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1 IPG-3901 High Density SDI/IP Gateway for Densité 3 Platform

1.1 Introduction

The Densité IP Gateway (IPG-3901) plug-and-play module from Grass Valley, a Belden Brand, is a 3 RU module for the Densité 3 frame that offers bidirectional IP/SDI conversion. The Gateway operates with 10 GigE IP video-over-IP, supporting 4K UHD/3G/HD/SD-SDI formats. Version 2.2.1 of the gateway module furthers the end-to-end support of IP for Grass Valley product lines by now offering support for Video Services Forum Technical Recommendation 04 (VSF TR-04), enabling independent routing of AES audio alongside SMPTE ST 2022-6 video and interconnection to audio devices supporting AES67 open standard for audio over IP.

With the addition of intoPIX TICO mezzanine encoding and decoding option on the gateway, customers have a convenient way to add 4K to their workflow and move 4K across the production facility. TICO mezzanine compression is visually lossless 4:1 compression, which is lightweight and fast, perfectly suitable for live production. The IPG-3901 with purchasable TICO option provides either two (2) encodes OR two (2) decodes OR one (1) encode and one (1) decode per card.

Note – TICO functionality, available in v1.3, is not supported in this v2.2 release. It will be reinstated in v2.3.

The gateways support any mix of 3G/HD/SD-SDI production workflows over IP networks. With bidirectional I/O in combinations of up to 5 in and out, the cards offer full SMPTE 2022-7 Class A redundancy of all video and audio essence in either unicast or multicast workflows to ensure uninterrupted service.

In addition, you also have the choice to use the second ethernet port for aggregation instead of redundancy, providing 20 GigE of bidirectional bandwidth over two 10 GigE ports, increasing the capability to transport 6 in/5 out or 5 in/6 out 3G signals per IPG card. It also lets you transport more HD/SD signals in one direction by taking advantage of the bidirectional configuration of 7 BNC I/O, providing up to 9 in/2 out or 2 in/9 out.

With SMPTE 2022-7 Class A redundancy and large frame buffers, the new IP receivers in the IPG-3901 v2.2 allow for reception of sources with high levels of jitter as well as network isolated packet loss. The SDI outputs are now aligned with respect to a given reference for precise timing adjustment ensuring signal stability.

Based on the proven Densité modular framework of over 100 functional cards, the flexible, space-efficient IPG-3901 cards accommodate a gradual adoption of IP production elements into broadcasting workflows, while protecting operational methods and investment in installed equipment.

With flexibility to configure up to 6 IPG-3901 modules per Densité 3 frame and with each IPG-3901 module carrying 10 HD or 6 3G gateways with full redundancy, the Densité 3 platform scales to a density of 60 HD or 36 3G gateways in a 3 RU frame. In the new Densité 3+ FR4 frame, up to 12 IPG-3901 modules can be installed giving a density of 120 HD or 72 3G gateways in a 4 RU frame. This means space- and cost-efficient scaling – today and tomorrow.

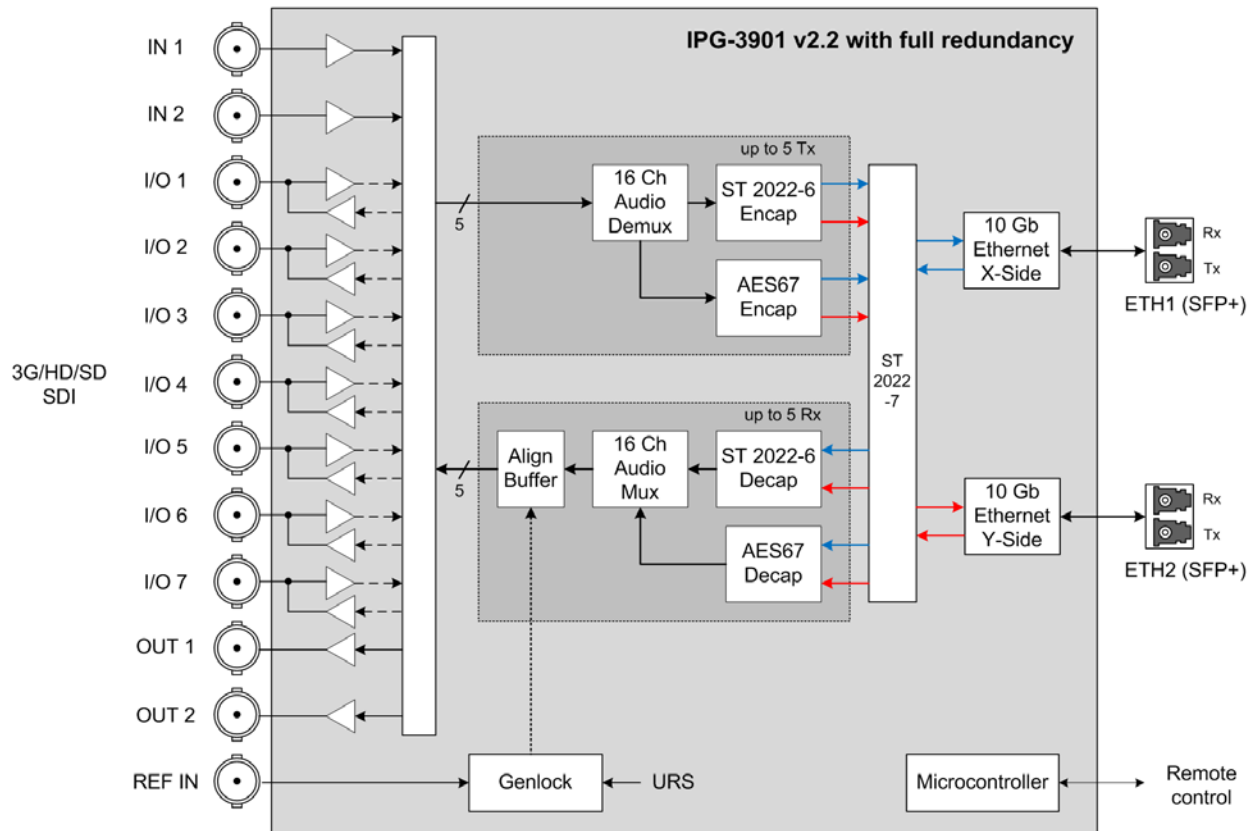
The Densité IP Gateway can be controlled by the advanced GV Convergent SDN platform, offering unified control across COTS IP switches and SDI routing/processing infrastructures, as well as by the proven iControl systems.

1.2 Features

- Two dual-network interfaces supporting 10 GigE SFP+ ports with either:
 - Long range single-mode optical connectors
 - Short range multi-mode optical connectors
 - Direct Attach Copper assemblies
 - Active Optical Cables and Optical Transceiver
- Bidirectional transport of 4K UHD/3G/HD/SD-SDI video signals over 10GigE port.

- TR-04 support where video signals are converted into SMPTE 2022-6 along with AES67 de-embedding/embedding of up to 16 audio channels per source.
- Redundancy mode with full compliance to SMPTE ST 2022-7 Class A of all IP essences where each module connects up to 3x3 3G or 5x5 HD/SD signals
- Aggregation mode where both network ports are combined for a total IP bandwidth of 20 GigE, providing higher 3G transmission capability per IPG card such as the transfer of 4K UHD uncompressed over a 4K link on a single IPG. In this mode, bidirectional I/O for 2 inputs, 2 outputs and 7 bidirectional I/Os for up to 11 streams.
- Large frame buffer on every IP receiver provides support for server-originated bursty sources
- All SDI outputs are aligned with respect to the module reference for precise timing adjustment ensuring signal stability.
- Supports multicast loopback with SDI output alignment.
- Flexible SD/URS reference input.
- IGMPv3 support for IP inputs.
- Supports unicast and multicast signals.
- Support of PTP on the media port with fail-over redundancy for AES67 streams. Supports both AES67 and SMPTE ST 2059 profiles
- Support of DiffServ for network traffic provides categorization of flows into QoS classes
- Compatible with Densité 3, 3+ and GV Node platforms.
- Integrates with iControl and GV Convergent SDN control frameworks.
- TICO 4K 1-wire option (not supported in this release – will be supported in v2.3)

