be set to **Normal** (either from the card's REFERENCE menu or, in iControl, from the **Mode** tab on the control panel for this card).

---

#### Notes

- If the REF-1801 is configured properly, the Status LED on the front of the card will be green. Improper configuration results in periodical time code glitches. Refer to the REF-1801 HD/SD Frame Reference Module Guide to Installation and Operation. See [Related Documentation](#), on page 11.
  - Using an LTC count down time code as the reference for a count up timer is not supported.
- 

### Guidelines for Understanding the Multiviewer's Mosaic Output Refresh Rate

When referencing the frame, the following guidelines apply:

- All multiviewer mosaic outputs support only one refresh rate (50 Hz or 59.94 Hz) at one time.
- Reference frequency settings made in the Densité 3+ FR1 frame have priority over settings made for a display in XEdit. For example, if the frame only has been configured

for a 50 Hz reference, then all multiviewer outputs will have a 50 Hz refresh rate, regardless of any refresh rate setting made in XEdit.

## Genlocking a Densité 3+ FR4 Frame

To reference a KMX-3921 multiviewer system, use the frame's internal reference:

- In the case of a Densité 3+ FR4 frame, this is done by connecting the Densité CPU-ETH3 frame controller to the external house reference in every Densité 3+ FR4 frame that contains KMX-3921 rear panels. The Densité CPU-ETH3 frame controller will distribute the reference to all cards in the frame internally through the URS on the frame midplane. The following conditions must be met:
  - reference input 2 must be disabled.
  - the reference source must be a blackburst or tri-level sync signal.
  - In the Densité REF-1801 HD/SD Frame Reference Module configuration, the *URS generation mode* must be set to **Normal** (either from the card's REFERENCE menu or, in iControl, from the **Mode** tab on the control panel for this card).
- In the case of a Densité 3+ FR4 frame equipped with a Densité CPU-ETH3 Advanced Ethernet Controller Card, use Precision Time Protocol (PTP). See *PTP* in the Densité 3+ FR4 documentation: *Densité 3+ FR4 Housing Frame User Manual*. See [Related Documentation](#), on page 11. To identify a Densité 3+ FR4 frame's controller model, see [How to Identify a Densité 3+ FR4 Frame's Controller Model](#), on page 22.

For a time code input, use the KMX-3901-IN input card's LTC input. See [Using a REF-1801 Card's LTC Time Code Input](#), below.

## Guidelines for Understanding the Multiviewer's Mosaic Output Refresh Rate

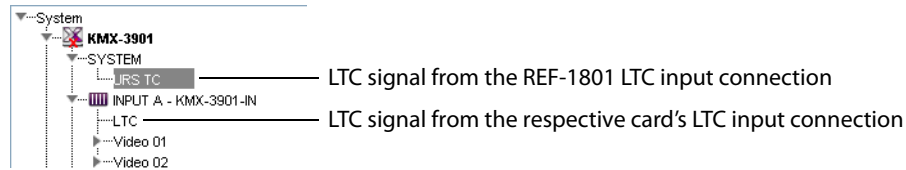
When referencing the frame, the following guidelines apply:

- All multiviewer mosaic outputs support only one refresh rate (50 Hz or 59.94 Hz) at one time.
- Reference frequency settings made in the Densité 3+ FR4 frame have priority over settings made for a display in XEdit. For example, if the frame only has been configured for a 50 Hz reference, then all multiviewer outputs will have a 50 Hz refresh rate, regardless of any refresh rate setting made in XEdit.
- In the case of a Densité 3+ FR4 frame equipped with a Densité CPU-ETH3 Advanced Ethernet Controller Card, if the reference setting made in the Densité 3+ FR4 frame is **REF-1 & REF-2** where REF-1 and REF-2 inputs are different frequencies (for example, REF-1 input is connected to a 50 Hz reference and REF-2 input is connected to a 59.94 Hz reference), then in XEdit, the refresh rate of the display chosen for **Card A, Head1** in **Rooms** will be used to set the refresh rate of all multiviewer output heads. Any refresh rate for a display that is different from that chosen for **Card A, Head1** will be ignored.

## Using a REF-1801 Card's LTC Time Code Input

Multiple distinct LTC signals can be used in the multiviewer. In XEdit, the LTC inputs are found under the **Channels/Sources** tab in the System hierarchical list.

The LTC input available under **System** is the LTC input signal connected to the **LTC IN** input found on the REF-1801's rear panel, when equipped. The LTC input available under an input card is the LTC input signal connected to that card's **LTC IN** input.



In the case where the frames are equipped with the REF-1801 card option, connect the LTC signal to the **LTC IN** input found on the REF-1801's rear panel. For this specific LTC Time Code Input to work with the multiviewer, certain requirements must be met.

- In the case of a non-standard time code (for example, a count down time code, or a time code that includes user bits with date information), the *time code processing* mode must be set to **Pass through** (either from the card's REFERENCE menu or, in iControl, from the **Input** tab on the control panel for this card). The pass through mode is available as of version 1.10 of the REF-1801 firmware.
- Using an LTC count down time code as the reference for a count up timer is not supported.
- The *reference source* must be set to **External** (either from the card's REFERENCE menu or, in iControl, from the **Input** tab on the control panel for this card).

## Configuring the RCP-200

The RCP-200 is shipped with an IP address of 10.0.3.200. On installation, you should consult your system administrator and replace this address with an appropriate address for your local network configuration (see [Configuring the RCP-200's IP settings](#) on page 115). Once your RCP-200 has an active connection to the network, you must then register the multiviewers you want to operate from the RCP-200 (see [Specifying multiviewers for the RCP-200](#) on page 115), and their respective *KX Router* logical routers (see [Specifying lookup servers for the RCP-200](#) on page 115). Once this is completed, you will be able to control the monitor wall from the RCP-200 (see [Logging on to the RCP-200](#) on page 116).

### Configuring the RCP-200's IP settings

#### To assign an IP address to the RCP-200

- 1 Press the CONFIG button, located between the two screens on the front of the RCP-200.
- 2 Touch the COMM category at the top of the right-hand screen.
- 3 Touch the ETHERNET tab on the right-hand screen.
- 4 In the SELECT area, rotate the left most control knob to select IP ADDRESS.
- 5 Use the four control knobs in the CHANGE area to set the new address.  
The current address is displayed in the CURRENT box for reference, and the new address you are setting appears in the MODIFIED box, as well as at the controls.
- 6 Press the SAVE control knob to store the new address.
- 7 Repeat from [step 4](#) to configure the NETWORK MASK and GATEWAY settings.
- 8 Press the RESTART control knob to apply the changes.  
The panel will go dark for about 15 seconds before the startup screens appear.

### Specifying multiviewers for the RCP-200

#### To specify a multiviewer for the RCP-200

- 1 Press the CONFIG button, located between the two screens on the front of the RCP-200.
- 2 Touch the COMM category on the right-hand screen.
- 3 Touch the KALEIDO DISCOVERY tab on the right-hand screen.
- 4 Use the four control knobs in the ADD TO LIST area to dial in the IP address of the multiviewer you want to operate.  
The address appears in the TO ADD box.
- 5 Press the ADD control knob.  
The multiviewer's IP address appears in the LOOKUP LIST area.
- 6 Press the CONFIG button, located between the two screens on the front of the RCP-200 to end the configuration process and return to normal operation.

### Specifying lookup servers for the RCP-200

The RCP-200 needs to connect to a lookup server in order to control devices, including a multiviewer's *KX router* logical router.

### To specify a lookup server for the RCP-200

- 1 Press the CONFIG button, located between the two screens on the front of the RCP-200.
- 2 Touch the COMM category on the right-hand screen.
- 3 Touch the DISCOVERY tab on the right-hand screen.
- 4 Use the four control knobs in the ADD TO LIST area to dial in the IP address of the multiviewer you want to operate.  
The address appears in the TO ADD box.
- 5 Press the ADD control knob.  
The multiviewer's IP address appears in the LOOKUP LIST area.
- 6 Press the CONFIG button, located between the two screens on the front of the RCP-200 to end the configuration process and return to normal operation.