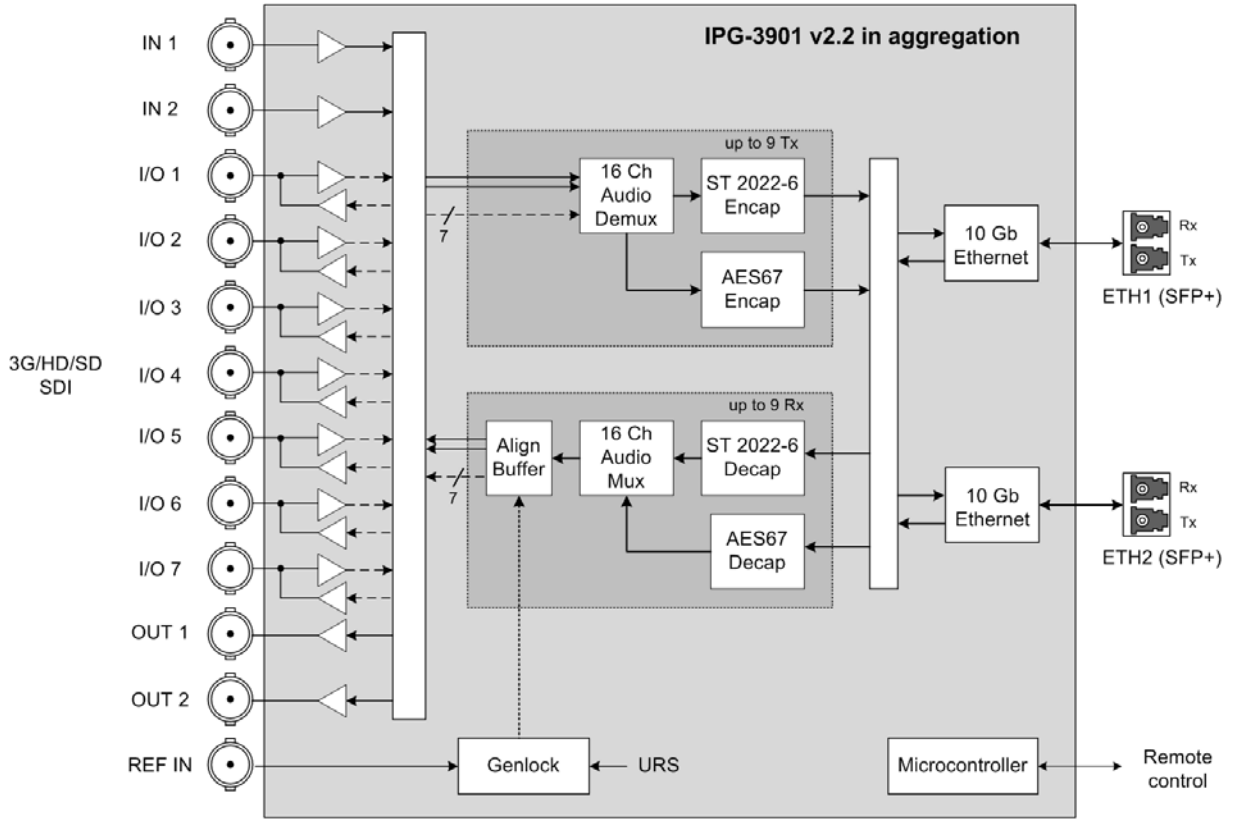


Figure 1-1 IPG-3901 Functional Block Diagram – Redundancy and Aggregation modes

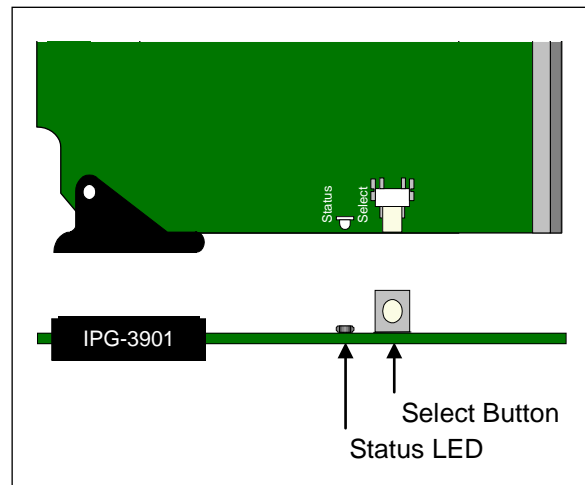


Figure 1-2 Front card-edge layout

2 Installation

2.1 Installation of Rear Connector Panels

Grass Valley Densité-series cards are each associated with a rear connector panel, which must be installed in the Densité frame before the card can be inserted.

The IPG-3901 card is designed to fit into Grass Valley's Densité-3 and Densité 3+ frames. Two different rear connector panels are available:

- IPG-3901-3TRP Triple-slot-width panel for Densité-3
- IPG-3901-3+DRP Double-slot-width panel for Densité-3+FR1 and Densité-3+FR4

See [section 2.3](#) for details of the signal connections available on these panels.

All cards and rear panels can be installed with the frame power on. The card has connectors that plug into a mid-frame mother board for distribution of power and for connection to the controller card, and a second connector that plugs directly into the rear connector panel for input and output.



The rear connector panel must be installed with the card out of the frame.

- To remove an existing card from the slot, tilt the swivel handle on the front of the card to lever the connectors apart, then use the handle to pull the card straight out of the slot.

To install the connector panel:

1. If a card is installed in the slot whose rear panel is being changed, remove it as described above.
2. Remove the existing panel (either blank or belonging to an existing card that is being changed) by releasing the captive screw(s) at the bottom (Densité 3 or Densité 3+ FR4) or side (Densité 3+ FR1) of the panel.
3. Position the new panel and secure it in place with the captive screw(s) at the bottom or side.

2.2 IPG-3901 Card Installation

Once a matching rear connector panel is in place, install the IPG-3901 card as follows:

1. Open the front panel of the frame.
2. Slide the IPG-3901 card into the slot and push gently on the handle to seat the connectors.
 - When using a triple-slot-width rear panel in a Densité-3 frame, the card should be inserted into the rightmost of the three slots.
 - When using a double-slot-width rear panel in a Densité-3+ FR1 frame, the card should be inserted into the lower of the two slots.
 - When using a double-slot-width rear panel in a Densité-3+ FR4 frame, the card should be inserted into the rightmost of the two slots.

Inserting the card into the wrong slot will not damage the card, and will be flagged by the on-card status LED flashing red to indicate that there is no connection to the rear panel.

3. Close the front door of the frame.

2.3 Rear Panels and Connectors

2.3.1 Images of Rear Panel Connectors

The two available rear panels are shown in the figure. Details of the inputs and outputs are described below.

NB – references to MADI on the labels for I/O 1, 3, 4 and 7 are for future use.

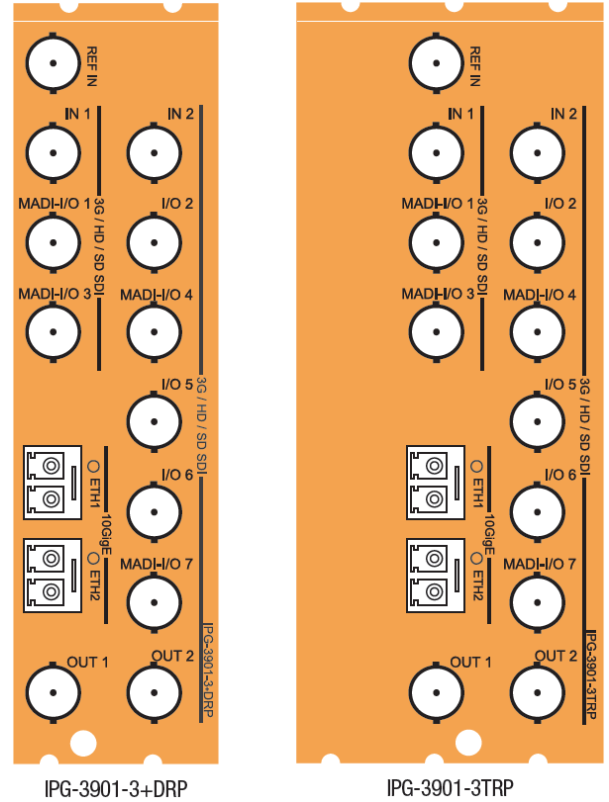


Figure 2-1 IPG-3901 Rear Panels

2.3.3 Details of rear panel connections

REF IN – External reference

Connect an NTSC or PAL reference signal (SMPTE 170M / SMPTE 318M / ITU 624-4 black burst)

3G/HD/SD IN – Serial digital 3G/HD/SD inputs

Connect serial digital video signals, conforming to the SMPTE 425M standard for 3G input signals, SMPTE 292M standard for HD input signals or SMPTE 259M standard for SD input signals, to the connectors labeled **3G/HD/SD IN 1 and IN 2**.

3G/HD/SD OUT – Serial digital video outputs

The IPG-3901 provides two 3G/HD/SD SDI video outputs on the connectors labeled **3G/HD/SD OUT 1 and 2**. The SDI video signal conforms to the input standard. The same signal is carried on both outputs.

3G/HD/SD SDI I/O – Serial digital 3G/HD/SD input or output (configurable)

Seven configurable I/O are provided. The SDI signal requirements are the same as those for the dedicated inputs and outputs as described above.

10 GbE ETH – 10 GigE Ethernet on fiber (SFP+ Interfaces)

Two 10 Gb Ethernet interfaces (each with Tx and Rx) on optical fiber or twinax cable. SFP+ modules and matching fiber or electrical connectors are required for the interface.

3 User Interface

3.1 Control options

The IPG-3901 can be controlled in two different ways:

- The local control panel and its push-buttons can be used to move through a menu of status reports (see [section 4](#)).
- Grass Valley's iControl system can be used to access the card's operating parameters from a remote computer, using a convenient graphical user interface (GUI) (see [section 5](#)).

3.2 Card-Edge Status LED

The status monitor LED is located on the front card-edge of the IPG-3901, and is visible through the front access door of the DENSITÉ 3 frame. This multi-color LED indicates the status of the IPG-3901 by color, and by flashing/steady illumination.

The chart shows how the various error conditions that can be flagged on the IPG-3901 affect the LED status.

- If a cell is gray, the error condition cannot cause the LED to assume that status
- If more than one LED status is possible for a particular error condition, the status is configurable.
See [Alarm Config Panel](#) for details.
- The factory default status, if available, is shown by a ⚙

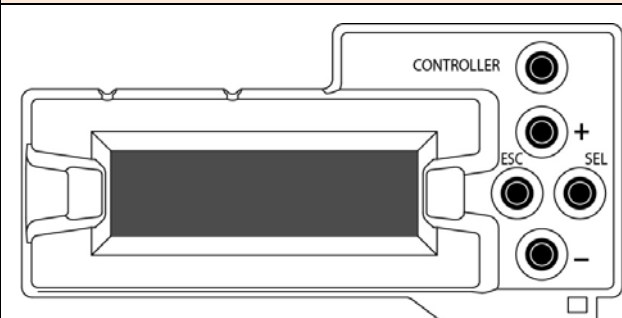

The LED will always show the most severe detected error status that it is configured to display, and in the chart error severity increases from left to right, with green representing no error/disabled, and flashing red the most severe error.

If the LED is Flashing Yellow, it means that the card is selected for local control using the Densité frame's control panel. See [section 4](#) for details.