## Logging on to the RCP-200

### To log on to a Multiviewer's room from the RCP-200

- 1 On an RCP-200 with an active connection to the network, press the LIST button.  
All devices, and multiviewer's rooms, detected by the RCP-200 appear on the left screen. Multiviewer rooms are listed in the form [multiviewer name]\[room name].  
If a room belongs to a cluster system, its name appears once for each of the member multiviewers (e.g., if two multiviewers, KX1 and KX2, are configured as a cluster, and ROOM1 includes displays fed by both multiviewers, then both KX1\ROOM1 and KX2\ROOM1 will be listed. To determine the one you should select, review the following:
  - Has the RCP user configuration you want to use been replicated on every member of the cluster? RCP Users are not automatically propagated to all multiviewers. Before a user can log on to a room associated with a cluster system, the corresponding RCP user configuration must be manually replicated on all member multiviewers across the cluster. See *Managing RCP Users* in the Kaleido Software User Guide.
  - Do you need to control an external router whose configuration is available only from one or some specific members of the cluster?
  - Does your system configuration include actions that were configured only on one or some specific members of the cluster?If any of the above elements is available only from one or some specific members, then make sure you select the room name prefixed with the appropriate multiviewer name.
- 2 Touch the room you want to access (press the DOWN or UP soft keys to scroll the list as needed).  
The list of users assigned to this room appears on the right-hand screen.
- 3 Touch the user name under which you want to log on, enter your password, and then touch LOG IN.

---

**Note:** By default, the user "Admin" has no password.

---

The following message appears on the right-hand screen: PLEASE SELECT A ROUTER FROM THE LEFT-HAND SCREEN, prefixed with the name of the multiviewer that



appeared before the room name you selected in [step 2](#).

- 4 In the list on the left-hand screen, touch the *KX Router* logical router associated with the same multiviewer (you can see the multiviewer name, its IP address, and the size of that particular KX Router).
- 5 Touch the Video level, in the area to the right of the router list, if it is not selected already, and then push SELECT.

The room's monitor wall control panel appears on the right-hand screen, with the ASSIGN CHANNEL category selected. If a mouse is connected to the RCP-200, then after touching WALL MOUSE you should be able to see and move the mouse pointer on the monitor wall.

- If the room you selected belongs to a *cluster* system, rotate the HEAD knob (or touch the DISPLAY SELECT category) to display a head view from a different member of the cluster, and then touch a monitor.

The ROUTER SELECT category becomes selected instead of ASSIGN CHANNEL, and the right-hand screen shows the message prompting you to select a router from the left-hand screen, prefixed with the name of the multiviewer, which means that you still need to complete the correlation between some monitor wall destinations and the representation of the KX Router logical router for this multiviewer. See [Correlating Monitor Wall Destinations and KX Router Logical Routers for the RCP-200](#) on page 117. If you need to connect to a different instance of the same room then you will have to establish the correlation again, to be able to operate the monitor wall from the different context.

---

#### Notes

- The RCP-200 will remember your user credentials until you log out explicitly (by touching LOG OUT at the upper-right corner of the control panel).
  - The pointer may flicker when two RCP users access displays fed by the same multiviewer output.
  - Two users accessing the same display will be limited to sharing a single pointer.
-

## Correlating Monitor Wall Destinations and KX Router Logical Routers for the RCP-200

To operate the monitor wall from the RCP-200's category/index router view, your system must have been configured to be controlled as a router. In a layout, the RCP-200 can only control monitors that have been assigned a monitor wall destination. The first time you log on to a room from the RCP-200, you will be prompted to select a router from the left-hand screen. By selecting the appropriate KX Router logical router, you will establish the correlation between your multiviewer's monitor wall destinations and the RCP-200's representation of the multiviewer's *KX Router* logical router. In the case of a cluster system, you will also be prompted to select a router, the first time to try to assign a source to a monitor located in a part of the layout that belongs to a different member of the cluster. You only need to do this once, for every multiviewer that is part of a cluster.

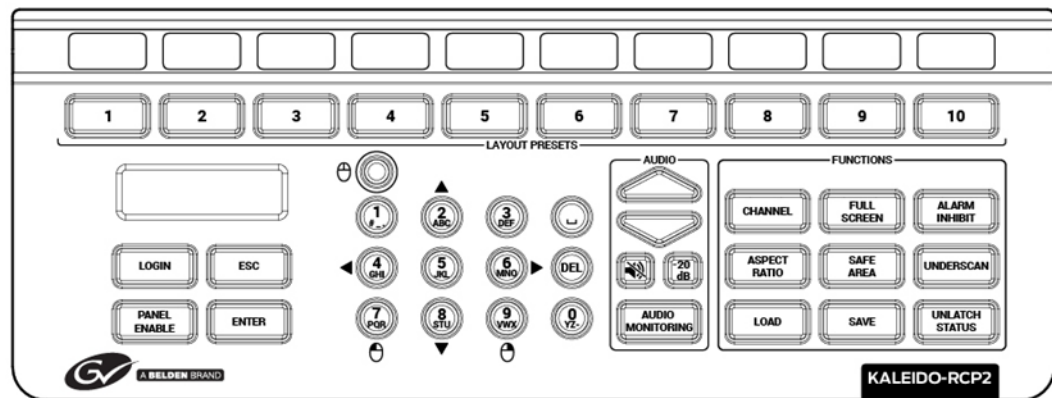
**To correlate a monitor wall destination in a layout and the corresponding KX Router logical router**

- 1 In the list on the left-hand screen, touch the *KX Router* logical router associated with the multiviewer whose name was indicated in the message prompting to select a router (you can see the multiviewer name, its IP address, and the size of that particular KX Router).
- 2 Touch the Video level, in the area to the right of the router list, if it is not selected already, and then push SELECT.

The RCP-200 will remember the association with the KX Router logical router's destinations for the current multiviewer's monitor wall destinations.

## Configuring the Kaleido-RCP2

The Kaleido-RCP2 is a multi-function remote control panel designed for use with Kaleido multiviewers. Ethernet connectivity allows multiple RCP users to access multiple Kaleido Multiviewer systems, allowing convenient access to the real-time operating features. When logged on to a Kaleido multiviewer via its Ethernet connection, the RCP user can control various operating features.



Before you can use the Kaleido-RCP2 to operate your Kaleido Multiviewer, you must set up the Ethernet connection between the two devices. By default, the Kaleido-RCP2 is shipped with DHCP enabled, so it will automatically be assigned an IP address by a DHCP server. If no DHCP server is present on the network, the Kaleido-RCP2 will default to the static IP address 10.0.3.191.

### Notes

- The Kaleido-RCP2 is powered through the RJ45 Ethernet connector. There is no power ON/OFF button, so the device is ON whenever a powered Ethernet cable is connected.
- If you purchased more than one Kaleido-RCP2 units, keep in mind that they all ship with the same default static IP address. Make sure to assign them different static IP addresses before connecting them to the network if DHCP is not used. See the Kaleido-RCP2 User Guide for more information.
- The time-out period before the Kaleido-RCP2 defaults to its static address is 1 minute. To speed up the initialization, disable the DHCP option.

## Assigning a static IP address to the Kaleido-RCP2

### To assign a static IP address to the Kaleido-RCP2

- 1 Press and hold the ENTER button until the ESC button lights up, to display the configuration menu.
- 2 Press the **8** key (to move down the list) until ETHERNET OPTIONS appears on the LCD display.
- 3 Press the ENTER key to display the ETHERNET OPTIONS menu.
- 4 Select the IP ADDRESS menu using the **2** key (to move up in the list) or the **8** key (to move down the list), and then press ENTER.
- 5 Using the numeric keypad, type the chosen IP address, and then press ENTER.
- 6 Select the NETWORK MASK menu using the **2** key (to move up in the list) or the **8** key (to move down the list), and then press ENTER.
- 7 Using the numeric keypad, type the chosen network mask, and then press ENTER.

You have assigned a static IP address to the Kaleido-RCP2.

## Selecting a room for the Kaleido-RCP2

### To select a room for the Kaleido-RCP2

- 1 Press and hold the ENTER button until the ESC button lights up, to display the configuration menu.
- 2 In the ROOM SELECTION display, press ENTER again to get the room list from the Kaleido Multiviewer systems that are currently available on the network.
- 3 In the room list, select the room you want to access by pressing the **2** key (to move up in the list) or the **8** key (to move down the list).

---

**Note:** By default, a multiviewer's video outputs are assigned to specific rooms: the outputs are assigned to ROOM1.

- 4 When the appropriate room name is highlighted, press ENTER to accept the new selection.
- 5 When prompted, log on to the selected room. See [Logging on to the Kaleido-RCP2](#) on page 120.

## Connecting the Kaleido-RCP2 to Other Kaleido Multiviewer Systems

The unicast IP feature enables a Kaleido-RCP2 to find up to three Kaleido Multiviewer systems on different subnets and connect to them (via network gateways), while maintaining connections to Kaleido Multiviewer systems in its own subnet.

---

### Notes

- To navigate the Kaleido-RCP2 menu, press the **2** key to move up, or the **8** key to move down.
  - There is no need to configure unicast IP addresses for Kaleido Multiviewer systems on the same subnet as the Kaleido-RCP2.
-

### To configure a unicast IP address on the Kaleido-RCP2

- 1 Press and hold the ENTER button until the ESC button lights up, to display the configuration menu.
- 2 Select ETHERNET OPTIONS on the LCD display, and then press ENTER.
- 3 Select **Unicast host IP**, and then press ENTER.
- 4 Select **Enable IP 1**, and then press ENTER.  
The Enable IP x parameter instructs the Kaleido-RCP2 to query the selected IP address for a list of rooms.
- 5 Select **Host IP ADDR**, and then press ENTER.
- 6 Using the numeric keypad, type the IP address of a Kaleido Multiviewer on a remote subnet, and then press ENTER.
- 7 Repeat [step 4](#) to [step 6](#) to add unicast IP addresses for up to three remote Kaleido Multiviewer systems.

## Logging on to the Kaleido-RCP2

As a network device, the Kaleido-RCP2 provides access to any room configuration on any Kaleido Multiviewer system on the network. As a security measure, access is controlled by a login procedure.

### To log on to a Kaleido Multiviewer system from the Kaleido-RCP2

- 1 Press the LOGIN key.  
The following message will appear on the LCD display:  
LOGIN Position  
Admin
- 2 Press ENTER to select "Admin".  
A message prompting you to enter a password will appear on the LCD display.
- 3 Press ENTER again (by default, there is no password).  
The message "Access granted" will appear on the LCD display if the login is successful. If a mouse is connected to the Kaleido-RCP2, then you should be able to see and move the mouse pointer on the monitor wall.

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**Note:** If at any time the message "Target system is offline" or "No login list available" appears on the LCD display, press the ESC, ENTER and DEL keys simultaneously and go back to [step 1](#).

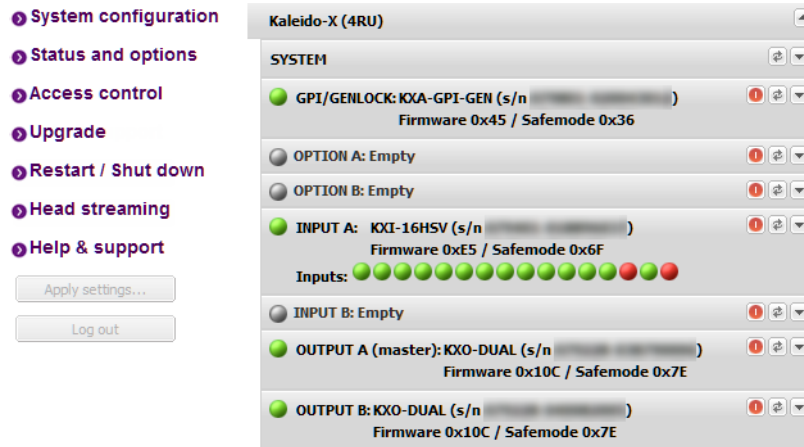

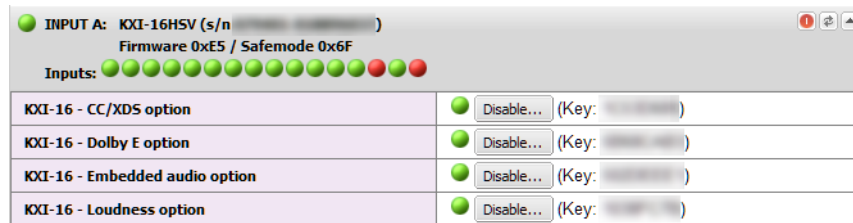

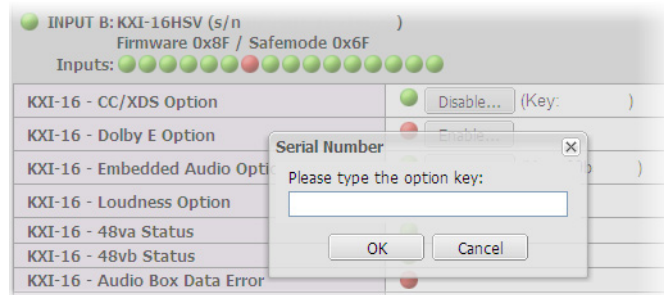


- 3 Click the arrow button at the end of the heading row that corresponds to the module for which you want to enable an option.

For example, to activate the Extraction of CC, Subtitling and XDS metadata option (CC/XDS Option) for an input card, you would need to locate the appropriate card in XAdmin's Status and Options page, expand it, and then locate the **KXI-16-CC/XDS option** line.
- 5 Click the **Enable** button.

A window appears prompting you for the license key.

## System Verification

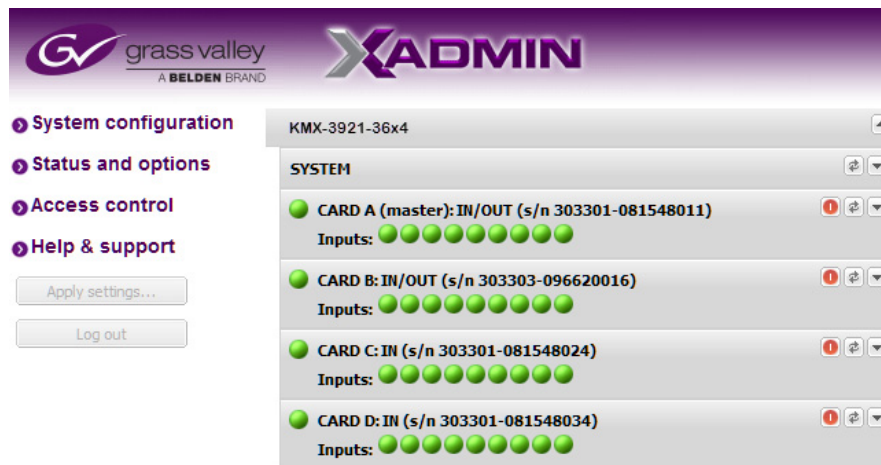
### Verifying the KMX-3921 Multiviewer Status

#### To view the status information for a multiviewer

- 1 Open XAdmin. See [Opening XAdmin](#) on page 78.