4 Local control using the Densité frame control panel

There are two types of local control panel:

Panel type	Frame models	Appearance
Physical	Densité-3, Densité-3+FR1,	
Touch screen	Densité 3+FR4, GV Node	

The local control panel is fastened to the front of the controller card.

- The physical panel is accessed by opening the front door of the frame.
- The touch screen panel is accessed through an aperture in the frame door.

The panel consists of a display capable of displaying two lines of text, each 16 characters in length, and four pushbuttons. The functionality of the pushbuttons is as follows:

[+] [-] Used for menu navigation and value modification

[SELECT] Gives access to the next menu level. When a parameter value is shown, pushing this button once enables modification of the value using the [+] and [-] buttons; a second push confirms the new value

[ESC] Cancels the effect of parameter value changes that have not been confirmed; pushing [ESC] causes the parameter to revert to its former value.

Pushing [ESC] moves the user back up to the previous menu level. At the main menu, [ESC] does *not* exit the menu system. To exit, re-push the [SELECT] button for the card being controlled.

If no controls are operated for 30 seconds, the controller reverts to its normal standby status, and the selected card's STATUS reverts to its normal operating mode.

To assign the local control panel to the IPG-3901:

- Physical Panel: Push the SELECT button on the IPG-3901 card edge (see Section 1.4)
- Touch-screen panel: In the home screen, touch the virtual button corresponding to this IPG-3901

The STATUS LED on the IPG-3901 flashes yellow, and the touch-screen status shows yellow for the IPG-3901.

Use the control panel buttons to navigate through the menu, as described above.

5 Remote control using iControl

The IPG-3901 can be remotely controlled using Grass Valley's iControl system.

- This manual describes the control panels associated with the IPG-3901 and their use.
- Please consult the iControl User's Guide for information about setting up and operating iControl.

In iControl Navigator or iControl Websites, double-click on the IPG-3901 icon to open the control panel.

5.1 The iControl graphic interface window

The basic window structure for the IPG-3901 is shown in figure 5.1. The window identification line gives the card type (IPG-3901) and the slot number where the card is installed in its Densité frame.

There are four main sections in the window itself, as identified in the figure:

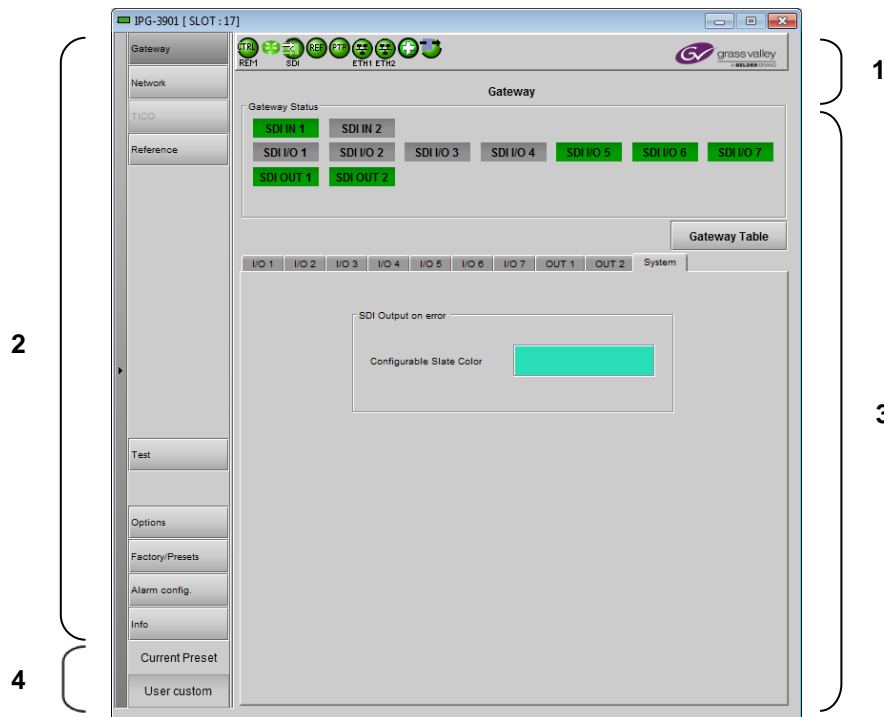


Figure 5-1 IPG-3901 iControl graphic interface window

Section 1. The top section displays nine icons on the left. These icons report different statuses such as card communication status, gateway status, health status, and card operation mode.



Icon # 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9

Move the mouse over an icon and a status message appears below the icon providing additional information. If there is an error, the error status message appears in the message area without mouse-over.










- If there are multiple errors, the error messages cycle so all can be seen.

- The icon whose status or error message is shown is highlighted with a mauve background.

The table below describes the various status icons that can appear, and how they are to be interpreted.

- In cases where there is more than one possible interpretation, read the error message in the iControl window to see which applies.

Section 2. The left portion of the window contains selection buttons for all of the individual panels, which become highlighted when they are selected. The main window section (3) then displays the selected panel, all of which are described in detail below.

Section 3. The main section displays the panel selected in section 2. It may contain multiple tabs to access any appropriate sub-panels.

Section 4. The lower left corner of the window identifies the Preset currently in use or “Custom” if none is applicable.

5.2 Gateway panel

The Gateway panel provides resources for configuring and managing the gateways on the IPG-3901.

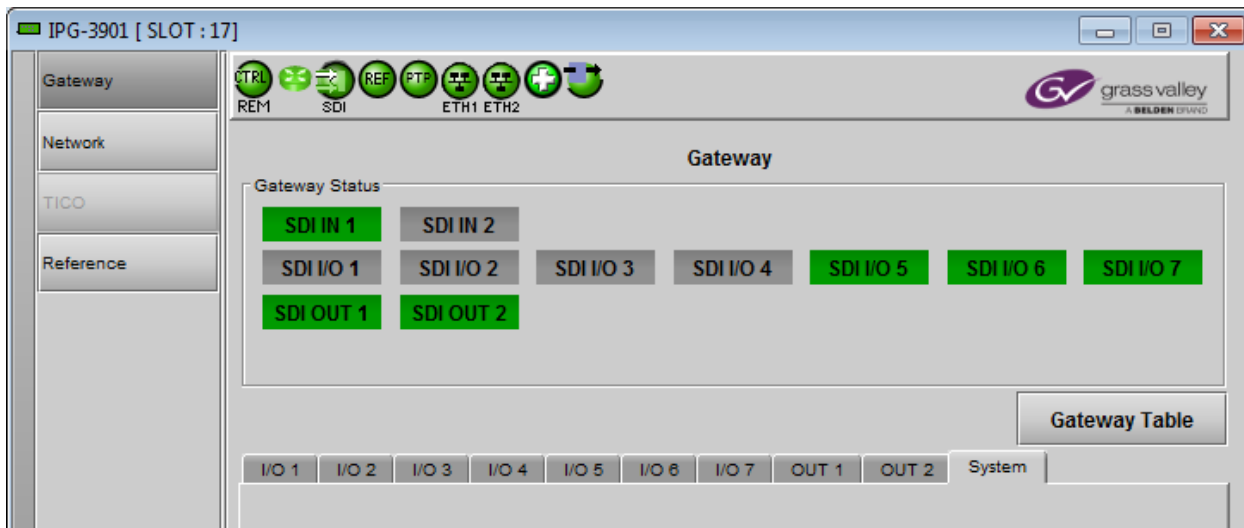


Figure 5-2 Gateway panel – upper portion

The *Gateway Status* icons at the top of the panel show the current status of all eleven gateways on the IPG-3901:

- Top row: the two SDI IN gateways
- Middle row: the seven configurable gateways (SDI IN or SDI OUT)
- Bottom row: the two SDI OUT gateways

Click the **Gateway Table** button to open the pop-up *Gateway Config* window

Each Gateway (except the TICO gateways) is linked to a physical SDI I/O via a connector on the rear panel. In the **Gateway** column, we have the physical SDI I/O name on the 1st line and the gateway name on the 2nd line. The gateway name can be edited – select the text and type a new name (up to 19 characters).

- Default names are GATEWAY 1 through GATEWAY 15.
- Changed value is pending prior to acceptance

Gateway Direction

The arrow in the **Dir** column shows the direction of signal flow between SDI and IP through the gateway.

- There are two fixed Gateways that convert SDI to IP Stream – SDI IN 1 and SDI IN 2.