XAdmin's Status and Options page appears, showing the multiviewer model, and a list of all modules and their statuses.



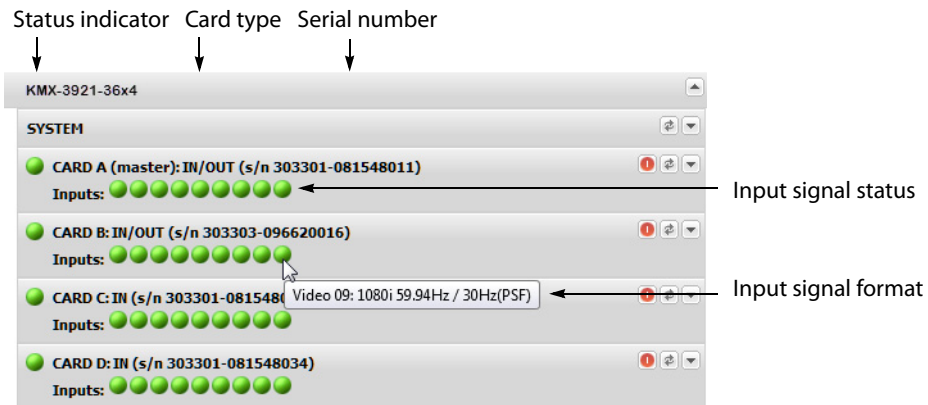
The module headings show the card type and serial number for the input and output cards, and a summary view of the input signals for each input card.

- In the case of a multiviewer with more than one card, the card in the left-most slot (the slot with the lowest number) is designated as *card A*, and is considered as your system's *master* card. You cannot operate a KMX-3921 system without a master card. For more information about the location of card A in the frame, see [Installation of](#)

the KMX-3921 in a Densité 3+ Frame, on page 30.

- The module status indicator shows whether the card (or module) is running normally (green) or in safe mode (red).
- The signal status indicators reveals the presence of a valid input signal at the corresponding connector.

2 Move the pointer to an input signal status indicator to view the associated signal format.

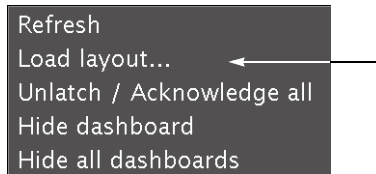

## Loading a Layout

- 1 Connect a mouse to the Kaleido-RCP2 (if available) and log on to the appropriate room, if you have not already done so (see [Logging on to the Kaleido-RCP2](#), on page 120).  
Alternatively, connect the mouse directly to the USB port at the front of one of your system's output card. See [Troubleshooting with the card's front edge USB connector](#), on page 141.

- 2 Right-click anywhere on the monitor wall, point to **Monitor wall** (if you clicked a monitor), and then click **Load layout** on the menu.

A layout browser appears on the displays associated with the current room.

- 3 Select the layout you want to load from the list of available layouts for this room, and then click **OK**.

The selected layout appears on the room displays.

## Finding the Multiviewer's IP Address and Application Version

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**Note:** The multiviewer's IP address can also be remotely set through a the KMX-3921's iControl service panel. See [Network Settings Panel](#), on page 102.

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### To find the system IP address and application version

- 1 Press the icon representing the appropriate card on the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame's local control panel touch display.  
The Status LED on the selected card is flashing orange, and the version of the Kaleido Software that is running on the card (e.g. "10.00 build 2230") appears on the display of the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame's local control panel.
- 2 On the local control panel, touch the [-] button repeatedly until NETWORK SETTINGS appears on the display, and then touch the SEL button.  
SYSTEM IP EDIT appears on the control panel's display.
- 3 Touch the SEL button again.  
The current IP address appears on the display.
- 4 Press the Select button *on the front edge of the KMX-3921 card* to exit the control menu.

## Opening and Closing the Front Door

### The Densité 3+ FR4 Frame's Front Door

The front door of the Densité 3+ FR4 frame is hinged on the right-hand side, and latched by a captive thumbscrew on the left-hand side. There are no electrical connections to the door.

- Turn the thumbscrew counterclockwise until it releases, and pull the door open.
- The door can be removed completely after it is open by sliding it vertically off the hinge pins on the right-hand side.

Close the front door as follows:

- Slide the door down onto the hinge pins on the right-hand side.
- Swing the door shut and turn the thumbscrew clockwise until the door is secured shut.

### The Densité 3+ FR1 Frame's Front Door

The front door of the Densité 3+ FR1 frame is fastened in place by two captive thumbscrews, on the left and right hand side of the door. There are no electrical connections to the door.

- To open the door, turn both thumbscrews counterclockwise until they release, and pull the door away from the front of the frame.
- The door is attached to the frame by guides that slide out of the frame as the door is pulled, and allow the door to be lowered below the frame so that cards and power supplies can be removed and installed.

- The door can be removed completely by slipping the ends of the guides off the posts on the door assembly. Note that you must tilt the door on an angle so the guide can move freely.

Close the front door as follows:

- Close the door by sliding it into position against the front of the frame, and turning the captive thumbscrews clockwise until the door is securely fastened into place

## About Swapping KMX-3921 Cards into a Multiviewer

The following instructions apply to a multiviewer that has two or more KMX-3921 cards. See [Supported Frames and Multiviewer Scaling](#), on page 13.

### Overview

When each multiviewer card has the same license options enabled, the multiviewer features will be consistently available across all multiviewer inputs. For a list of multiviewer model features, see [Features and Limitations](#), on page 12.

Licensed options are purchased for individual multiviewer cards and thus the licensed feature for that card will follow the card wherever it is located in whichever multiviewer. See [Available Hardware and Software Options](#), on page 121. Enabling licensed features on some multiviewer cards but not on others may result in a mosaic output that show signals with mixed abilities (some signals may have subtitling or support HDR and others will not for example).

### Swapping a KMX-3921 Card into a Multiviewer

When performing maintenance on a multiviewer, it may be necessary to replace a KMX-3921 card with another KMX-3921 card. Once a KMX-3921 card has been successfully swapped into the multiviewer, the multiviewer will live-update the multiviewer cards as necessary so that all multiviewer KMX-3921 cards will have the same Kaleido Software version level. See [Multiviewer Live-Update \(Auto-Upgrade\) Feature](#), on page 130.

### Multiviewer Live-Update (Auto-Upgrade) Feature

For a multiviewer that has two or more KMX-3921 multiviewer cards, all multiviewer cards will be automatically upgraded or downgraded to the Kaleido Software version currently loaded on multiviewer card 'A', as a function of the live-update (auto-upgrade) feature. See [Installation of the KMX-3921 in a Densité 3+ Frame](#), on page 30 for the location of card 'A' in each multiviewer model.

### Finding a KMX-3921 Card's Current Kaleido Software Version

To know the KMX-3921 card's Kaleido Software current version, insert the card into the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame and then find the card's Kaleido Software version through the frame's local control panel (see [Using the Frame Control Panel](#), on page 53) or

through the Densité Upgrade Manager (launched from iControl Navigator, or iControl Solo). See [Information Panel](#), on page 110.

## Replacing Cards

All cards and rear panels can be installed with the frame power on.

Each card has connectors which plug into a mid-frame mother board for distribution of power and for connection to the controller card, and a second connector which for certain cards plug directly into the rear panel for mosaic output connections to the display(s).

---

### IMPORTANT

The rear panel must be installed before any KMX-3921 cards are inserted into the frame.

All KMX-3921 cards must be removed from the frame before the rear panel can be removed.

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In install or replace a card or rear panel, see:

## Cooling Fan Replacement

A cooling fan has moving parts that, over time, can wear out. In the final stages of fan wear out, the fan makes a distinctive sound and it rotates at a slower speed, thereby reducing airflow which undermines its ability to remove heat from the card. Under this condition, fan replacement is required.

Also, dust contained in the ambient air can accumulate on the fan and on surfaces around the fan and heatsink, thereby reducing airflow, and preventing air from coming into direct contact with the heatsink surfaces which undermines the ability to remove heat from the card. Under this condition, cleaning is necessary and fan replacement may be required.

Some diagnostic procedures may interrupt normal system operation. Changing a card's cooling fan will interrupt normal system operation. Down time can be minimized by swapping in a new or a known good card to restore system operation quickly. Schedule these maintenance operations during off hours when the system is not in use.

### Diagnostics

The KMX-3921 card's electronic circuitry generates heat that must be shed by forcing air to move across heat-generating components. Reduced air flow or high ambient temperature results in heat build-up within temperature-sensitive components on the card. This can cause unexpected behavior such as glitches or even a system freeze or shutdown. The KMX-3921 card self-diagnoses high temperature conditions by raising critical temperature and fan alarms.

Critical temperature and fan alarms are reported through the following mechanisms:

- The alarm status in XAdmin are called *XXXX fan failure* where *XXXX* identifies the specific fan. For example, *FSM 0 fan failure*.
- The alarm status in the iControl service's GSM is called *Hardware Failure*.
- The fan and critical temperature alarms are reported in iControl in the Alarms Configuration panel. See [Alarm Configuration Panel](#), on page 106 for more information.
- A KMX-3921 card's front Status LED flashes due to this condition (note that the Status LED can also flash due to other conditions). This cannot be stopped by a service panel action.
- A *Fan Failure* message is displayed in the dashboard.

The fan alarm indicates that the fan is not rotating fast enough due to wear and thus it may not provide enough cooling. A fan alarm must be addressed right away. A critical temperature alarm can be ignored if it is accompanied by a fan alarm as the root cause is the fan not rotating fast enough.

Otherwise, if the fan is running properly according to the fan alarm, then the *Critical Temperature Alarm Corrective Actions* steps should be taken.

### **Critical Temperature Alarm Corrective Actions**

If the fan alarm is inactive and the critical temperature alarm is active, then undertake the following diagnostic steps in the following order:

- 1 Confirm that the room temperature is within Densité 3+ FR4's operating temperature range specification. If necessary, take corrective actions by, for example, increasing the amount of air conditioning made available to the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame.
- 2 Confirm that air flow around the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4's frame is not obstructed. If necessary, take corrective actions by, for example, removing obstructions or rerouting cables around and away from the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame.
- 3 When the previous corrective actions do not eliminate a critical temperature alarm, verify that the KMX-3921's onboard fan is working correctly. See [Fan Noise](#) below.

### **Fan Noise**

Over time, a fan's performance (operating speed) can degrade which may raise critical temperature and fan alarms. Under this circumstance, a fan may emit a rough-sounding lower pitched sound as compared to the sound that other healthier fans emit. To confirm that the card has an abnormally-sounding fan, during off hours when the system is not in use, eject the card from the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame to verify that the distinctive sound stops and take corrective actions (see below).

Or there may be no sound at all if the fan's rotation is completely blocked. While the card is in the frame, make a visual inspection with a flashlight to confirm fan rotation. If the fan is not rotating, then corrective actions must be taken.

### **Fan Alarm and Fan Noise Corrective Actions**

When a fan alarm is raised, it must be addressed right away. During off hours when the system is not in use, eject the card from the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame and



inspect the card's fan assembly: remove any accumulated dust and dirt from the card with compressed air and remove any obstruction to the fan's ability to freely rotate.

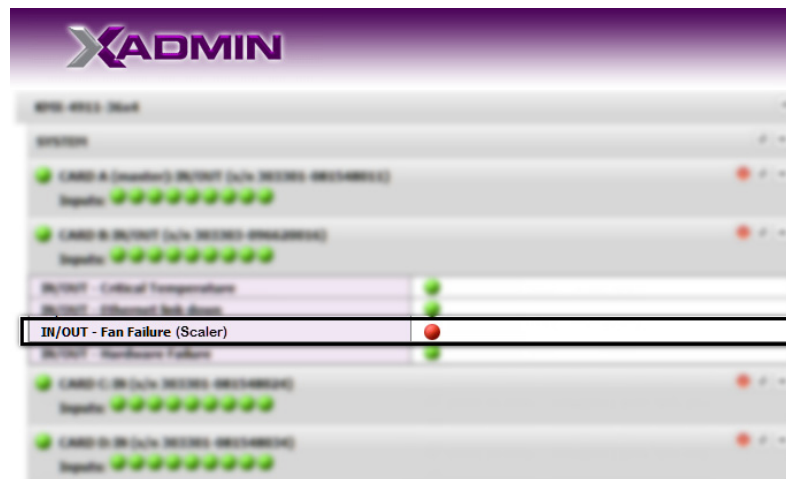
Reinsert the card into the frame and restore system operation to see if the fan alarm becomes inactive.

The card's onboard circuitry monitors the fan motor's rotational speed to detect that the fan is rotating fast enough to provide sufficient cooling; it raises a fan alarm when the fan's rotational speed has gone below a factory-set threshold.

When the card's fan is not rotating fast enough (as detected by a fan alarm), is making abnormal noises, or is not rotating at all, the fan is worn out and it must be replaced with a new one.

### Identifying the Fan to Replace for a Fan Fail Alarm

As some cards have more than one fan, identify in XAdmin the specific fan to be changed on the card: check each card individually for a fan fail alarm.