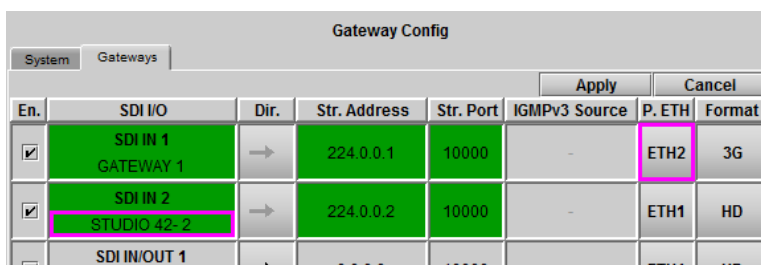

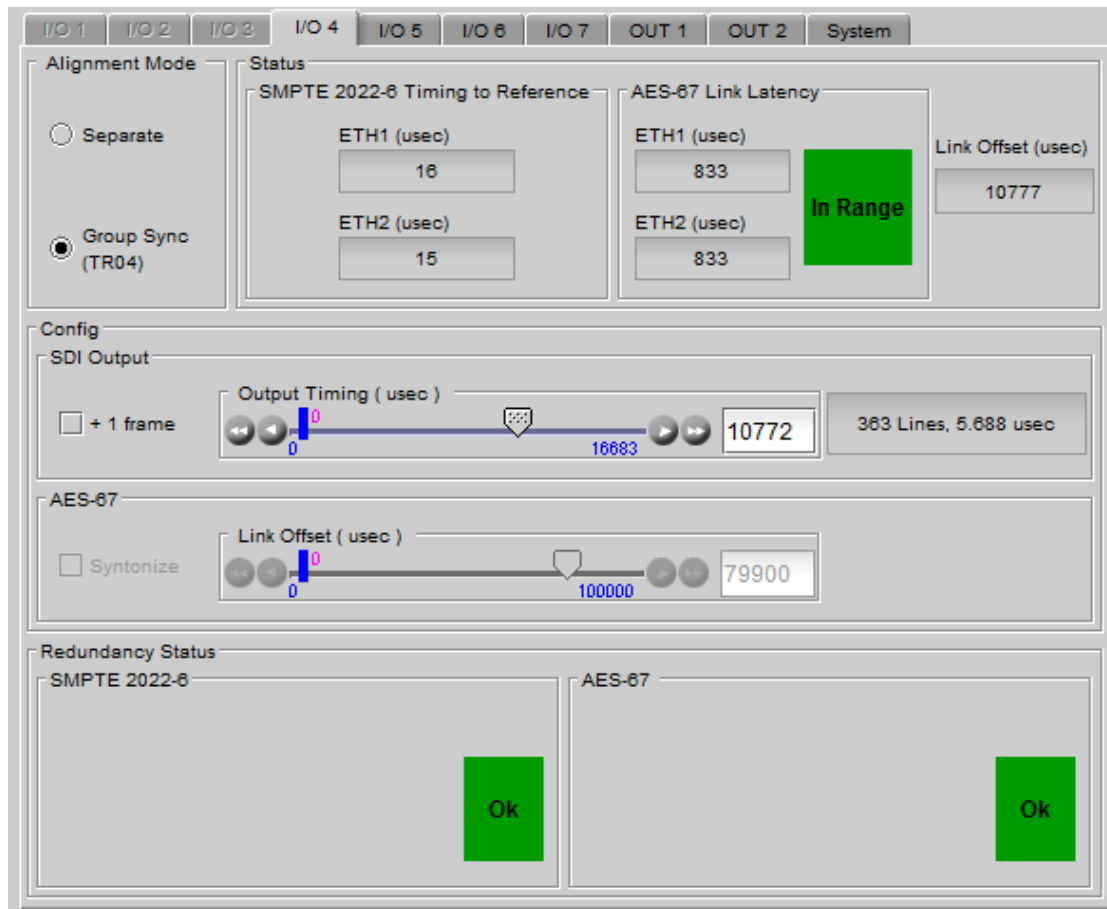


Figure 5-4 Gateway panel - lower portion – SDI output configuration

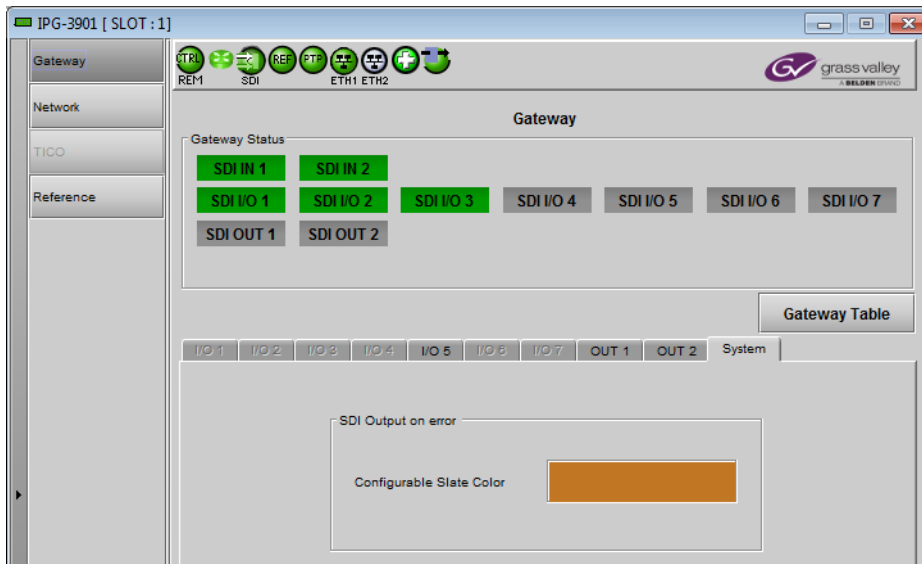



Figure 5-5 Gateway - System

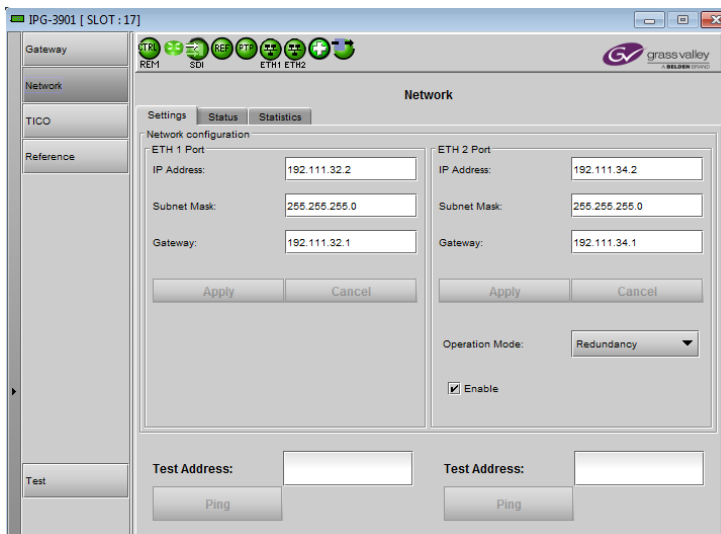


Figure 5-6 Network panel – Settings tab

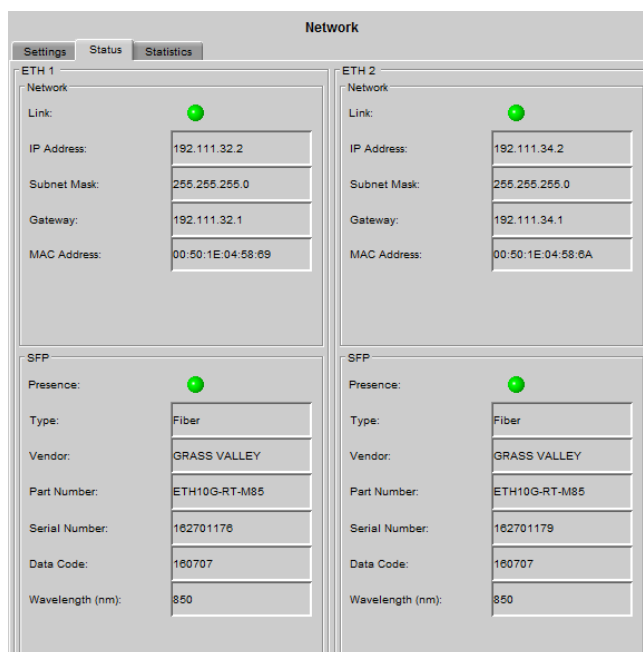


Figure 5-7 Network panel – Status tab

- Packets: The total number of Ethernet packets transmitted and received since the last reset on each port.
- Errors: The total number of Rx and Tx errors detected on each ethernet port since the last reset.

The accumulated statistics can be reset for a fresh start by clicking the *Reset ETH Statistics* button

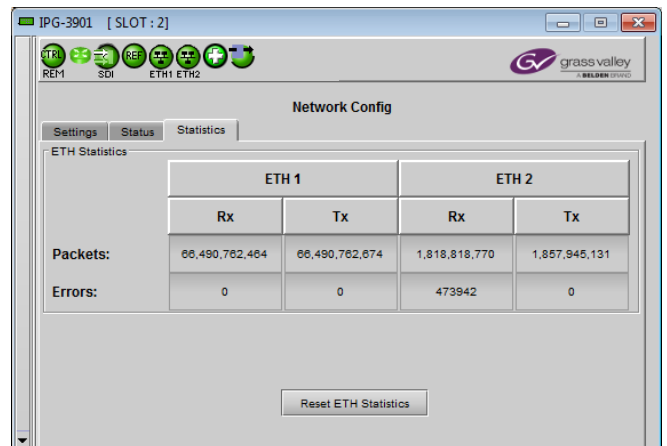


Figure 5-8 Network panel – Statistics tab

5.4 TICO Panel

NOTE – TICO is temporarily *not supported* in this IPG-3901 release. It will be restored in the next release. Please disregard any reference to TICO in this document.

To use TICO as described in this manual, you should downgrade from v2.2.x to v1.3.x

The IPG-3901 incorporates two TICO gateways, which can be configured as encoders and decoders according to the **TICO Model** chart below.

NOTE: The IPG-3901-OPT-TICO option must be activated before you can use the TICO gateways. Learn how to [enable the TICO option](#).

If the option is not activated, this panel will be greyed out and not available, and the TICO gateways will not be shown in the gateway configuration and status panels.

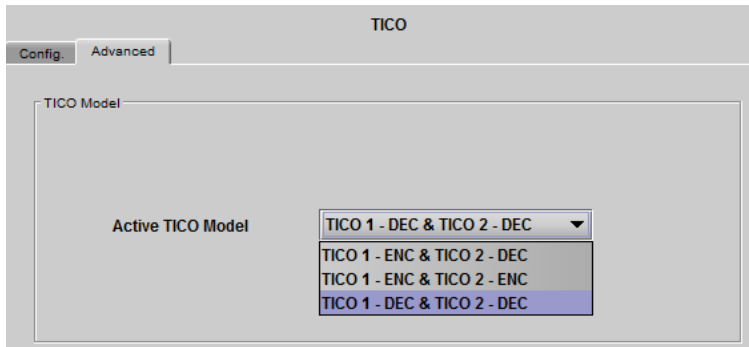
Once the TICO option is active, three different models are available to select.

- Each model includes 11 regular gateways and 2 new gateways for TICO processing.
- Each TICO encoder or decoder uses 4 SDI I/O for its inputs or outputs, so these will be reserved and not available as a regular gateway.

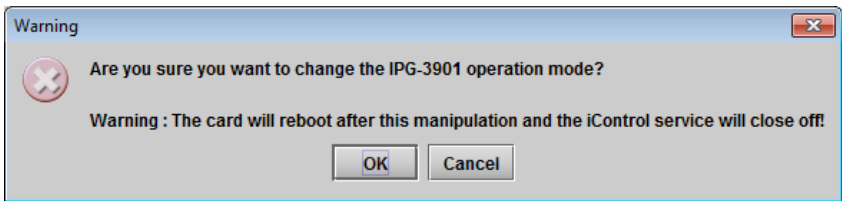
5.4.1 Advanced tab

This tab allows you to select the TICO model you will use with this IPG-3901.

- Click the **Active TICO Model** pulldown and select the desired functionality.

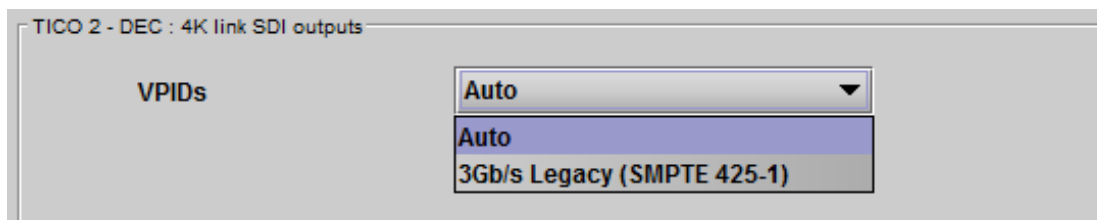

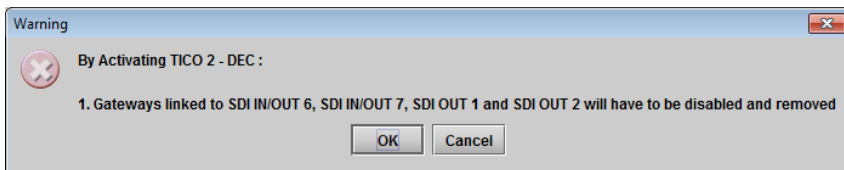
Usually, 2-Sample interleave outputs have a different VPID on each link, per SMPTE 425-5. Some downstream equipment may not support this standard, so the use of SMPTE 425-1 VPIDs can be forced by selecting the 3Gb/s Legacy option in the pulldown.

5.4.2 Config tab

This tab provides some control of the TICO model selected on the Advanced tab.

At the top, you may turn the two TICO encoders or decoders ON or OFF individually.

- When the TICO process is OFF, the SDI I/Os reserved for that process (as shown in the above chart) are freed up and function as normal gateways.
- Any time you try to turn a TICO encoder or decoder ON or OFF, a pop-up window will remind you of the consequences and required actions affecting gateways on the card. For example:



A graphic is displayed for each of the two TICO processes, per the TICO model in use. The graphic shows the current configuration, and reports the status for TICO.

For each TICO encoder or decoder, you must select the format of the four 4K link signals. The choice will depend on the format used by the source or destination equipment. Use the **4K I/O pulldown** to select the appropriate format:

- **Quad split** – (SDQS): the 4K image is split into four full-resolution quadrants, each sent on a single 3G link.
- **2-Sample Interleave** – (2SI): the 4K image is sub-sampled into four full-frame images, each at 1/2 the vertical and horizontal resolution.

Be careful – this is a manual selection, and errors will occur if the format selected in the pulldown does not match the actual link format.

The TICO encoder/decoder uses 2-Sample Interleave signals, so input/outputs in Quad Split format require an additional conversion process in the signal path, adding some processing delay to the delay inherent in the encoder and decoder.

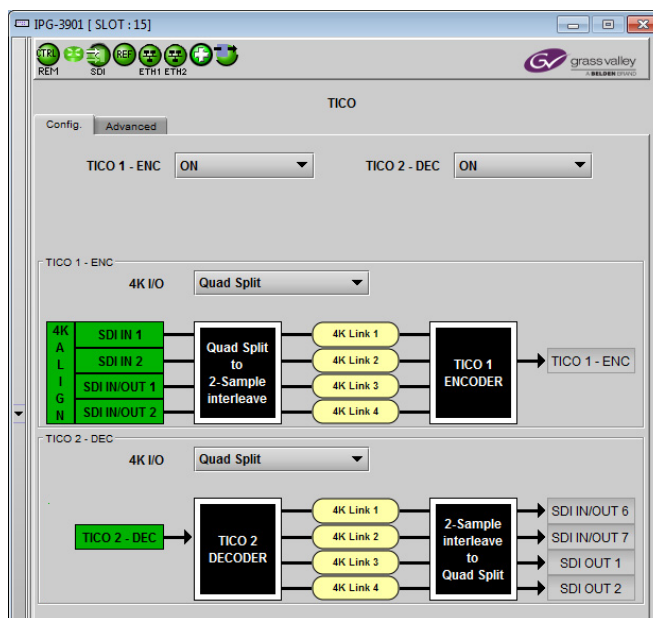


Figure 5-9 TICO panel - Config tab

4K Align

The input configuration and status display for TICO encoders includes a segment labeled 4K Align. This monitors the timing of the four link inputs to the encoder.

- The timing difference between 4K links should not exceed 400ns, as per SMPTE ST-425-5.
- If the alignment criterion is not met, no TICO will be sent over IP.

Link Detection

In the case of 2-Sample Interleave inputs to a TICO encoder, incoming SMPTE 425-5 VPIDs on the link inputs enable detection of the link ID, and this is displayed in the panel graphic. The detected links should line up from 1 to 4, top to bottom in the graphic. If they are out of sequence, the cable connections to the input gateways should be checked.

5.4.3 TICO Encoder monitoring

TICO encoders send the encoded signal to IP via the TICO gateway. The IPG-3901 also provides a monitoring signal over IP so that the TICO signal can be monitored without decoding.

Input link 1 to the encoder (after Quad Split to 2-Sample Interleave conversion, if required) is sent to the IP output of its gateway in 3G resolution. Because the link input is 2-Sample Interleave, the monitoring output will be a high-quality, full-screen, sub-sampled version of the original 4K input to the encoder.

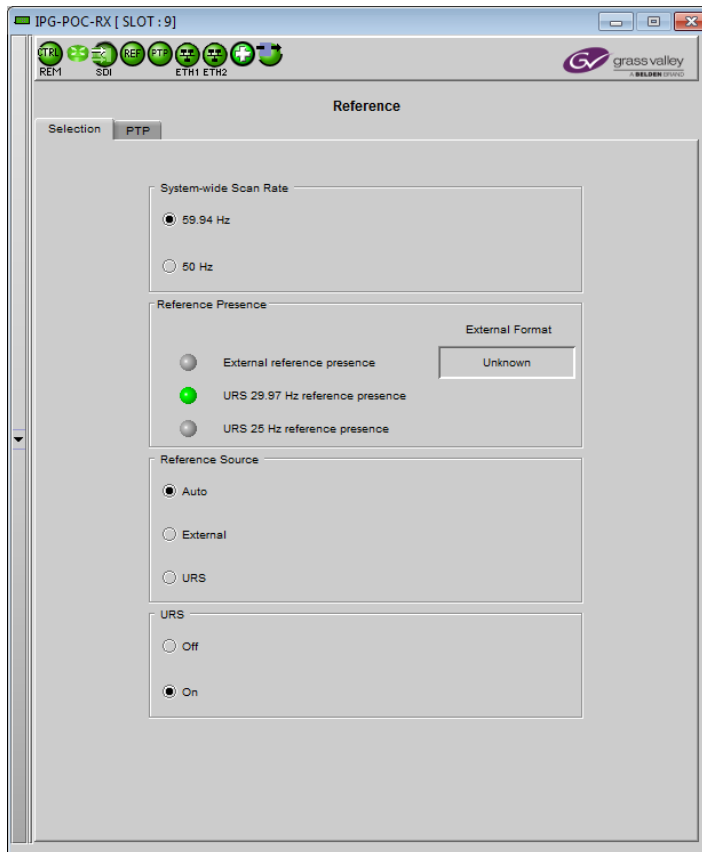


Figure 5-10 Reference panel

5.5.3 PTP Failover

In general, the PTP arriving on ETH1 port is used by the IPG-3901.

If the PTP on ETH1 is lost, the card will enter Flywheel mode, and then switch over to the PTP from ETH2 once the Announce Receipt Timeout has been reached.

The card will switch back to ETH1 using the same process once a valid PTP has been detected on ETH1.