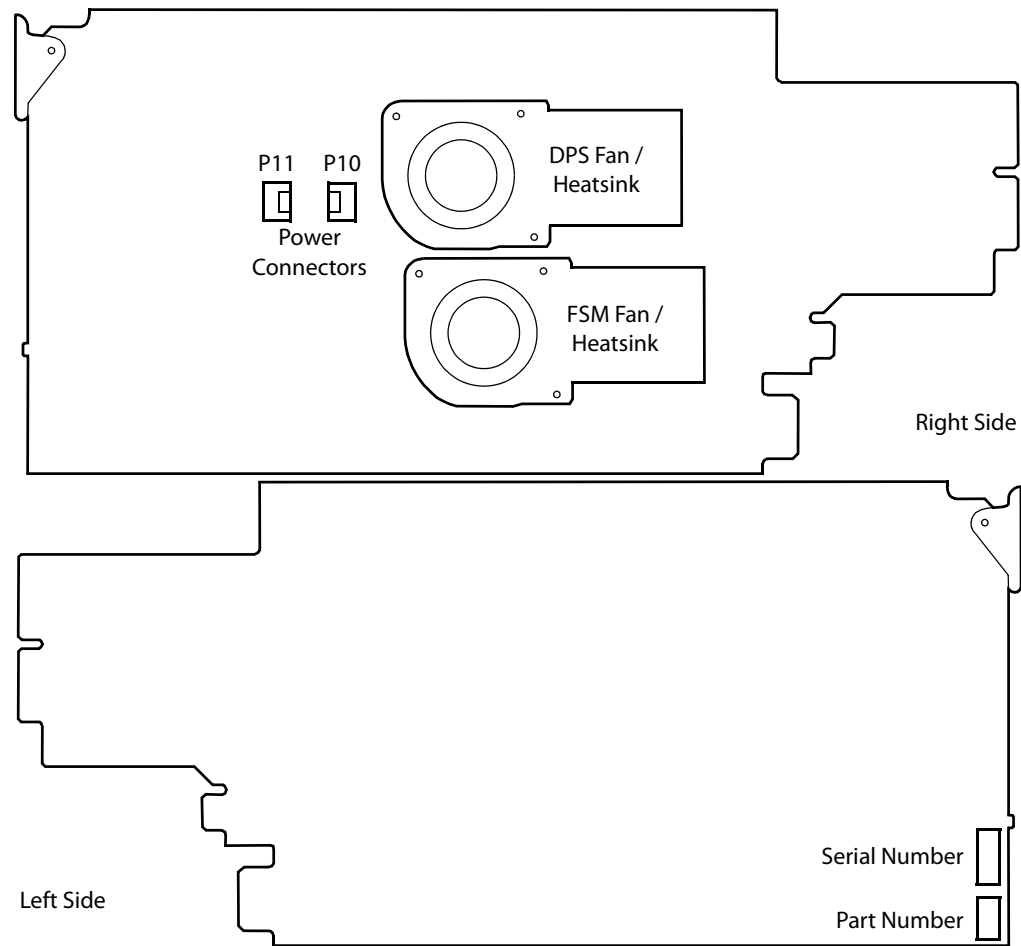

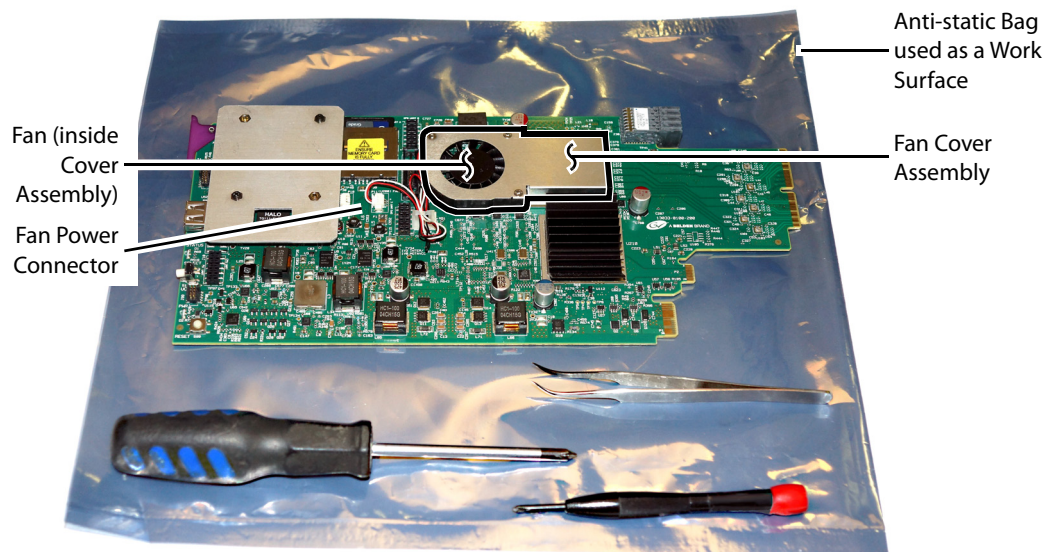

## Required Tools

The following field-supplied material is required:

- Compressed air to remove dust from the card.
- Flashlight to perform a visual inspection to confirm fan rotation.
- Phillips screwdrivers:
  - #1 jeweler's screwdriver with a miniature shaft to remove the fan from the fan cover assembly and install the replacement fan back onto the fan cover assembly.
  - #2 screwdriver to remove and install the fan cover assembly.
- Curved tweezers to disconnect the fan's power connector from the KMX-3921 card.
- Anti-static bag or anti-static work surface to reduce the possibility of electrostatic discharge damage to the card.

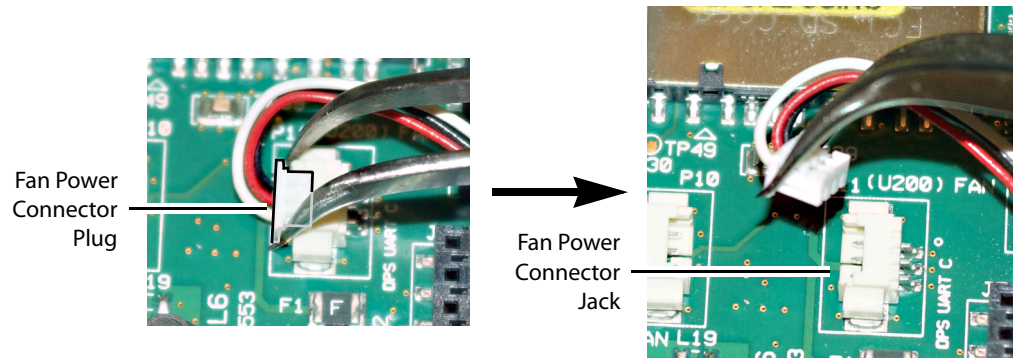


*Typical card with onboard fan, screwdrivers, tweezers, and anti-static bag*

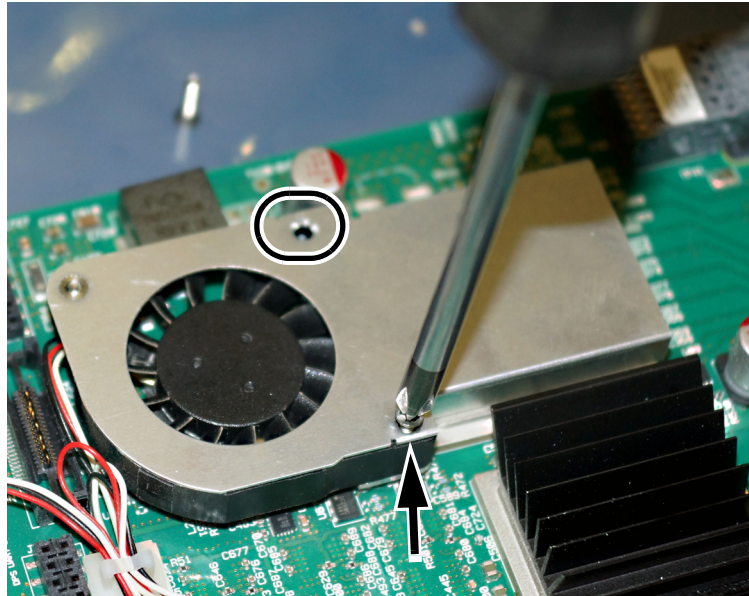
## To replace a fan

- 1 During off hours when the system is not in use, eject the card from the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame. See [Replacing Cards](#), on page 131.
- 2 Place the card on an anti-static bag or anti-static work surface.
- 3 Using curved tweezers, disconnect the fan power connector plug, very carefully; gently wiggle the connector plug from the socket (jack). Do not pull on the wires. If the wires

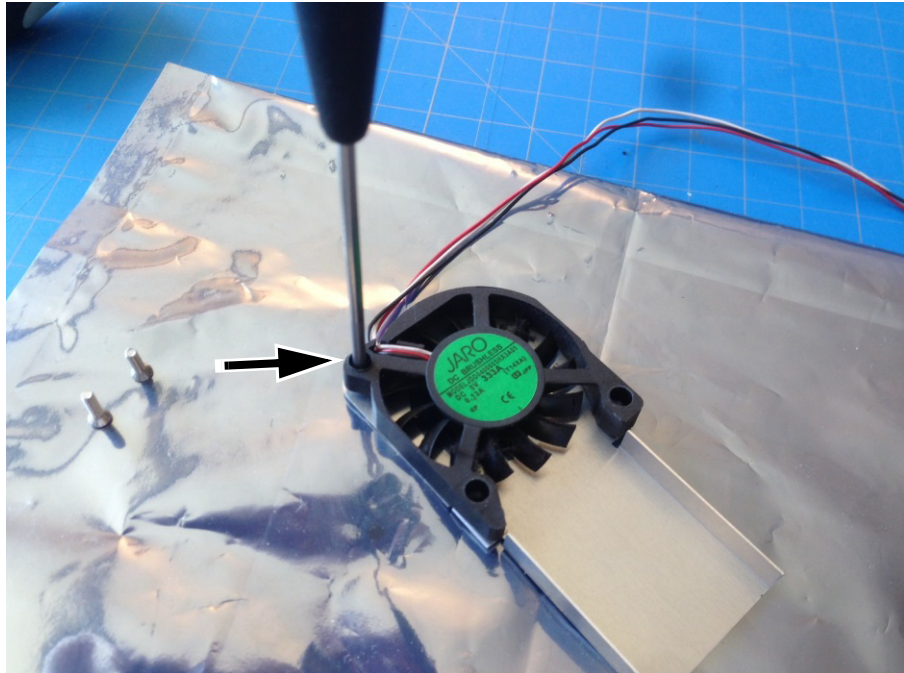
are routed through wire holders, remove the wires from the holders first, before disconnecting.