Failover and return should be glitch-free on IP reception and transmission if PTP configuration respects this rule:

$$\text{IPG3901 announce Interval} \times \text{IPG3901 Announce Receipt Timeout} \leq 2\text{s}$$

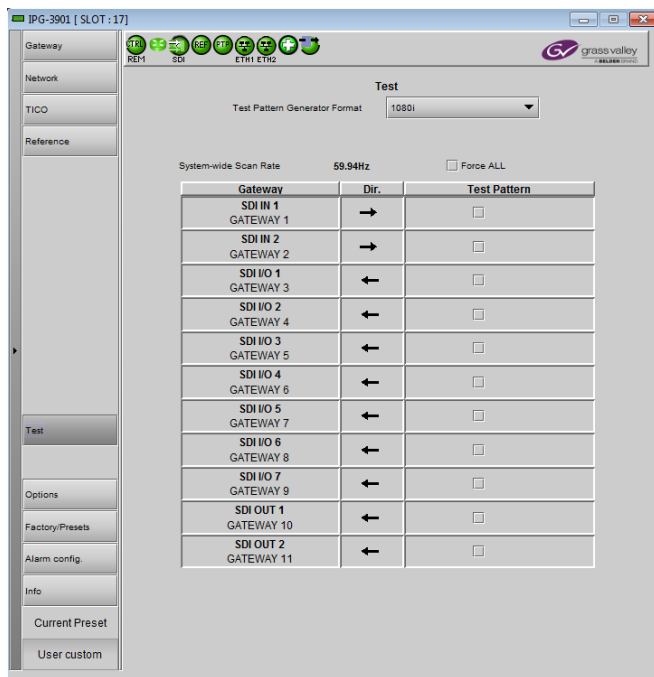


Figure 5-12 Test panel

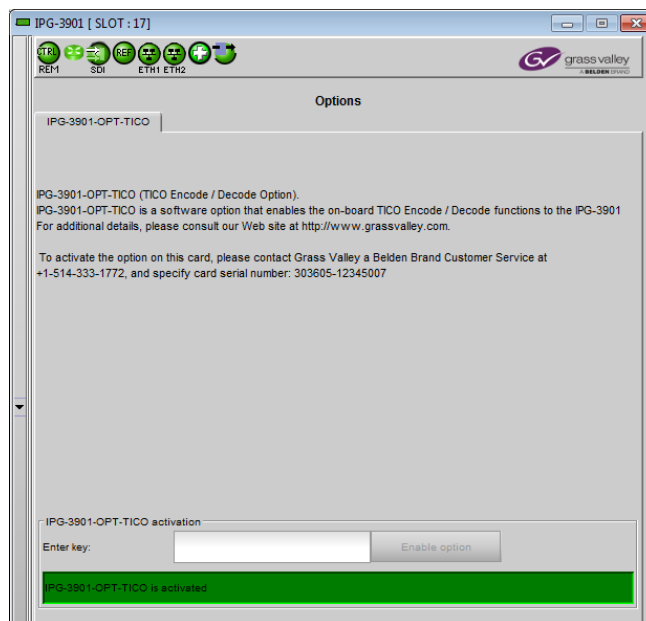


Figure 5-13 Options panel

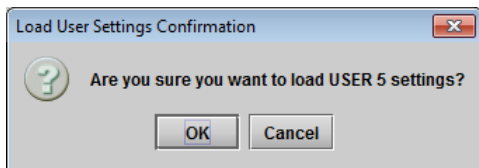

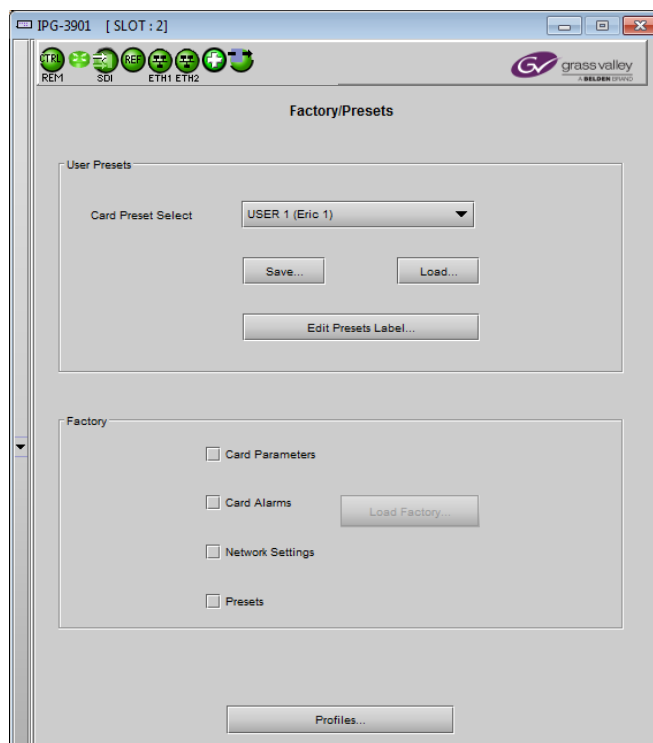
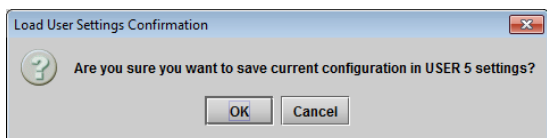
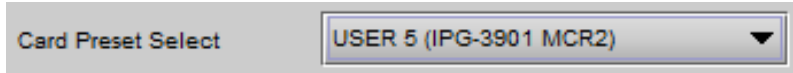


Figure 5-14 Factory/Presets Panel

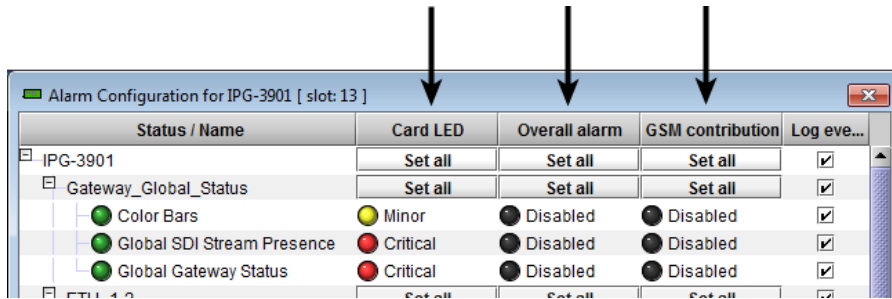


5.8.1 Factory

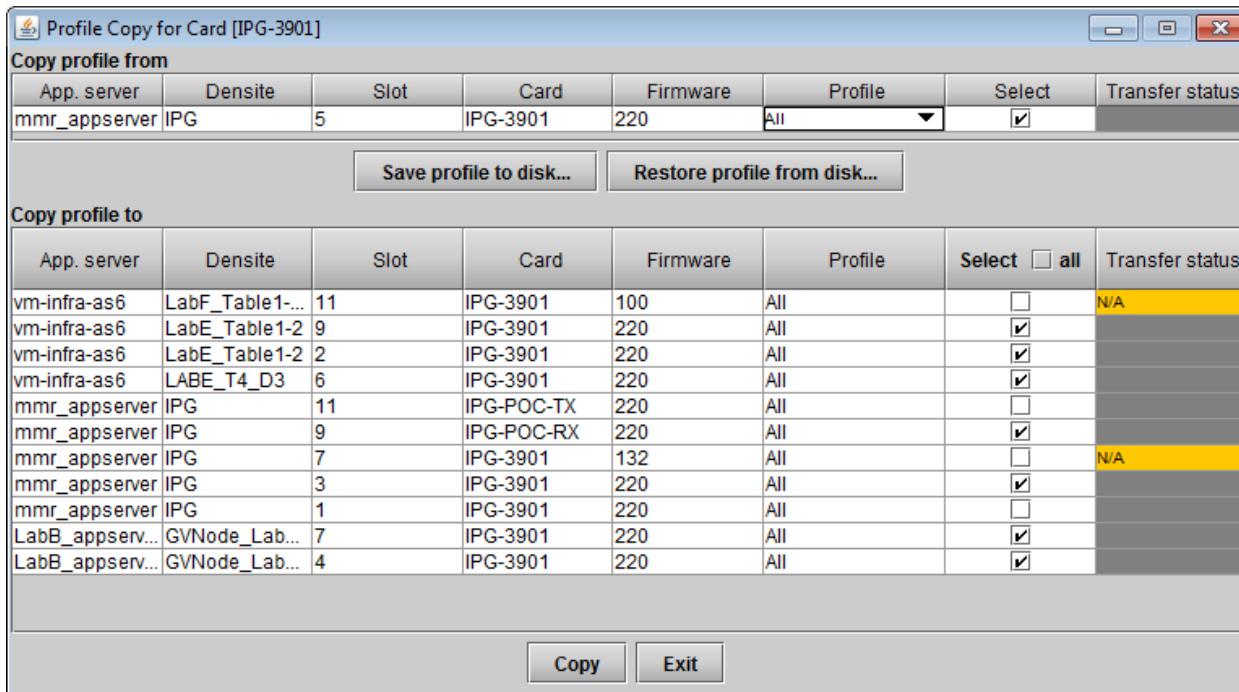


Figure 5-15 Profile Copy for Card

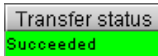

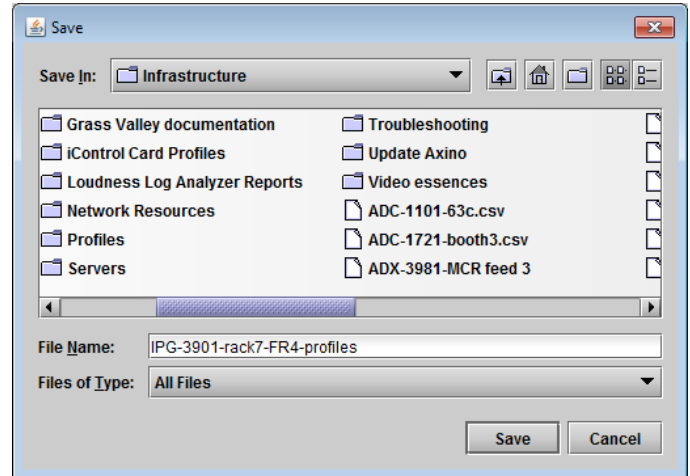
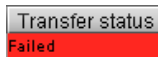


Figure 5-16 Save Profile to Disk dialog

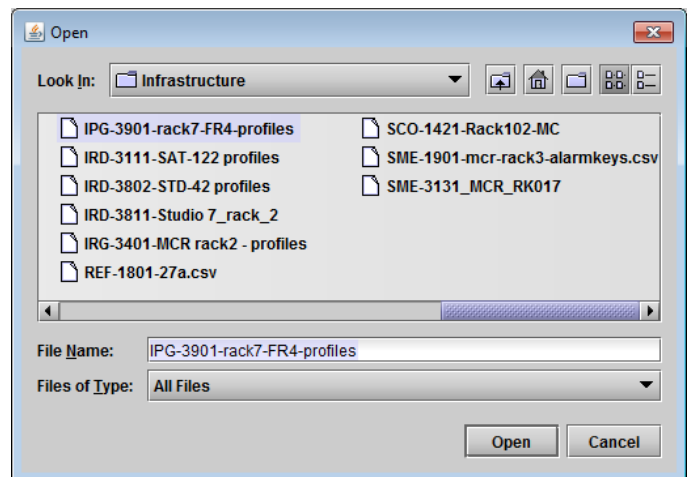


Figure 5-17 Restore Profiles from Disk dialog

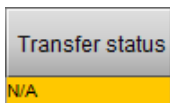

5.9 Alarm Config Panel

This panel allows the alarm reporting of the IPG-3901 to be configured. The panel opens in a new window when the button is clicked, and can be resized if needed.