- 4 Free up the fan cover assembly by removing the 2 screws in the middle. Once the 2 screws are removed, remove the fan cover assembly.



- 5 Flip the fan cover over, and remove the last screw holding the fan with the #1 Phillips screwdriver.



- 6 Remove any accumulated dust from the card with compressed air.
- 7 Replace the fan with the new one, and replace all screws, in the reverse order.
- 8 Route the fan's power wires through the wire holders, and make the connection to the card's fan power connector.
- 9 Restore system operation by inserting the card back into the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame. See [Replacing Cards](#), on page 131.

Put the multiviewer into operation and confirm that the critical temperature and fan alarms remain inactive.

## Generating a System Snapshot

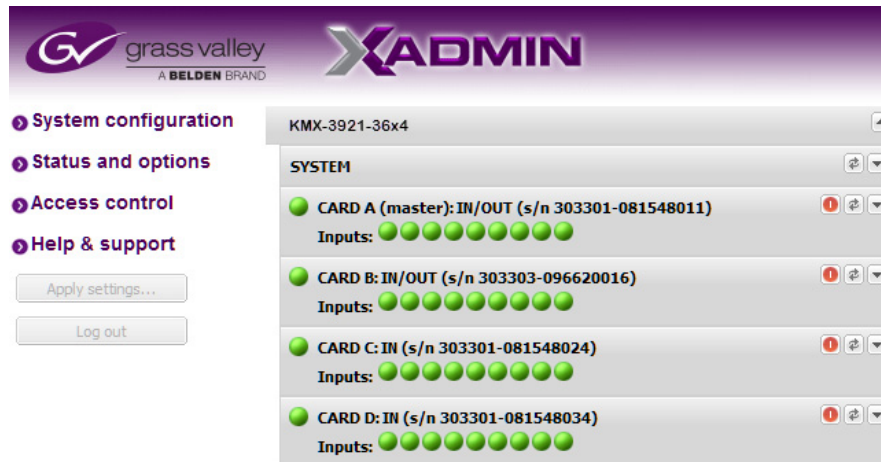
A system snapshot creates a compressed file that contains information that can be used by Technical Support for troubleshooting purposes.

### To generate a system snapshot

The system snapshot generation may take a few moments, after which your browser prompts you to save the resulting compressed folder to your hard drive.

- 4 Browse to the location where you want to save the ZIP file, and then click **Save**.

## Installing a Kaleido Software Upgrade

Upgrade packages are available by download. The format of the file should be `firmware-V.V.V.NNNN.zip` (V= version, N= build number). See [Software and Firmware Updates](#), on page 11. The upgrade package contains:

- the Kaleido Software Upgrade Manager application is required to upgrade the KMX-3921 multiviewer.
- one or more Kaleido Software operating system (`.os`, `.zip`, or `.run`) files.
- iControl drivers that are needed to update the card.
- upgrade documentation.

### Loading the upgrade package into the Densité Upgrade Manager

- 1 From iControl Navigator, or iControl Solo, open Densité Upgrade Manager.
- 2 In **Densité Upgrade Manager**, click **Upload files**.  
A file browser window opens.
- 3 Navigate to the upgrade package with the following format: `pmvos-10.00_build_5294.os`, select it, and then click **Open**.  
A progress indicator window appears.
- 4 Click **Upload**, to transfer the upgrade package to the Densité manager.
- 5 Once the operation has completed, click **Close**.
- 6 In the **Available package** column of **Densité Upgrade Manager**, expand the appropriate list to verify that the new upgrade package is present.

### Upgrading the KMX-3921 multiviewer

When upgrading a multi-card KMX-3921 multiviewer system (for example, a multiviewer with more than one KMX-3921 card), you should select *all* multiviewer cards in Densité Upgrade

Manager, so that they are all upgraded simultaneously and only one multiviewer reboot will be required.

- 1 Locate the KMX-3921 card(s) that belong to the multiviewer system you are upgrading.

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**TIP**

If you have more than one KMX-3921 multiviewer system in the Densité 3+ FR1 / Densité 3+ FR4 frame, click the **Physical view** tab, where you can locate the multiviewer cards by their slot number.

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- 2 For each card to be upgraded, select the upgrade package you uploaded in [step 3](#) (in [Loading the upgrade package into the Densité Upgrade Manager](#), on page 139) from the corresponding list, under **Available package**.
- 3 Make sure to set the check boxes under **Select/Bypass** for all the card(s) being upgraded.
- 4 Click **Upgrade**.
- 5 When prompted to confirm, click **Yes**.

During the upgrade, a progress bar appears in the **Install progress** column. Once the upgrade operation has completed, a message appears in the Install progress column. The multiviewer will reboot and the current KMX-3921 card Kaleido Software version will be shown under **Installed firmware** column.

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**Note:** If nothing happens, verify that you are using the correct Kaleido Software upgrade package, with the following format: `pmvos - 10.00_build_5294.os`

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## Troubleshooting

### Troubleshooting with the card's front edge USB connector

A USB mouse can be directly connected to the multiviewer card for troubleshooting purposes (as opposed to connecting the mouse to a Kaleido-RCP2, for instance) with the following conditions.

- The pointer can only travel between the displays supported by that card.
- When more than one display is connected to the card, the required mouse movement to go between displays does not always follow the wall layout set in XEdit. For example, you will have to move the mouse pointer horizontally or vertically in order to go from one display to the next.

### Dashboard Messages

The following tables explain messages that may appear in the *Status dashboard* (lower right corner) and in the *Upgrade dashboard* (lower left corner), on the Monitor wall.

#### Status dashboard messages

Message	Description
Duplicate IP Address Detected	Another equipment on the network shares the same IP address as an output card.
Duplicate frame IP address	Another equipment on the network shares the same IP address as the multiviewer system (in a multiple output card setup).
Ethernet Link Down	The output card to which this display monitor is connected has lost its network connection.
Card temperature critical	Card is overheating, which might result in decreased system performance (e.g., green dots, flickering, card not starting). You should halt operations until the overheating problem is resolved.
Card temperature high	Temperature warning; this indicates that the card is warmer than normal and that you should verify cooling and ventilation (e.g., check for anything obstructing the ventilation openings).
Hardware failure	Voltage, current or power is above or below their critical thresholds.
FPGA fan failed	FPGA fan failed
Fan Fail	One of the input card's fan is running too slow or not at all.
Firmware status	Tells whether firmware is running properly on the card.

## Troubleshooting Common Issues

Troubleshooting consists of using fault-isolation techniques to narrow down the probable cause to a specific multiviewer component. Schedule these maintenance operations during off hours when the system is not in use if possible as troubleshooting can cause outage. Use the following troubleshooting table to diagnose common issues and take corrective actions to restore operation.

Symptom	Probable cause	Test	Corrective action
Source signal input is unavailable	Signal feed is unavailable	Apply a signal from signal generator test set or another source to the multiviewer's input	Verify that the input status LEDs are green. See <a href="#">Card Interface and Troubleshooting</a> , on page 52.

### Swapping around a Card in a Multiviewer

Schedule this maintenance operation during off hours when the system is not in use if possible as this procedure can cause multiviewer outage.