The panel is organized in columns.

Status/Name

This contains an expandable tree listing all the alarms reported by this IPG-3901 card.

- Each alarm name includes an icon that shows its current status
- Some alarms may be text-only and the alarm status is shown in the name and not by a status icon

The **Card LED**, **Overall Alarm** and **GSM Contribution** columns contain pulldown lists that allow the level of contribution of each individual alarm to the alarm named in the column heading to be set.

- Click on the alarm icon to see the available levels; then click on one to select it.



Card LED

This column allows configuration of the contribution of selected individual alarms to the status LED located on the front card edge. The Card LED status is shown at the bottom of the alarm tree in the Status/Name column.

Overall Alarm

This column allows configuration of the contribution of each individual alarm to the Overall Alarm associated with this card. The Overall Alarm is shown in the upper left corner of the

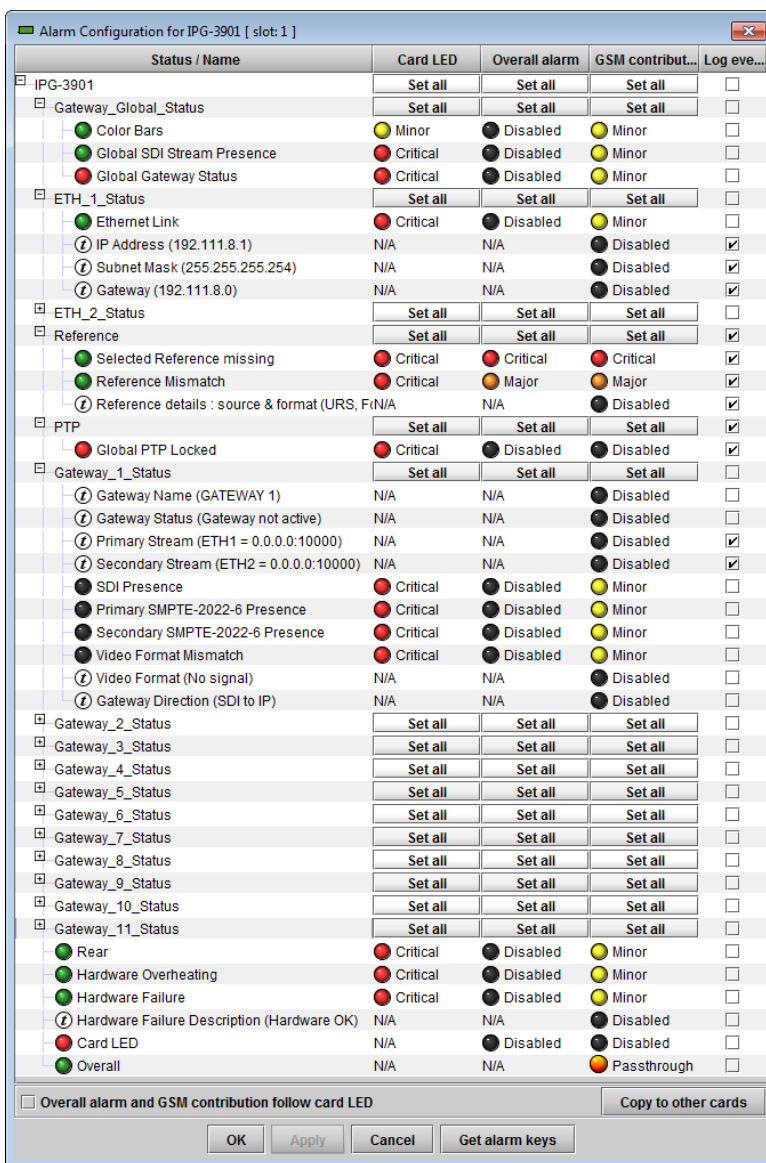


Figure 5-18 Alarm Configuration

iControl panel, and also appears at the bottom of the Status/Name column.

GSM Contribution

This column allows configuration of the contribution of each individual alarm to the GSM Alarm Status associated with this card. GSM is a dynamic register of all iControl system alarms, and is also an alarm provider for external applications. The possible values for this contribution are related to the Overall alarm contribution:






- If the Overall alarm contribution is selected as Disabled, the GSM alarm contribution can be set to any available value
- If the Overall alarm contribution is selected as any level other than disabled, the GSM contribution is forced to follow the Overall Alarm.

Log Events

iControl maintains a log of alarm events associated with the card. The log is useful for troubleshooting and identifying event sequences. Click in the checkbox to enable logging of alarm events for each individual alarm.

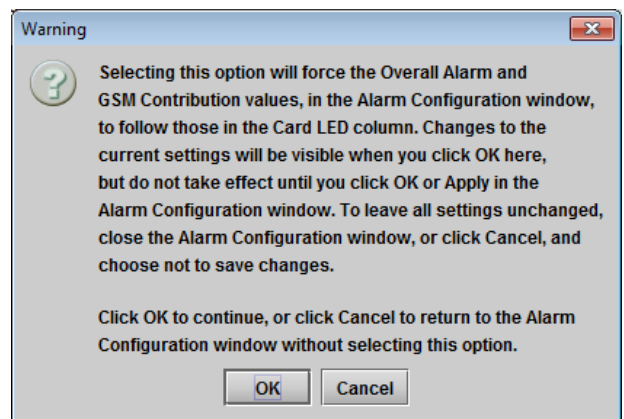


Figure 5-19 Warning for Follow LED change

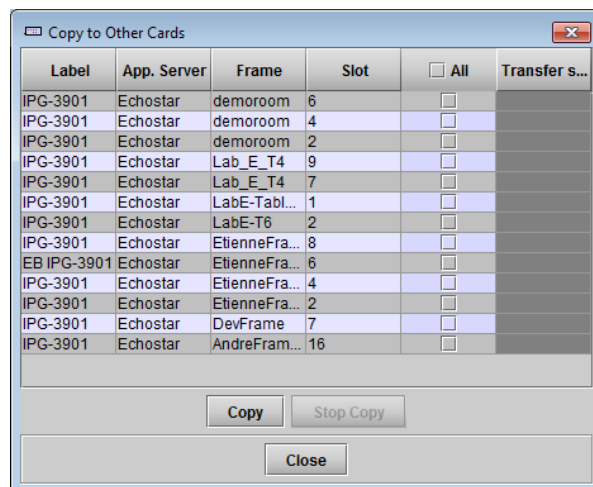


Figure 5-20 Copy to Other Cards window

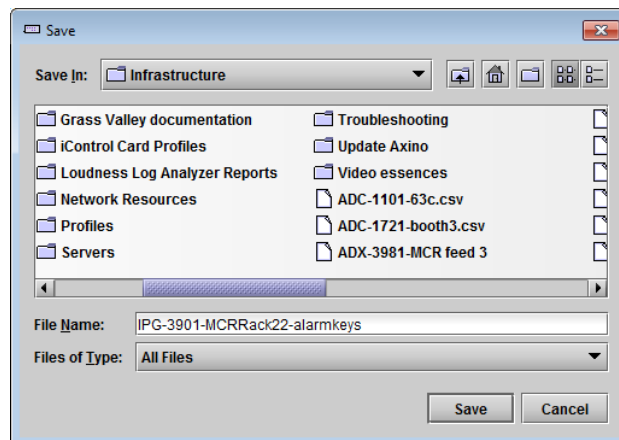


Figure 5-21 Get Alarm Keys dialog

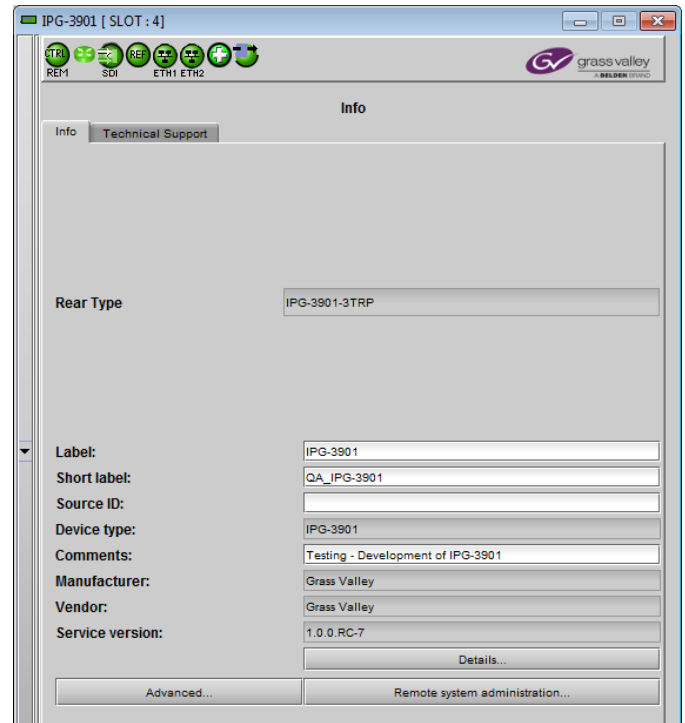


Figure 5-22 Info Panel

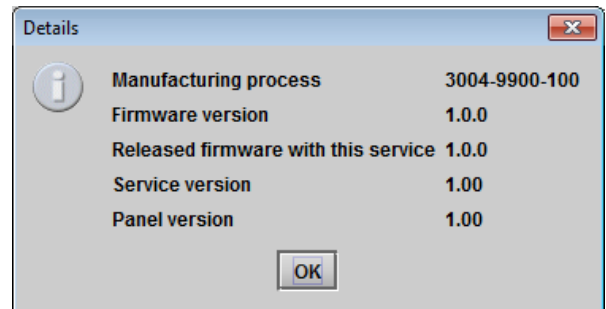


Figure 5-23 Details window

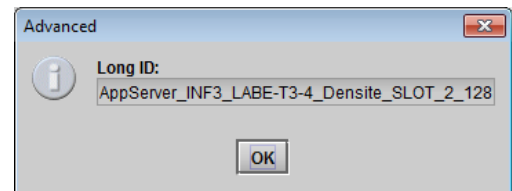


Figure 5-24 Advanced window

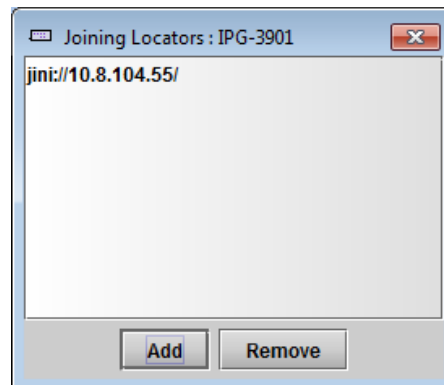
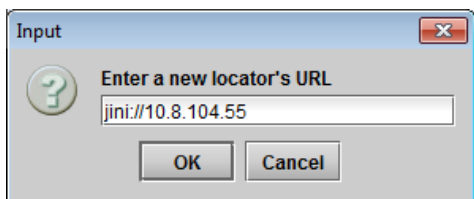
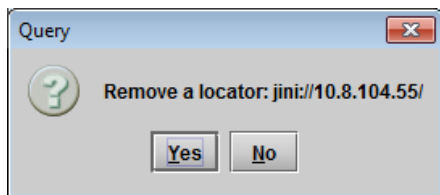


Figure 5-25 Joining Locators window

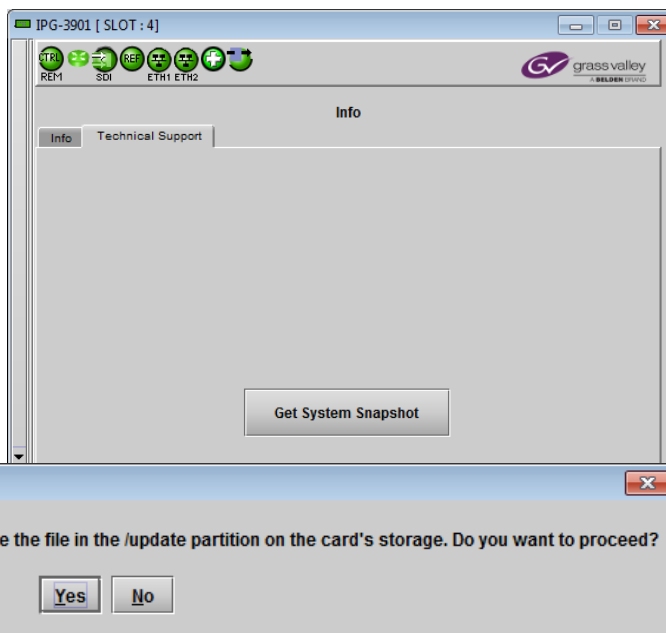


Figure 5-26 Info Panel - Technical Support tab

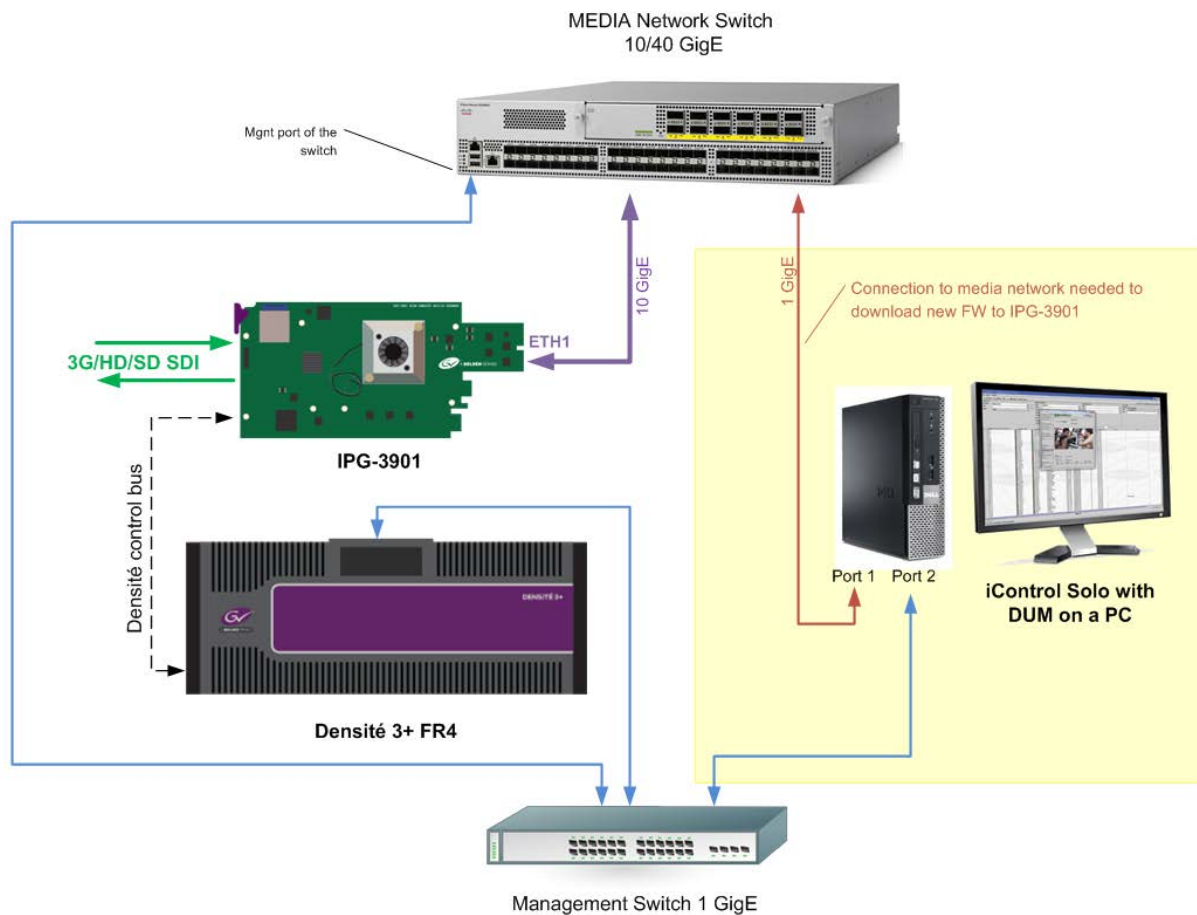

Upgrade using the media port ETH1

The IPG-3901 firmware can be updated through the media port ETH1 using the Densité Upgrade Manager (DUM) in iControl Solo. Unfortunately, we need an additional installation setup to proceed with the upgrade. The firmware package transfer is done using an ftp connection from PC to the IPG-3901 through the media Network Switch.



For the upgrade, you need to connect a PC to the MEDIA Network Switch and use iControl Solo (Yellow zone). When you are done with the upgrade, the PC connection to the switch is no longer required

If you don't have the proper installation to upgrade the firmware as described above, you can update the firmware by manually installing the upgrade file onto the IPG-3901's SD card.

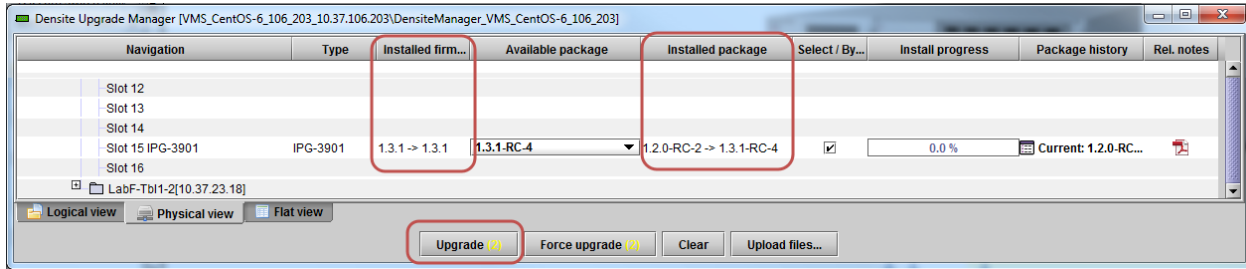
- You will need an SD card reader connected to your PC.

Proceed as follows:

1. Remove the IPG-3901 from its Densité frame.
2. Remove the SD card from the IPG-3901 board and place it in the SD card reader.
3. On your PC, unzip the iControl upgrade package.
4. Copy the "firmware-x.x.x.xx.zip" file from the "card" folder in the upgrade package and drop it onto the SD card.
5. Locate the firmware file from Step 4 in the Update partition of the SD card, and rename it "ipg3901-upgrade-vx.x.x.x.zip".
e.g. "firmware-1.3.2.23.zip" should be changed to "ipg3901-upgrade-v1.3.2.32.zip"
6. Remove the SD card from the card reader, and re-install it on the IPG-3901 card.
7. Insert the IPG-3901 back into its slot in the Densité frame.
8. The card will automatically install the new firmware and re-boot.

If you using an appserver with iControl to control and monitor the IPG-3901 card, you will be required to install the new iControl service package on the appserver, once again using the (DUM).

Verify that the card has been updated with the correct firmware as described above, and select the "Upgrade" option on (DUM), that will upgrade the iControl service only.