In an attempt to restore multiviewer operation and to perform fault isolation procedures, you can swap the position of cards around in the multiviewer’s frame to see if the problem follows the card or to see if normal multiviewer operation can be restored.

To swap the position of a card around in the multiviewer, you must first identify two identical cards installed in the multiviewer’s frame. For example, the model number marked on each card’s ejector handle are the same. If two identical cards are found, eject both cards from the multiviewer’s frame and exchange their positions within the frame before firmly reinserting the cards into the frame. To RMA a defective card, see [Grass Valley Technical Support](#), on page 158.

### Swapping around a Power Supply in a Multiviewer

Schedule this maintenance operation during off hours when the system is not in use if possible as this procedure can cause multiviewer outage.

In an attempt to restore multiviewer operation and to perform fault isolation procedures, you can swap the position of a power supply around in the multiviewer frame to see if normal multiviewer operation can be restored.

If the frame has an empty power supply slot (for example, for a redundant power supply unit (PSU)), you can remove the PSU from the frame and insert it into the other power supply slot. Ensure to connect a power cable at the rear of the frame's chassis for the PSU's new position in the frame. To RMA a defective PSU, see [Grass Valley Technical Support](#), on page 158.

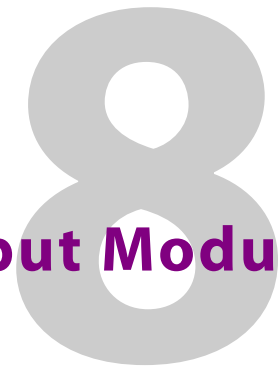

# Installing the SFP Output Module



## Introduction

Installing and removing the SFP output interface cartridge requires special care. This annex describes the process.

Rear panels incorporate one or two SFP interface(s). The interface consists of two parts:

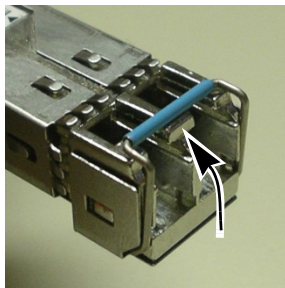
- A socket on the rear panel into which an SFP interface module is plugged
- An SFP (Small Form-factor Pluggable) module that performs output medium translation to which connections are made for optical fibers, coaxial copper, and so on.

### CAUTION

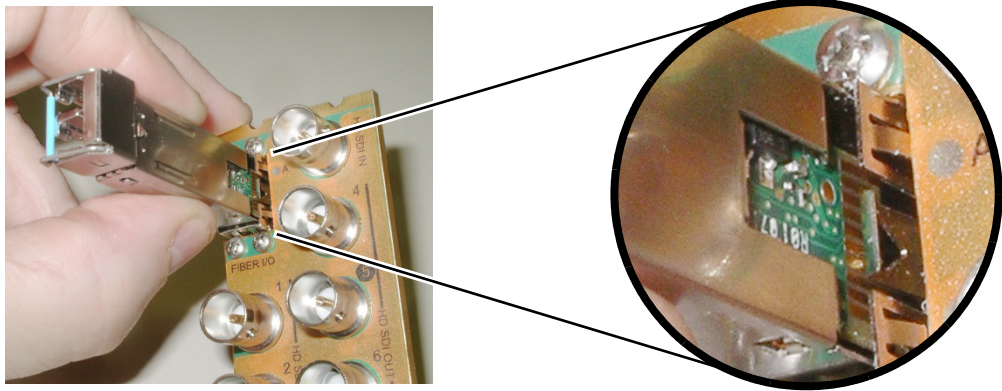
- SFP fiber Transmitter modules contain a class 1 laser, which emits invisible radiation whenever the module is powered up. Because the SFP is hot-swappable, the module may be powered up as soon as it is installed.
- DO NOT LOOK INTO AN OPERATING SFP FIBER MODULE'S CONNECTORS, AS EYE DAMAGE MAY RESULT.
- The SFP module is sensitive to electrostatic discharge (ESD). It is recommended that you use an ESD-preventive wrist strap grounded to the chassis while handling the SFP module.
- SFP modules are subject to wear, and their useful lifetime is reduced each time they are inserted or removed. Do not remove them more often than is absolutely necessary.
- Never remove or install an SFP fiber module with the fiber optic cables connected. Damage to the cables could result.
- The presence of dust and debris can seriously degrade the performance of an optical interface. It is recommended that you insert a dust plug into the SFP fiber module whenever a fiber optic cable is not connected.

## Installing an SFP module

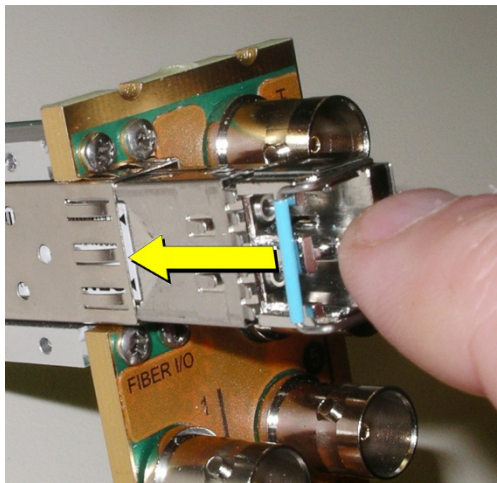
- 1 Make sure that the bale clasp lever is in the closed position.



- 2 Position the SFP module so that the recessed slot is lined up with the tab side of the socket.



- 3 Slide the module straight into the socket, and push gently until it clicks into position.



## Connecting the fiber optic cables

- 1 Remove the dust plug from the SFP module if present
- 2 Verify that the exposed end of the optical fiber in the LC connector is clean
  - Carefully remove any debris if necessary.
- 3 Plug the LC-terminated fiber optic cable into the SFP module

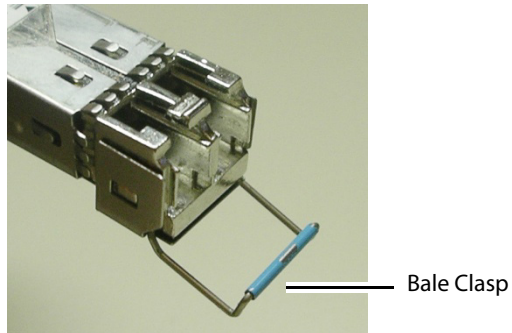
## Removing the fiber optic cables

- 1 Grasp the LC fiber optic connector that is plugged into the SFP module, and pull it straight out to disengage the optical fiber from the SFP.
  - Never pull the fiber optic cable itself, as irreversible damage may occur.
- 2 Insert a dust plug into the SFP module.

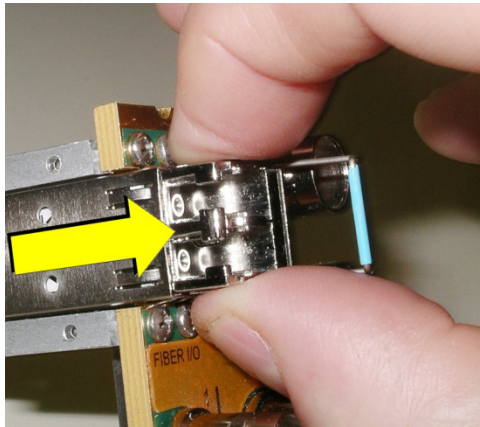


## Removing the SFP module

- 1 Move the bale clasp lever to the open position.



- 2 Grasp the SFP module between your thumb and forefinger, and pull it straight out of the slot.



- Do NOT pull on the bale clasp lever to remove the module, as it is easily damaged.
  - You may find that you need to wiggle the module, or perhaps push it into the slot a bit, before it will release and slide out.
- 3 For fiber optic models, insert a dust plug into the SFP module.
